Many people are battling cancer every day, but some find ways to fight against more than their own diagnosis. They fight against cancer's ability to ruin a life and take away joy. Midlothian resident Jade Laswell was fighting other people's challenges long before she ever received a diagnosis herself. In caring for people who are dealing with everything from sickness and poverty to natural disasters, Jade crafts hope every day.

Jade grew up in Arlington and earned a speech degree while playing basketball at Tarleton State University, before her career path fell into her lap. "After college, I was working as an admissions counselor at UTSA [The University of Texas at San Antonio]. A friend convinced me to apply for a teaching job," she explained. "Now, 18 years later, I've taught everything from speech communications to engineering."









After starting as a speech teacher, Jade spent seven years staying home with her kids before getting back into the classroom almost a decade ago. She and her husband, Dustin, have four kids: Julia, Makena, Keegan and Chloe. They both work for Arlington ISD, where Jade teaches at a middle school, and Dustin is a teacher and football coach.

Aside from a life of teaching and raising a family, Jade got into blogging about a decade ago. "I would read blogs about craft projects people were doing, and I realized we could do more with our crafting. I prayed about it and got the idea for Craft Hope," she detailed. "So, in 2009, I put out a challenge for us to make pillowcase dresses to send to an orphanage in Mexico. That first





project, we sent 29 dresses with a mission team, and we kept going from there."

After that first project, Jade and her online friends made 400 handmade dolls to send to Nicaragua, and Craft Hope picked up momentum. "I created a website, plus Facebook was really taking off, so I started growing a network of people who would make items that we could send to people who were in need," she recounted. "In addition to making items myself, I coordinate people creating everything from bracelets and scarves to care packages to send to people who need them. Often, we can get church groups, Scout troops and even schools to get involved in helping others." As large as Craft Hope has become, Jade still has everything sent to her house, where her family and friends stuff items into packages to be sent around the globe.

Jade used her voice online and in the community to unite people for the purpose of bringing hope where it seemed to be missing. She even wrote a book that expanded her audience. "A friend knew someone in the business, so I was approached by Sterling Publishing about writing a Craft Hope book," she said. "I wrote the copy, and then we included 26 different craft projects that people could make."

Within just a few years, people around the world were crafting hope for others, all thanks to a simple idea Jade got while blogging herself. After years of spreading hope, Jade received her own cancer diagnosis. "At my first mammogram, they discovered something," she shared. "It was very early, so the doctors said we had options, but I wanted to do all we could. I had surgery and chemotherapy, and after a few months, they said I was cancer free."

During the days of chemo, she was encouraged in a way that helped her attitude. "When I was diagnosed, I prayed a lot, but I was mad," she admitted. "I was in the waiting room, and they gave me a little care package, just like something Craft Hope would make."

Jade had done projects for cancer patients before, but it took on a new meaning after she had to start her own treatment. "I can't do quite as much, but my children and husband help me keep going. Honestly, Craft Hope is therapy for me," she explained. "My motto has always been: When things get hard, craft hope.""

Earlier this year, Jade went in for what was supposed to be one of her last reconstruction surgeries, but they discovered that the cancer had returned. "I'm having to do radiation, since I didn't do that last time," she detailed. "I teach in the morning, then go to treatment in the afternoon. And I got connected to the Dallas Cowboys, who have made me part of their family," she continued. "Last year, I was named one of their 'Star Survivors,' so we got to go to the Star, watch the Cowboys practice and spent a day getting spoiled by the Dallas Cowboys. We were even recognized at their survivor football game in the fall. I've gotten letters and an incredible care package from Coach Garrett and the Dallas Cowboys family and Cowboys PR rep Emily Robbins expressing their support while I fight."

