# SPREADIN-G-

United States Air Force JROTC is just one of many extracurricular classes offered to both male and female students at Corsicana High School. Under the command and watchful eyes of Lieutenant Colonel Monte Mackey and Master Sergeant Roger Hardie, the students who choose the JROTC citizenship program learn self-discipline and what it means to be responsible young adults. "There are 120,000 Air Force ROTC students worldwide," Lt. Col. Mackey stated. "There are 900 units from Guam to Italy to Germany and the United States."

The late Larry Weaver founded the program at CHS in May 1995. Lt. Col. Mackey first taught the class in Temple, but he relocated to Corsicana and began his tenure in 2011. Master Sgt. Hardie came on board in 2006 after serving the previous seven years in a similar program offered in Georgia.

"I traded out with Colonel Pales who was here," Lt. Col. Mackey shared.

"I wanted to be closer to family in Tyler," Master Sgt. Hardie said. "Corsicana is a lot closer to Tyler than Georgia."

To be considered as an instructor for the Air Force JROTC program, one has to have served in the Air Force and retired honorably. After lengthy careers, both Lt. Col. Mackey and Master Sgt. Hardie retired from the Air Force. Lt. Col. Mackey served 26 years, while Master Sgt. Hardie served 21 years. What they are doing now for CISD is what they call a "follow-on" career where they answer to "two masters" — the school policy and the Air Force service policy.

And students are reaping the benefits of the valuable experience the two bring to the classroom. This year, they are celebrating their 12th consecutive year of being honored with the Distinguished Unit Award. "Ours is a student-run organization," Master Sgt. Hardie explained. "Students must do their part to make the Distinguished Unit Award happen."

"We must have at least 100 students to be considered a viable program," Lt. Col. Mackey added.

Currently, there are more than 100 students actively involved in the program. The program is specifically designed for those who want to make a difference on campus and in their community, while also allowing them to see if a military career is really what they desire following graduation.

Students average around 3,000 community service hours per school year. That averages out to approximately 24 hours per student. "These numbers are fed to Congress," Lt. Col. Mackey said. "Congress uses these numbers to justify continued funding for JROTC."

Two students who have excelled and worked their way to the top of this elective program are Corps Commander Jackson Hilmes and Vice Corps Commander Kaitlyn Sjostrom. Kaitlyn's main responsibility as Vice Corps Commander is to assist Jackson in his place as Corps Commander. "When I first signed up for the program, I was only a little bit interested," Jackson admitted. "After completing the first year, I knew without a doubt that I wanted to make a career out of serving in the Air Force."

As a senior, Jackson is currently nearing the end of his fourth consecutive year in the program. After graduation, his plans are to spend the next four years at the Air Force Academy, where his goal will be to become a pilot. "I hope to major in aerospace engineering, so I have something to fall back on when I retire from my 20-year career with the Air Force," he stated with confidence.

Not all students who sign up for the Air Force JROTC program see it as the beginning to a lengthy career. They view it as a program where they can spread their wings and see if the military fits or not. "It's hot and cold," Master Sgt. Hardie admitted. "It's not everyone's cup of tea." But, it's a niche for so many others — a place on campus where they can excel while participating in practices that bring growth.





Lt. Col. Mackey and Master Sgt. Hardie understand fully that to keep enrollment up, they must offer interesting and fun things that will attract students to the program. One such event was a field trip to Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene, Texas. "The group got to fly on an Air Force C-130 cargo plane," Lt. Col. Mackey explained. "For many of the 29 students, it was their first time to fly." While in the cargo plane, the students rotated to the flight deck, so they could see the pilot "do his thing." "They even opened the rear cargo door, much like the scene in Mission Impossible, so the students could have another experience to talk about when they returned to the campus."

Air Force JROTC offers a niche for students to fit in, a feeling that they belong, a family of sorts and a place to build confidence. "The program provides a family environment where everyone pulls their own weight," Master Sgt. Hardie said. "The program offers a place where students fit in and find success in their high school years."

Lt. Col. Mackey and Master Sgt. Hardie also offer a picture of what positive male role models look like. Lt. Col. Mackey stated, "JROTC students learn how to be both leaders and followers, and we as the instructors try to set the example for them. We become better teachers, and they in turn become better young adults."





through playing games," he remembered. Dr. McAdams is a Corsicana VOICE Chapter of Freedom School graduate, to which he returned as a servant leadership intern to work with at-risk second-graders during the summer of 2010. "For me, time spent working with children etched the value of teaching into me," he explained.

His early choices in reading inspired and helped direct Dr. McAdams toward the medical profession. "My favorite childhood books were from the *Nate the Great* series. Nate, like me, has a passion for pancakes and employs deductive reasoning to solve problems. Now, as a doctor, I find that I look at a patient's presenting problem as a challenge, which needs to be methodically solved," he shared.

His professional journey began with the financial help of a Collins Scholarship and a Presidential Scholarship (for leadership) at Texas Lutheran University, where Dr. McAdams earned a B.S. degree in molecular biology. During those undergraduate days, he was a starter on the football team for two years, joined Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity and was a biochemistry tutor. The summer of 2009 found this future doctor working as an undergraduate student researcher with microbiology experiments at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi.

Dr. McAdams' next stop earned him a master's degree in clinical research management from the University of







North Texas Health Science Center. During his tenure, he served as a clinical research assistant.

