It's National Children's Dental Health Month!



For National Children's Dental Health Month, I thought I'd share some information on a topic that many parents struggle with. Are thumb-sucking and pacifier habits harmful for a child's teeth? The short answer is yes. These habits may result in long-term problems.

As a parent and a pediatric dentist, I see various oral habits, but the most common of them all is thumb -sucking. Most kids suck their thumbs

because it's soothing and is most prevalent during times of hunger, fatigue, stress, sleep, teething, and shyness. In fact, some children are seen upon ultrasound sucking their thumbs.

The intensity and frequency of the thumb-sucking habit, as well as the pattern of jaw growth, determine whether dental problems will develop. The American Dental Association recommends breaking the thumb-sucking habit before your child's permanent teeth come in. If left uncorrected, thumb-sucking can result in reshaping of the jawbone (narrow upper jaw), flaring of the upper front teeth, poor tongue placement, speech issues, overbite and open bite, and airway issues. but not anywhere else. The goal is to have the habit taper off on its own.

Provide a replacement coping skill. Like adults, kids find it hard to break habits if they don't have an alternative way of coping. Consider letting your child have a "lovey" or "fidget" to squeeze when they're anxious.

Help your child recognize the habit. Remind your child when you see them doing it. Not all kids are conscious that they are sucking their thumbs, especially when they're bored or tired. Pointing it out can help them become more self-aware.

Keep in mind that change is not easy and may require lots of patience, which sometimes is easier said than done. If the thumb habit is still present at age 6, enlist your dentist's help. There may be some orthodontic issues developing, so I recommend a consultation to find the most appropriate method for addressing the problem and reversing the dental effects.

Future Farmers of America is a strong organization in Navarro County. However, it's still a remarkable achievement to have three members — Carley Casbeer, Ashley Howard and Ty Tidwell — to achieve National FFA's highest honor, the American FFA Degree. "FFA has grown us into leaders and prepared us for the future," Carley said.

It's a rigorous road traveled. Candidates must have earned their State FFA Degree, hold active membership for the past three years, demonstrate leadership abilities, perform community service, participate in and graduate from a secondary instruction in an agricultural education program and help lead an outstanding supervised agricultural experience program. High school graduation with outstanding scholastic achievement is also required. Candidates apply with the approval of their state FFA association. All applications are reviewed by National FFA staff and the National FFA Board of Directors.

Carley, Ashley and Ty traveled as honored guests to the 91 st National FFA Convention and Expo held in Indianapolis, Indiana, last October. In a special ceremony, they each received a certificate and their American FFA Degree key. For Carley, the experience contained two important firsts. Accompanied by her parents, Monty and Davelyn Casbeer, and her paternal grandmother, it was her first time to fly and attend a national convention. "It was cold, but we explored the city," she recalled. "The convention was so much bigger than state conventions. President Trump came to address the group, so there were Secret Service agents and snipers."

"Getting to be a part of an organization where we all zip up our blue corduroy jackets makes me feel proud to be a part of it," Ashley remarked. "This was my first national convention, but I've attended three state conventions." Ashley was accompanied by her parents, Jonathan and Beth Howard, and her brother, who's a current member of Corsicana's FFA. "Our ag teacher, Miranda Johnson, attended the convention," Ashley added. She and her family enjoyed trying different foods and seeing the Indy racetrack, where she "kissed the bricks."

It was Ty's second national convention, and he attended with his Tarleton State University group with his mother joining them. "I work for Tarleton as a welding lab assistant," Ty explained. His parents are Chuck and Melanie Tidwell. "I was able to judge part of the convention's quiz and range competitions," Ty recalled. "We had our Tarleton bus, so we toured the city."

The three honorees are experienced and knowledgeable in agriculture-related subjects, and they agree their framed

certificates will be great additions to their résumés and help their future endeavors. As a high school freshman FFA member, Carley started showing hogs, steers, heifers and goats at the Youth Expo and competed in the food contests. "My ag teacher, Brittney Skinner-Womack, urged me to make FFA a priority, even though I was focusing on cheerleading and softball," Carley said. She served as the Corsicana FFA's historian, parliamentarian, on the officer team and, during her senior year, she was on the state nominating committee. As an area representative, she got to interview Ty for this award! Carley's working at an ag co-op in College Station, while attending Texas A&M University as an ag science major with a goal of becoming an ag teacher.

A freshman when she joined Corsicana FFA, Ashley served her chapter as sentinel, vice president and president, graduating from CHS in 2017. "Ms. Johnson helped push me to be my 110-percent best version possible." Ashley showed market hogs and a steer. She also competed in public speaking, leadership development and career development events in FFA. She was in the National Honor Society and the Calicos Dance Drill Team. A junior agriculture education major at Tarleton State University, Ashley was encouraged by her professor, Dr. David Frazier, to apply for this honor. "When he looked at my FFA record book, he told me it was very possible for me to receive the award," Ashley remembered. She worked with Dr. Frazier and Ms. Johnson to meet all the requirements. Ashley's now a Tarleton Alumni Collegiate FFA Organization member and officer.