Although projects may have decreased slightly in the last two years because of treatments, Jade has no plan to stop the momentum Craft Hope has built over the last decade. "With me as the sole person leading the charge, we've been able to send over 100,000 items to people all over the world," she said. "It hasn't been God's plan yet, but I'd love be able to travel abroad on a trip to hand deliver our goodies. I have been able to see it grow into a massive global charity that sends hope to thousands of people."



great-grandparents and grandfather had lived. "Our neighborhood actually selected us. Our last duty station was in Key West, where Pete was an instructor at the Special Forces Underwater Operations Schoolhouse. We were looking for a home but had been having no luck," Emily recalled. "My mom came across an available home, and we signed the papers, sight unseen."

That was the Bartoseks' first Midlothian house, which they rented for two years while wondering

where they would find their forever home. Ironically, the answer to that question was just five houses away. In 2017, they bought a three-bedroom, 2,600-square-foot home just down the block from their rental.

"I really loved the driveway. It sounds silly, but it's always what I dreamed of having when I got to move home," Emily admitted about finding their dream house on its 5-acre lot. "It's very long and set back off the street. I think it sets the tone for the peacefulness that we feel when we get to our property."





Peacefulness is important to Pete, too, who still serves as a Green Beret in the National Guard. "When I'm at training or gone for deployment, I know my family will lack for nothing, because of the amazing people in this town," Pete said. "I know I don't have to worry about them."

A mixture of comfort and tradition, the Bartosek home is intended to feel welcoming. "I've always loved pieces with history,

while still maintaining a comfortable home that we actually live in, and not tiptoe through," Emily described. "Our favorite room as a family is definitely the living room. We spend a lot of time together there, in front of the fireplace."

While their former lifestyle did not lend itself to building large collections that had to move from place to place, the Bartoseks did manage to keep a number of family heirlooms. "With







a lot of moves under our belt, there's not been much collecting, although antique furniture pieces from both sides of the family are throughout our home," Pete noted.

Thanks to Pete's decision to end his enlistment so his family could settle in one place, the Bartosek children are better able to consider building collections in their new home. Daughter, Elliot, entering eighth grade at Walnut Grove Middle School, and son, Abel, an incoming sophomore at Midlothian Heritage High School, showcase their personalities within their rooms. "Their rooms are their space, so they've each got their own spin on things," Pete said.

Elliot has her room completely organized and decorated to her own taste. "She has her volleyball memorabilia up and is into special effects makeup, so she has a little vanity and practice area in her space," Emily described.

Abel plays baseball for MHHS, so several bats and memorabilia from when he was little through presentday are displayed. He also plays guitar and has several guitars in his space. Abel enjoys spending time with Pete in a workshop on their land. "It's their happy place," Emily said.

In their home for less than a year, the Bartoseks still have many goals for the property. "We want to add a pool and another large living space. We've always been the house where all the kids' friends come to hang out, so adding a pool is important to us," Emily admitted.




Pete added, "One day we will remodel, but we spend so much time outside, that that's really more of a priority for us right now."

With their home locale settled, the Bartoseks were able to focus on building their own businesses. "We own Veteran and Son, a property improvement business. We have contracts with homeowners' associations, do property preservation for investors, do individual lawns every season, and we have a rolloff dumpster rental business," Pete noted.

In addition to staying involved in their children's activities, Emily is a founding member of Ellis County Women in Business, and she and Pete are involved with the Midlothian Chamber of Commerce. Pete also volunteers with Special Operations Wounded Warriors — for veterans dealing with traumatic disabilities and PTSD — taking hunting trips, supporting operator spouses and children and connecting wounded operators with highly trained service dogs.

The couple believes the decision to put down roots in Texas was the best thing they could have done for their family. "Our favorite thing about the city is the people. From the oldtimers to the newcomers, everyone has a story to be told. I think that everyone in this melting pot has so much value to add to our lives and the children's lives," Emily said. "We feel extremely lucky to come home to Midlothian after so many years of service to the nation." NOW

## Reel Deal

Casting lines on serene waters is how those who enjoy fishing like to spend a day. For Gilbert Miller, the sport became more than a hobby, however. The U.S. Army veteran made it a second career, then agreed to share his knowledge with students interested in the lessons the sport offers. "I know two things: The Army and fishing. I think I can make a positive impact with the skills both gave me," Gilbert said.

