





a volunteer position at Baylor Scott and White Hospital. She is excited about observing doctors and nurses at work there.


other things like school and soccer, but my creative mind is always there."

meal, even if that meal is spur of the moment. For Brian and Sabrina, what happens *around* the table is more significant than what's *on* the table.



Butterflies and hummingbirds flutter through the Ovilla Garden Club members' gardens, as well as community area gardens tended by these diligent caretakers. "Go Wild, Plant Natives," was chosen by President Roy L. Cormier as the club's mission for 2017. In the past year, members have focused on creating landscape environments that complement what Mother Nature has already provided. Members have answered the challenge. Mike Yordy, incoming president for 2018-2019, remarked, "Most of our members have butterfly gardens."

Founded in 1971 by Norma Hensel, the Ovilla Garden Club's purpose is to inspire a love of gardening by promoting and educating each other and the public on all phases of home gardening, civic beauty and conservation of environmental resources. With its 24 members hailing from Ovilla and its surrounding areas, the club is a member of Texas Garden Clubs, Inc., The National Garden Clubs, Inc. and the Oak Cliff Forum. The club's two annual social events are held in members' homes. All ages of gardeners are welcome, and annual dues are just \$20. "We're also looking at having some evening meetings in the future," Deborah Kennedy, 2nd vice-president, added. Other officers include Frances Cormier, 1st vice president; Regina Allen, secretary; and Amber Parker, treasurer.

City beautification and volunteerism are important to the club members. Their projects include maintaining plantings at the Ovilla Heritage Park and the VA Hospital Mental Health Unit, supplying Christmas baskets for the Ellis County Meals on Wheels and supporting the North Ellis County Outreach. Both Ovilla Heritage Park and the Blue Star Memorial Highway marker have received plantings in the past year from club members. Members raise funds through their plant sales at the Ellis County Master Gardener Expo and at garage sales.

Field trips and speakers at meetings help educate members. Members share ideas and plants with each other also. Two members, Carolyn Ross and Mike, are certified Master Gardeners. A member for five years, Mike enjoys gardening with his wife, Monna. They grow tomatoes and peppers and have two butterfly gardens. Mike, a native of Southern Illinois and retired employee benefits manager, grew up gardening with his dad. "We had the sweetest strawberries and tomatoes," he recalled. Like other gardeners, finding enough time to enjoy his passion is Mike's challenge.

Roy is known for his tomatoes, which he starts from seeds, and his roses. Other gardeners are envious of Roy's two greenhouses in which he raises tropicals. The City that Bricked the World.



What's in a Name?

Little did Claudia Torres-Sanchez realize that her slip of the tongue would lead to a major change for her city. She discovered that if you say something enough, it comes true.

She was invited to some meetings by a friend and, during one of those meetings, she referred to the host organization by the wrong name. "I kept calling it Chamber of Commerce, and during one of those meetings someone asked 'Why aren't we a Chamber?" said Claudia, the current Chamber vice president. "And now, we are."

The Ferris Area Business Association is now the Ferris Chamber of Commerce. They were established in March. "Chambers have more appeal for new businesses coming to an area," said Chamber President Charles Hatfield.

The group was originally called the Ferris Downtown Association. "That was a problem," Charles said with a laugh. "FDA? We don't have any drugs."

But the growth in Ferris is no laughing matter. Since the recent Chamber formation, Claudia said at least two or three businesses join each month, and, as of the start of summer, they had about 30 member businesses total. "That first month, we had about six join," she said. Charles said the Chamber is using the tagline, "The city that bricked the world," to promote Ferris, which is famous for its brick production. "We have bricks from Ferris in the Statue of Liberty," he said.

To which Chamber Secretary Connie Bratcher added, "My dad found one during World War II in Okinawa."

Among other promotions for the city are the annual Brick Festival each April (though it may move to May next year), Christmas on the Square and Ferris Trade Days (held the third Saturday of each month). The city will also host the legendary Culpepper & Merriweather Circus in early October. About becoming a Chamber, Treasurer Michael Masek said, "It really opened things up. Ferris is growing, and we're ready for that growth."

The Chamber also holds luncheons for members on the second Wednesday of each month. These luncheons are used to keep the community in tune with topics such as education, law enforcement and tax law changes. Their website is www.ferrischamber.com, and they encourage folks to like their page on Facebook.

"Feedback from citizens has been popular. This is very beneficial to our community," Chamber Board Member and Ferris Mayor Jim Swafford said.
