

Let's play!




ICOLOR

Many years prior to the color explosion of the '60s, '70s and '80s, David Gregory created unique pieces of art using a multicolored technique that brings new life to old things. "I call it refashioning," David shared. "The colors I use make people happy."

David's driven personality has caused him to be a very driven artist — an artist who feels the need to paint every day. "An artist paints because he has to paint," David stated. "I am an artist, so I do try to paint something each day."





At one time, David called Winston Salem, North Carolina, home. He opened an antique store. "I set up shop in a section of town with little foot traffic," he recalled. "I had several colorful pieces I'd created on display."

Stories about customers are many. One lady told him he couldn't paint like this — using such bright colors and strange designs. She even asked him if he knew what a color wheel was. "I told her I'd never taken an art course, that I was self-taught. She said she could tell," he remembered all too well. Another man came in and quickly covered his son's eyes. "He told his son not to look, that this is what happens when someone gets hooked on drugs."





He can laugh about the comments now, but at the time, he took the negative comments to heart, closing the store and returning to Texas. The artistic bug returned in 2017, when David retaught himself how to paint. "It was the technical part of painting that I had to reteach myself," he said. "As an abstract artist, I never really lost my creativity, when it comes to color and design, but I did forget how to hold my paintbrush comfortably." David is a firm believer that artists don't live by a certain set of rules, and most artists who paint from their heart feel limited when put in a "color wheel" box.

David made a trip to Wal-Mart to purchase brushes and acrylic paint. He sat down in the garage in the home he shares with his sister and retaught himself how to paint. The first item he refashioned upon his return to creating was a snow ski. He wanted to paint a linear object that related to a sport that would still convey motion and energy when complete. "I wanted the colors in my art to produce a more profound motion and energy," David explained. "I laid the ski across my bed and painted it. When an artist needs to paint, they will paint wherever they can."

David's creations are spontaneous and on purpose. His goal has always been to take something old and, many times, discarded — like shoes, wallets, watches, suitcases and



"I buy most of my items at garage sales and thrift stores," he admitted. "I don't usually paint shoes, unless they are 20-40 years old. A pointed pair of Donald Pliner shoes costs me \$4 today, but back in the day, those same shoes were \$400." David knows this because years ago, he used to sell upscale shoes.

Shoes that David had in his own closet inspired him to move forward, allowing the artist within to get out. "I had shoes in my closet I still wanted to wear, but they were out of style," he said. "I preferred to wear the ones I already had instead of buying new ones."

He smiled as he remembered the hard lesson learned with the first pair of shoes he painted. "The paint on that first pair cracked," he confessed. "I quickly learned that there are two types of acrylic paint. I went back to the store and purchased the acrylic paint made specifically for leather."

David's color schemes and overall design choices are dictated by the objects he paints. And in many cases, he finds great pleasure in painting sets. According to David, a set for


AT HOME WITH KELLY & ROXANNE MARTIN

A tricycle, trampoline, swing set and fenced and gated front yard keep the grandkids happy, safe and busy. Birds flock to the bird baths and houses, providing plenty for the couple to watch as they relax with the grandkids on the porch.

Kelly and Roxanne built a barn, first for horses, but they now plan on housing show or pigmy goats for the grandchildren. "We've put in the pool, the carport and a breezeway, and we enclosed the garage to create more space in the house," she said. "The grandkids are like fish in this pool, but we keep a custom-made net over it to keep from having a tragic accident. It will catch them if they fall in just like a spider's web catches an insect."



The pool is landscaped with large decorative rocks, fountains, a bright fence and palm trees. The breezeway provides comfortable seating throughout all the seasons of the year. Roxanne's workshop, which adjoins the carport, is where she creates decorative crosses. "I house my paints in my dad's old gun cabinet," she explained. The family's two cats, Punk and Smoke, hang out here.

A Western and cowboy theme runs through the home's decor. "It's natural for us since my mom was a barrel racer, and my grandpa rode trail," Roxanne revealed. Saddles and tack lay in honor on stands. The walls are decorated with a longhorn, Texas flag and Lonesome Dove sign. "Kelly's a big Dallas Cowboys fan," Roxanne said. "He's only missed one game — the Superbowl — when we got married." The couple enjoys decorating and entertaining during Christmas and Thanksgiving. "We put up three to four Christmas trees, and Kelly gave me the Christmas village that's in the china cabinet," Roxanne said. "All the other dishes were my mom and dad's or my grandmother's."

Roxanne's cross creations decorate one living room wall. "I used my grandmother's vintage jewelry to decorate my favorite cross," she added. Photos of the grandbabies are displayed among the crosses and Kelly's childhood wooden sleigh is displayed beneath them. The kitchen with its breakfast bar is a hub of activity when grandkids get hungry.

An office holds more family treasures. "The chair was made by my great-grandpa, and this is my dad's Army chest," Roxanne pointed out. "It's just old stuff with lots of memories, but this room is quiet and peaceful."

The sitting room is where they spend most of their time. "We chill out here while drinking our morning coffee, and we love watching the birds," Roxanne said. "This is our view on the world."

The hallway to bedrooms and a Western-themed bathroom holds photos of their daughters, grandkids and those who have passed onward. "I love to scrapbook, but that hobby takes lots of time," Roxanne admitted.

Granddaughters can't help but have sweet dreams in their bedroom decorated in pink, blues and sparkles. Vintage glass doorknobs hold little girls' treasures and a dollhouse is ready for play. Roxanne's first canvas painting of horses lives here, and a pink cowgirl hat is ready for dress-up play.

Kelly remarked, "We enjoy living here. We have good neighbors."