Gilbert began serving as boat captain for members of the Midlothian High School fishing team last year, after a neighbor noticed him working on tackle outside his home. "They drove by many times, then decided to stop. Their son came to talk to me about helping with the fishing program," Gilbert explained.

As a result, Gilbert joined the program, which doubled to 10 teams of two this year and is expected to increase in members this fall. "Last year, I saw the team got tired quickly. Now they

know what food and drinks to bring to stay energized, and they come with their tackle prepped," Gilbert noted.

Originally from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Gilbert believes 21 years in the Army made him suited to serve as boat captain for aspiring anglers. He got serious about bass fishing while stationed in Hawaii, where he joined his first bass club. Transferred to Ft. Hood, Texas, there he became a boat owner. Now on boat number four, he has countless tournaments and fishing successes under his belt. The sport even became a side business through which he sells tackle and gear at fishing shows, tournaments and online.

These industry connections allow Gilbert to pursue sponsors and schedule workshops for the team. "I've brought in a professional — Gary Klein — for demonstrations and sponsors to help some with team expenses," Gilbert said.

Not a UIL sport, fishing is not funded by the district, according to Gilbert. While students must meet grade requirements and make up work missed due to absences for tournaments, they also are required to secure their own boats, pay for tournaments, jerseys and tackle. "Several volunteers are involved already, but we're always in need of more, or

any additional Midlothian businesses willing to sponsor with money and/or supplies," Gilbert said.

Some recruiting has begun at the middle school level, with hopes of growing the program even more. While the MHS team was all boys this year, Gilbert said girls are encouraged to participate as well. "In the military and in fishing, I found that females are excellent listeners. That's important in fishing, where you really have to pay attention to a lot more than people realize," Gilbert explained.

While modern boats are equipped with technology that helps track the best waters, Gilbert said aspiring anglers must do their homework. "You study maps and weather. You learn stages of fish life. You follow patterns of fish movement. You practice in relation to all this information," Gilbert explained. "Like anything, there is some luck involved, but it's not just luck. And it never hurts to listen to someone who knows what they're talking about."

From fishing with his grandfather as a child to creating a business from the sport, Gilbert is happy to use his knowledge helping local youth. "This gives kids another outlet besides traditional sports, and some colleges are even offering scholarships. Fishing is something people actually make a living at. It's a billion-dollar industry," Gilbert said.

When not assisting the team, Gilbert enjoys time with his wife, Rhonda, winemaking, grilling and tinkering with tackle. "I guess growing up where there was no grass or trees, now I enjoy everything about being outdoors," he admitted.

And Gilbert is glad he has fishing to share with the next generation. "It teaches you problem solving, patience and adaptability," he said. "I've been really impressed with this generation's interest in creating change, and thinking outside the box can help them with that goal."







Krystal Hughes has always been environmentally conscious, and her dedication to planet earth is Midlothian's gain. This lifelong local has taken to her hometown streets, quite literally, developing the group Midlothian Goes Green. "Around Christmastime last year, it clicked that we should stop theorizing on ways we can do better as a worldwide society and start making an action plan that starts where we are, with what we have. That's when Midlothian Goes Green 2018 really started taking shape," Krystal recalled.

Krystal sat down with her husband, Thomas, and thought about changes from the smallest individual level, all the way up to local government and beyond. "Phase One is raising awareness and encouraging individual participation. This is where our Litter Pick Up Parties came into play," Krystal said. "If everyone understood that making change can be as easy as spending half an hour outside in the sunshine picking up loose trash, I don't think it would take long for everyone to join in."