Building and showing two trailers and showing lambs and goats at Youth Expo were Ty's choices in FFA. His college experience pushed him to complete the award's requirements. "Instead of cutting up, I had to be serious. Only I percent of FFA members achieve this level," Ty explained. "We have to graduate and commit to an agricultural career. The national board wants to see how we're using the knowledge and experience gained professionally. Through FFA, I've made so many connections. It led me to Tarleton, from which I graduated in 2018. His goal is a career as a county extension agent. "I want to be with the farmers and ranchers of my county," he said.

FFA will always stay with these three outstanding members. "It's the late nights in the welding shops with all the guys that I'll remember," Ty said. "I got to know them on a different level. Other memories include competing at all the livestock shows and interviewing with strangers successfully, while running for office. It's given me a sense of confidence to be able to explain something well."

Carley cites the late nights caring for animals in the barn as some of her best times in FFA. "I know I have ag teachers I can call on any time for help and advice," she said. Ms. Johnson kept choosing me for speaking events even though I was super shy. Now, I can speak in front of groups easily. Showing my animals has taught me time management."

The honorees thank all those involved in helping them achieve this award: Ms. Skinner-Womack, Ms. Johnson, Mark Vitters, Monica Patrick, Michelle Sammons and their parents. Ty summarized, "FFA creates students who love ag and can tell about it. It's so much more than sows, plows and cows!" NOW

"I found myself always worrying about my hair, my skin color and my height and weight," Patricia shared, recalling the years of adolescence all too well. "I didn't want the girls at Collins to ever feel that way."

In an effort to achieve her goal of keeping girls from looking down on themselves because of what someone might say and do or because of things they cannot control, she teamed up with Stephanie Howell to bring something to the campus that would affirm the girls in a positive manner. "We wanted to do something special that would raise the girls' self-esteem, instead of allowing them to walk in a state where they didn't feel good enough," Patricia said. Stephanie moved on from Collins to Corsicana ISD administration, but her heart for the young female students lives on in what they were able to bring to fruition before the school year started.

As the school year ended last year, their idea soon came to life during the short weeks of summer. Kindness Rocks was an idea that grew to encompass the girls' bathrooms. "Yes, it may sound crazy or unnecessary," Patricia explained, "but this is the one place they run to if they are angry or have had their feelings hurt. Our goal with Kindness Rocks was to provide positive affirmation when something negative comes their way."

Desiree Abreu, the artist and local business owner who transformed the bathroom into something the girls at Collins can be proud of, worked diligently alongside her husband, campus police officer Justino Abreu, during the summer, adding positive artwork to the walls and outer sides of the stall doors using stencils and a bright imagination. "She also felt a positive vibe would be a good thing," Patricia added. "I had a few quotes in mind, but Desiree came up with the remaining ones that completed the overall project."

Phrases like, "Beautiful girl, you will do amazing things!" are stenciled boldly, making them easy to see and read. The hope in the beginning was that the girls would go in the bathroom one way and come out feeling differently. "Girls have a tough time feeling beautiful, strong and invincible," Patricia stated. "These bathrooms promote positivity and show them that kindness in any form really does matter. My prayer is if they walk in any of the four bathrooms, the words will remind them to kickstart the positive feelings they have within themselves, about themselves."

Sixth-graders Jazmine Newsome and Audrey Libal are just two of many female students who have found the bathrooms to be exactly what Patricia and Stephanie hoped they would be. Jazmine remembers walking into the bathroom after a test. "I was sad because I missed a question on the test," Jazmine stated. "I asked to go to the restroom. I read the words on the wall and went back to class happy."

Audrey recalls the time early in the school year when she was talking to a fellow student. "She cut me off in midsentence. She didn't allow me to finish my thought," Audrey said, remembering how invisible it made her feel at the time. "The wall art in the bathroom reminded me that I have more than one friend, and that my thoughts and feelings do matter." Both girls agreed — the bathroom at Collins is preparing them for middle school.

Patricia's hope is that the words on the wall will not be forgotten once they move on to junior high. "I don't want them to ever forget how special they are," she said. "We are all different, but we are all special!" said Patricia, who is looking forward to bringing the same positivity to the boy's bathrooms in the near future.

Principal Scott Doring couldn't agree more. He, too, believes in offering a positive atmosphere to all Collins Intermediate School students. "The positive messages in the bathrooms idea is an excellent way to boost our young ladies' self-esteem," he said, "and hopefully the messages will brighten their days."