Attendance at Ross University School of Medicine took Dr. McAdams to Portsmouth, Dominica. "Ross was a great opportunity for me, but one of the challenges was adjusting to life on a Caribbean island. There were several amenities not available, but those experiences allowed me to practice adapting to living in different places. I also needed to learn to practice medicine without the comforts of more metropolitan areas," Dr. McAdams reflected. Walking to school in a safe environment, swimming in the Caribbean Sea and grabbing fresh fruit from mango trees were all pluses during his life on the island. He became a student member of the American College of Physicians and attended the national convention of ACP.

During July 2018, he began serving a residency in internal medicine through the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley School of Medicine at Doctors Hospital at Renaissance in Edinburg, Texas. Dr. McAdams stated, "So far, I'm enjoying working with my colleagues and supervising physicians. People in the valley have hearts as warm as the weather.

"I believe my passion for developing a scientific approach to medicine is one reason I will be successful in residency, as well as build a longlasting career in internal medicine," Dr. McAdams concluded. All of Corsicana can join this native son's family and friends in being proud of his hard-earned accomplishments.



Bristol Hospice embracing a reverence for life PATHWAYS

The time often comes when a patient and his or her family realizes it's time to bridge from curing the patient's illness to providing comfort to all. That's when Bristol Hospice-Pathways, a 2018 HEALTHCARE*first* Hospice Honors recipient, can help provide the care and education needed. "We care and are compassionate," Crystal Underwood, Bristol's Corsicana hospice liaison, said. "Hospice Honors are awarded though satisfied family surveys."

"The education we provide is equally important. It helps take the fear of the unknown away," Saundra Townley, RN, BSN and executive director, added. With a focus on the person and not the disease, the concept of hospice was founded by Dame Cicely Saunders in England in 1968. Bristol Hospice-Pathways derives its name from Bristol, England, using the Bristol Bridge, along with the "Bristol Heart" as its logo. "The 'B' which looks like a leaf, also signifies the four chambers of a human heart," Saundra revealed.

Bristol Hospice staff serve patients in 20 counties. Patients in Navarro County are served primarily by homegrown staffers like Crystal — who was born and raised in Navarro County and attended Navarro College. Staff comprised of nurses, chaplains and social workers provide comfort; pain and symptom control; physical, emotional and spiritual care; and family caregiver support, all of which lead to a life lived to the fullest with dignity. "We tailor our service to every patient's individual needs," Crystal explained. "Before we begin our day, we huddle every morning in prayer."

Bristol Hospice offers the We Honor Veterans program, including a memorial book for patients to complete for their families and fellow veterans who serve as volunteers to be a listening ear. *Namaste*, meaning "honoring the spirit within" is another offered program focusing on the five senses, along with the sixth sense the spirit.

Following a patient's passing, Bristol Hospice cares for family members for the following 13 months. "We're family helping families," Saundra said. "For instance, we helped a lady in her 90s fill a wish to fish. It gave me goose bumps to teach her how to fish. At the end of the day, it's always the biggest blessing to have seen the smiles on patients and their caregivers' faces. We build relationships and become part of their lives, and it's an honor they entrust their care to us."

Patients can choose to remain with their own doctors with whom Bristol Hospice-Pathways doctors and nurses will coordinate care. Payment is made through Medicare, Medicaid, VA benefits, private insurance and private pay. Additionally, the Bristol Foundation can be accessed by staff social workers when needed.

Community volunteerism is part of Bristol Hospice-Pathways. Staff participate in the local Senior Special Olympics and the Alzheimer's Association. Crystal serves as a committee chair for Relay for Life, and staff members provide and deliver holiday meals. "My family and I are deeply rooted in Navarro County. I'm blessed and excited to serve my hometown and community," Crystal said.

The business is a member of the Corsicana & Navarro County Chamber of Commerce. "We will try to help in whatever this community needs," Saundra said.

A Navarro College graduate, Saundra received her BSN and is working on a master's degree in nursing from The University of Texas at Arlington. "I love what I do," she concluded. "When you need hospice, it's not giving up hope it's taking a different route." **NOW**



 Blend the peppers and remaining ingredients, except for the vegetable oil and sour cream.

**3.** In another pan, heat the vegetable oil; fry the mixture for 15-20 minutes over medium heat.

**4.** In a blender, puree all ingredients together, blending in the sour cream gradually; serve.

#### Azteca Soup

Vegetable oil, enough for frying 15 pasilla peppers 4-5 cubes chicken bouillon, reconstituted with water according to pkg. directions 5 oz. pork oil 3 onions, chopped 10 garlic cloves, chopped 3 lbs. tomato sauce 1 lb. chicken base 2 lbs. corn tortillas Sour cream, to taste

 In a large skillet, heat the oil. Fry the pasilla peppers until tender; drain.
 Soak the peppers in water for 30 minutes; drain. Blend the peppers with the chicken bouillon.
 In another skillet, heat the pork oil. Add the onion. Fry until it's tender; drain.
 In a casserole dish, add the peppers mixture, onion and remaining ingredients,

except tortillas and sour cream; broil for 45 minutes on medium heat.

**5.** In a blender, puree the ingredients. In a saucepan, return the mixture to heat until boiling.

6. Cut the tortillas into 2-inch strips; fry, then drain. Add to individual serving bowls, in the center of each bowl. Pour soup over the strips.7. Put a dollop of sour cream on top of the soup and tortilla strips before serving.