Making litter control cool has been one of MGG's main objectives, which is why, with the help of Keep Midlothian Beautiful, the City Wide Clean Up Day became a party-atmosphere event this spring. "It's been so encouraging to see how many families, groups and individuals have gone out to do their part without any prompting simply because picking up litter has gotten a lot of positive attention in our town lately," Krystal said, noting that some residents had taken to social media, asking who should pick up the city's roadside trash. "Now, I think people are realizing that it's everyone's responsibility, that we all need to get

Krystal has since focused on cleaning the stretch of Hwy. 1387 between the S-curve and Heritage High School. "My husband comes out to join me. It's been a lot of fun! We go out any time the weather and our schedule allow, even if it's just for an hour or so," she noted.



The next phase of Midlothian Goes Green 2018 is getting local businesses and organizations involved in reducing litter before it begins. "This means encouraging restaurants to give straws, condiment packets, togo silverware, etc., only when they're requested, or using biodegradable to-go containers and supplies that won't float around for the rest of eternity," Krystal explained. "We'll also be encouraging businesses to go paperless, or to make changes to their internal workings to reduce their

environmental impact."

A little bit of education goes a long way, and Krystal believes locally owned businesses will be on board. "Plus, what a great selling point!

more progress we're going to make," Krystal said. "When Midlothian Goes Green transitions into other phases, there will be a strong group to keep the previous phases going and thriving. It's going to be a truly sustainable system!"

Krystal is dedicated to her part in that system, even beyond litter pickup. "I always knew that when my business, Jane Dough Bake House, became a storefront, that it needed to be as sustainable as humanly possible," she said. "My husband and I have been brainstorming ways to use solar power, renewable containers, using the landscape to provide edible ingredients, as well as be a place to sustain the bees and boost carbon absorption."

The Hugheses know there is much that can be improved to make the world more livable for future generations, starting in their own community. "I've watched Midlothian grow and become this exciting little hub of activity. I believe there is an undiscovered well of potential for being a green city here, too," Krystal said. "How cool would it be to say that we are the most sustainable city in the DFW area, as well as having these awesome new developments, like Founder's Row and the Farmstead?"

To that end, Krystal ensures she and the Midlothian Goes Green movement will do their part. "We've got some great things on the horizon, and I believe that we can be the best version of ourselves if we all make the conscious decision to put our best, most green foot forward."

To participate, one need only pick an area and get cleaning. Posting one's efforts on city social media is also encouraged. "I love to look online and see how someone went out on their own and picked up three bags of litter," Krystal said. "It's been great to see such a big shift in people's attitudes in such a short amount of time!"

#### **Buffalo Chicken Pinwheels**

Makes 35-40.

1/4 cup bleu cheese crumbles 1 cup cheddar cheese, shredded 8 oz. cream cheese, softened 2 Tbsp. sour cream

1/2 cup buffalo wing sauce

2 cups cooked chicken breast, chopped into 1/8- to 1/4-inch chunks

3 10- to 12-inch tortillas, softened 1/2 cup chives or green onions, sliced

- **I.** Combine the bleu cheese, cheddar cheese, cream cheese, sour cream and wing sauce. Mix thoroughly; add chicken.
- **2.** Divide the mixture into thirds; spoon each 1/3 into 1 of the 3 tortillas. Spread evenly over the tortilla: tightly roll each tortilla from one side to the other until it looks like a rolled enchilada.
- **3.** Refrigerate rolls for 4-6 hours. Remove; slice each roll into 1/4- to 1/2-inch slices. Do not crush or misshape the pinwheels.

**4.** Lay the pinwheels on a platter; garnish with the chives or green onions.

#### Red, White and Bleu Cheese Coleslaw

3/4 cup real mayonnaise

1/2 cup sour cream

1/2 cup bleu cheese crumbles

2 Tbsp. apple cider vinegar

1/2 tsp. kosher salt

1/2 tsp. coarse ground black pepper

1/2 head white cabbage, shredded

1/2 head red cabbage, shredded I small Vidalia onion, sliced

**1.** In a large bowl, mix the mayonnaise, sour cream, bleu cheese, vinegar, salt and pepper.

- 2. Add the white and red cabbage and onion; fold together until ingredients are coated well.
- **3.** Tip: Use fresh, clean rubber gloves to mix by hand to get an even coating.