- I cup sour cream
- 2 1/2 cups cheddar cheese, shredded, or more to taste
- 4 Tbsp. butter, melted (divided use)
- 1 10-oz. can cream of chicken soup
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- 1 1/2 cups corn flakes

 Preheat the oven to 350 F. Prepare a 9x13-inch casserole dish with cooking spray.
 Pour the frozen shredded potatoes into a large microwavable mixing bowl. Microwave for 2-3 minutes to thaw the potatoes; remove from microwave.

Slow Cooker Cowboy Potato Casserole

6 medium red potatoes, cut into

- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. pepper
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, minced 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef, browned
- and drained
- I 16-oz. can red kidney beans, drained and rinsed
- I 14-oz. can diced tomatoes with green chilies, undrained
- 1/4 cup water
- 4 oz. shredded cheese, or more to taste

I. Add the potatoes, salt and pepper to a slow cooker. Add the onion and garlic; then add the beef, beans and tomatoes; pour water over all ingredients.

2. Cover; cook on low for 7-8 hours; sprinkle on cheese during the last 15 minutes. Re-cover for remaining time; serve.



Lift your glass for a toast: To life! And give three cheers for destiny — a concept Americans hardly discuss anymore. Since accomplishing our manifest destiny, we tour distant places on a roundtrip ticket, sure that our final destination is home sweet home.

Yet, there is a spot on this planet that has been and will be home to countless generations. And its doors are open to visitors year-round. Israel's heartland, otherwise known as Samaria and Judea, has welcomed intrepid travelers ever since Abraham left Ur Kaśdim (commonly translated as Ur of the Chaldees) for Canaan. But the 40-mile-wide swath of land, with Jerusalem in its center, is especially popular now that agritourism is trendy.

Participating in farm activities while touring this part of the Middle East provides a balanced approach to travel. Seasonally, there are grapes to prune in the winter and harvest in the summer — when figs are also easy to find — and olives to pick in the fall. Organic olive orchards, planted near vineyards equidistant between the Dead Sea and Jerusalem, experience pure sunshine throughout the year.

One reputable organization that has developed relationships with multiple local farmers is HaYovel.com, based in the United States. Since Israel's Hebrew-speaking populace rests every Saturday, and prepares for the Sabbath on Fridays, agritourists only work a few days per week and then give their bodies a rest while investigating various aspects of the region's art, archaeology and appetite.

Health nuts can smell, taste and hear the story of the Saboneto family of organic soaps after driving northeast of Jerusalem to Kochav HaShachar. Foodies will be fascinated by the cuisine throughout Israel. Small cafés with spicy, healthy meats and vegetables are usually ensconced near museums, synagogues, marketplaces and gas stations.

In Jerusalem, larger restaurants like Ima's cater to tourists visiting Israel's center of government, the Knesset. Throughout the day, kiosks pressing juices from fresh pomegranates make a nice alternative to the ubiquitous coffee break. And it's always a treat to start mornings with a visit to the *shuk* (fresh market) in Jerusalem, where cheeses and candies unlike any other are bought in the thousands by people who plan to share them in their own restaurants or homes.

Afternoons and evenings are perfect times to visit the wineries that are popping up throughout the country. Sixteen years ago, Samaria and Judea had only a few small vineyards serving individual families. Now, more than 350 acres are planted with fruitful vines, and a million bottles of wine are produced annually. This is partly because volunteer agritourists are empowering the wine industry's growth. Psagot Winery, close to Beit El (Bethel) northwest of Jerusalem, is a modern gem boasting wide-open views of rock-studded mountains.



Kabir Winery, farther north in Elon Moreh, feels a bit more "ancient." Maybe that is because its vintner, Eliav Hillel, is also a scribe. Nearby, the settlement of Itamar, established in 1984, is at the forefront of Israel's organic agriculture.

Forty miles north, you can wine and dine in Tiberias, where a 10th-century crusader castle now hosts a nightclub. Not far up the shore of the Sea of Galilee, viewing fine and modern art in Ginosar's Museum of the Galilee can precede an invigorating swim in the harp-shaped lake. A little farther north, Capernaum provides history buffs an abundance of beautiful ruins to study. And the beaches of Ein Gev invite families and individuals to simply chill.

No matter how much you enjoy traveling independently, you'll glean more of the depth and breadth of Israel's nature, history and culture by traveling with a guide who lives in the land. Michael Bar-Neder (annbn@012.net.il) specializes in guiding mentally and physically challenged people, as well as families, on tours of biblical Israel. Maayan Usva Cohen (pathsofisrael@gmail.com) guides both on contemporary political issues and in the biblical landscapes of Judea and Samaria, and can also take you on off-road adventures in her jeep. Ask for recommendations when you start planning your trip to the heartland of Israel with the Shomron Regional Council at www.tourshomron.org.il.