"I have had the same neighbors for as long as I've been here, and that's great," Roxanne agreed. "We love life in Palmer and Ennis. It's home."

Serving Those Who Served

Every Memorial Day weekend, flags and flowers are placed with honor at U.S. military veterans' graves in Myrtle Cemetery, Ennis Memorial Cemetery, St. Joseph Catholic Cemetery and Crisp Cemetery. It's the work of Alex Wensowitch, who reflected, "I didn't serve, but I take joy in getting to serve those who did serve this country. It's my way of paying back."

An Ennis native, Alex's dad immigrated to the United States following WWII. "He came through the Church World Service Organization," Alex recalled. "Citizenship was valued in my family, since my father was Boy Scout Counselor for the Citizenship Merit Badges."

Through their daughters' high school activities, Alex and Perry Giles met, and Alex became involved in searching for information on deceased Ellis County veterans from WWI through the Global War on Terrorism. "I've been 'allowed' to help Perry since 2000," Alex quipped. "Perry owns Giles Monument Company in Waxahachie and is responsible for many of the veterans' memorials in Ellis County. My searches have allowed me to meet a lot of people."

The search is on for any veteran who died, no matter the cause of death, while in the service of his or her country. The Internet, especially the National Archives website, is helpful, but Alex also seeks out the veteran's relatives. "Family photos, letters and other documents are wonderful," Alex said. Just like all genealogists know, however, sometimes the searches are lengthy. "I spent 11 years searching on one individual," Alex commented.

One of his more memorable searches was that of Jessie F. Cleveland, who was killed on WWII D-Day's Omaha Beach. "Through the Internet, I found the commander of his boat team," Alex recalled. "The commander remembered where and when Jessie was killed. They were in an Army unit that was the precursor to the Navy Seals."

Another search revealed that Edgar Earl McElroy was a pilot on Plane 13 during the Doolittle Raid over Tokyo, Japan, in 1942. "Other useful information is available in the Air Force's missing crew reports," Alex explained. "The military keeps detailed records and much of the world wars' information has been declassified and made public."

Reluctant to take credit for his volunteer work, Alex added, "Jimmy and Ginger Boon have given me their personal support, and the late Jim Templin motivated me and gave his support when I was getting started. My wife, Janis, is also very supportive."

Alex and Janis have two grown children and three grandchildren. "My searches started in 2000, when our youngest graduated from high school. I needed something to fill my time," Alex revealed. A foreman for a Dallasbased pipeline construction company, Alex serves as the Crisp Cemetery Association's treasurer and is a member of the Ellis County Veterans Memorial Committee. Alex is also a member of First Presbyterian Church in Ennis. Janis is a member of St. John Catholic Church.

With 57 searches completed, to date, Alex's work will continue onward, especially into his retirement years. "There are so many avenues to explore," Alex said. "The majority of Ennis veterans are from the WWII era, but I know there's still a lot of research to do. We have over 300 names on the memorial at the Waxahachie Civic Center, but we know that's not a complete listing. I would be interested in hearing from other Ellis County veterans' family members."

Alex is open to making his research public. "In the future, I might work with a university, such as the University of North Texas. It has the means and capability to place our research on its portal," he stated.

Respect for veterans is paramount. "I use the Old Guard Ceremony from Arlington National Cemetery," Alex said. "Relatives should know their deceased is remembered." **NOW**

Newer Investors: Don't Panic if Bear Market Returns

If you're in your 20s or 30s, you might be starting to focus more on investing to reach your financial goals. Because of this, you also may be more attuned to moves in the financial markets.

Depending on your age, you may have only experienced the bull market of the past nine years, so you might not know what to expect — or how to respond — whenever the next bear market strikes.

Of course, just recently, you've witnessed a market correction — a drop of at least 10 percent in the major stock market indices, such as the S&P 500. This sudden plunge made big news and reminded many investors of how volatile the financial markets can be. But a full-fledged bear market usually isn't identified until the markets are down 20 percent from their recent highs. Plus, bear markets, unlike corrections, tend to linger for a while.

The last "bear" emerged from hibernation in October 2007 and stayed on the prowl until early March 2009. During that time, the S&P 500 declined by about 50 percent. Clearly, investors were not happy, but the market recovered and moved to new heights. This long and strong run-up may have obliterated your bear market memories, if you ever had them at all. And that's why you might want to familiarize yourself with some of the bare facts about bear markets: Bear markets may provide good buying opportunities. When gas is expensive, you may just buy a few gallons at a time, but when the price falls, you're probably more likely to fill up your tank. The same principle can apply to investing — when stock prices are down, your investment dollars will buy more shares. And the more shares you own, the greater your ability to build wealth once the share price rises. In short, a bear market may provide you with a chance to buy quality investments at good prices.

Bear markets don't last forever. No one can predict precisely how long bear markets will run, but they've typically been much shorter than bull markets. So, while you might not particularly like looking at your investment statement during a decline, you can take some comfort in knowing such downturns are a normal feature of the investment landscape.

Bear markets don't affect all investments equally. If you only own U.S. stocks, your portfolio may well take a sizable hit during a bear market. But other types of investment vehicles may not be as directly affected, and some may even show positive results. Consequently, you could reduce the bear's "bite" if you also own a variety of other investments, such as international stocks, bonds, government securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on. However, while owning this type of diversified portfolio can help reduce the impact of market volatility, it does not guarantee profits or protect against losses.

A bear market can be challenging. But by making the right moves, such as staying patient, looking for buying opportunities and maintaining a diversified portfolio, you may be able to prevent a market decline from becoming unbearable. **NOW**