#### Fettucine Alfredo

Serves 4-6.

1 lb. fettucine pasta

4 Tbsp. unsalted butter

2 tsp. garlic, minced

2 tsp. chicken base

3 cups heavy cream

1/2 tsp. kosher salt

1/2 tsp. white pepper

1/4 bunch fresh parsley, chopped

1/4 cup Parmesan cheese, grated

- **I.** Cook pasta in boiling water for 10 minutes. Immediately drain; cool. Pasta must be al dente (soft, but still slightly firm in the middle of the pasta).
- 2. In a 12-inch skillet, melt the butter; add garlic and the chicken base. When the garlic is heated, add the heavy cream, salt and pepper; simmer.
- 3. Add parsley and Parmesan cheese, whisking until mixed well and mixture begins to thicken.
- **4.** Add pasta. Toss; serve in a bowl.

#### Hatch Chile Queso

Makes 10-20 servings as an appetizer.

5 Tbsp. unsalted butter 10 Hatch chiles, roasted and chopped I shallot, finely diced 5 Tbsp. all-purpose flour 2 1/2 cups whole milk 20 oz. Monterrey Jack cheese, grated 1 tsp. salt

#### I tsp. pepper Tortilla chips, to taste

- **I.** In a stockpot, melt the butter; add the chiles and shallots. Cook until the shallots are translucent.
- **2.** Add flour; mix to form a roux. Slowly whisk in the milk; mix well, leaving no lumps in the roux.
- **3.** Add the cheese, salt and pepper, stirring constantly until the cheese is melted to prevent sticking to the pan's bottom.
- **4.** Serve in a bowl with tortilla chips on the side.

#### Meatballs

Makes 16 2-oz. meatballs.

2 Tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil

2 lbs. 85/15 ground beef

2 eggs

1/2 cup white onion, finely diced

1 Tbsp. garlic, minced

2 tsp. dried basil

2 tsp. dried parsley

2 tsp. dried thyme

2 tsp. dried oregano

2 tsp. dried fennel seed

1 Tbsp. garlic powder

1 tsp. crushed red pepper

4 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce

1 tsp. kosher salt

I tsp. black pepper

1/4 cup Parmesan cheese, grated


1/2 cup fine breadcrumbs

1 8-oz. can tomato sauce (divided use)

- **1.** Preheat oven to 400 F; coat a baking dish with olive oil.
- **2.** Combine all ingredients, reserving 4 oz. of the tomato sauce: mix well.
- **3.** Using rubber gloves, roll out 16 meatballs; place in the prepared baking dish.
- **4.** Using a spoon or brush, top each meatball with the reserved tomato sauce.
- **5.** Bake for approximately 20 minutes, or until internal temperature reaches 165 F.

collect your stamps and enjoy a special prize at the end.






road in town, Aubrey had a unique opportunity that has given her a new perspective on one of the tenets of democracy — voting.

"Technically we are a courier service, but the focus is bringing restaurant-quality meals to your doorstep," Joey explained. But, as customers can attest, food is hardly all Joey offers.

Today he regularly visits homebound and hospitalized residents just to check on them, and he is often called on to help people in need. For instance, during Hurricane Harvey, he heard about a volleyball team stranded at a nearby Holiday Inn and delivered a cart full of necessities that were purchased for the team.

Joey also believes in employing young adults to give them a head start, or stay-at-home moms trying to help with the family's income without losing too much time with their children. Focusing on serving his hometown, he is thankful for local restaurant partnerships, whose menus are available on his website.

Joey supports Manna House through canned food drives via his website as well, and he is open to most suggestions that help him help Midlothian. "I started the company with the sole intention of giving back to this awesome community that has contributed so much to me. I felt it was my duty to give back any way I could," Joey said. "I can think of so many people who can be helped through a business like this, and I'm excited for all the possibilities!" **NOW**
