



practice for the golf team at the Corsicana Country Club. "This is a great place to raise kids. Moving from life in the Detroit area to Corsicana, I didn't know if I would adjust to the smalltown life, but here I still am, and I love it," he remarked.

"Our pride and joy at home is the outdoor kitchen and pool," Terri said. "When we moved here, the kids were between ages 5 to 17. We've watched them grow up with their friends, as they gathered to swim or before or after events. Steve's the barbecuer. We like to gather in our staycation pool area that we landscaped ourselves." A blending of the couple's two cultures, plus a bit of Texan decor lends a backdrop to Steve's Christmas-Grinchlike humorously unsuccessful attempt to string holiday lights.

On Christmas Eve, the family pours through the exterior leaded glass mahogany doors, guided by the flickering gas porch lights. "The doors are a reminder of my parents' home in Mississippi, and my cane collection is ready for use whenever we might need it," Terri quipped.

The guys gather in the back den to watch sports, and the ladies enjoy the family room with its fireplace and no television. "I wanted this room to be for visiting and laughter," Terri said. "The family room is special because Steve and I renewed our vows there on our 20th anniversary with the family present. I'm very big on traditions and find English and Italian antiques comfortable and inviting."

The galley-style kitchen buzzes busily during gatherings. Its tile floor, like





the scored concrete and wood floors throughout the home, is practical and beautiful. Terri made all the garlands that decorate each room, including the one on an antique bookcase that came from an old CISD school.

Steve's study is decorated with a Christmas tree loaded with treasures and comfortable throws across antique chairs. "This is a cozy, very Old-World place for us to sit and work," Terri said.

The formal dining room's table expands exponentially when needed. "The antique hardware cabinet was my first antique purchase when I was 18 years old," Terri said. "I used it in my decorating and gift shop business that I opened on my 20th birthday"

The couple's master bedroom is a relaxing retreat with its fireplace and French windows and doors leading to a private courtyard. Chairs with musical carvings and two special family paintings — one of Steve and his two brothers, the other of Terri and her two sisters — are treasures from the couple's moms. A son-in-law did the master bath's stonework, and its brass sinks and mirrors are from Mississippi.





The picture we imagine of the jolly old elf in Clement Clarke Moore's famous poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas" may not be the best description of the modern-day Santas who have been providing bicycles for Corsicana area children for the past 20 years — until we look at their hearts. Brian Butler leads a group of volunteers who begin working toward a special Christmas for deserving children during early autumn each year.

Jimmy and Tammy Parham and the 31 Kings Motorcycle Club started collecting bicycles for Corsicana children in 2000. "Everywhere we went, kids would come around admiring our motorcycles. We decided we wanted to try to make a difference in these kids' lives. We thought about different kinds of toys, but we could not decide what kind of toys, and we were looking at a pretty wide age range of kids. We decided on bicycles because every kid likes a bike. That first year, we gave away 25 bicycles," Jimmy remembered.



Brian was Jimmy's neighbor when the motorcycle club ran with the idea. Jimmy recalled with laughter that Brian called himself the 32nd King, but he could not join the club without a motorcycle. One year, Jimmy specifically asked Brian to help, so he could understand the joy associated with the project. Jimmy and his wife had moved to Grand Prairie but wanted to see the project continue. At the end of one week, Jimmy called Brian and told him he had raised \$2,000, and he wanted Brian to go with him to purchase some bikes. Later, Jimmy called Brian again and Brian had raised \$2,500. He understood the joy.

"Seeing the happiness in the kids' faces is what keeps the project going," both men agreed. "With my move to Grand Prairie, Brian has overseen the project for the past eight years. He does a great job, and it would not be the success that it is without his leadership," Jimmy related. "He has a natural knack for meeting with donors and other volunteers. My work schedule is flexible enough that I can still come down and help, but Brian really drives this thing."

Through the years, the community has actively supported the project. "Community National Bank and Trust is a major sponsor every year, but if we tried to name all of the businesses and individuals that help, there would not be room in the article. The Cowboy Church lets us take over their building for the pizza party we have for the kids to present them with their new bikes. Pastor Derek Rogers loves the event, and last year, he helped distribute the bikes that were not picked up at the church. My entire church is on board with this event," Brian offered.





Bikes From Santa depends on area school counselors to determine the recipients of the new bikes. The group understands that without the donations, many of these children would not experience much joy at Christmas. In addition to the bikes, the group provides gift cards for other family members who are not included in the bicycle giveaway. "Sometimes, there will be three kids in a family who will be getting a new bike, but there are actually five siblings," Brian shared.

The group has grown over the past 20 years. Last year, they raised almost \$40,000 and gave away 655 bikes, numerous gift cards and fed a host of families from 350 pizzas at The Cowboy Church bike presentation. That is a long way from the first year when they gave away 25 bicycles. About three years ago, Bikes From Santa officially became a nonprofit organization with 501(c) (3) status. The group also has received the Corsicana ISD Superintendent's "C Award," which is based on four C's — Character, Commitment, Compassion and Courage.

"We have often said we were going to cut back on the number of bikes we give away, and we sometimes set smaller goals than we actually achieved the year before, but somehow it just keeps growing," Brian mused. "People speak of the 'booming economy,' but there are always families that have a genuine need, especially at Christmas."

Moore's poem, also known as "The Night Before Christmas," closes with, "But I heard him exclaim, ere he drove out of sight, 'Happy Christmas to all, and to all a good night!" Moore must have been writing about Bikes From Santa. NOW

Scones:

Parchment paper 2 cups flour, sifted

- **2.** In a medium bowl, sift together flour, salt, sugar and baking powder.
- **3.** With hands or a pastry blender, combine butter into flour mixture until it is crumbly; add cranberries.
- **4.** In a small bowl, beat I egg; add half of the milk. Add egg mixture to flour mixture, adding more milk, if necessary, to make a soft dough that's not sticky or too wet.
- **5.** Turn dough onto a floured surface; shape, pressing out the dough to about 1-inch thickness.
- **6.** With circular cookie cutters, cut out dough; place scones on the baking sheet. Gather dough, repeating this process.
- **7.** In another bowl, beat remaining egg; brush scones with egg before baking for 10-13 minutes. Let cool a few minutes prior to glazing.
- **8.** For glaze: Mix zest and sugar; slowly add the orange juice until desired consistency is reached, usually about like peanut butter.

### Gingerbread Man Snaps With Royal Icing (as named by son, James)

Makes 5 dozen plain or iced snaps.

#### Snaps:

Parchment paper

3/4 cup vegetable shortening

1 cup sugar

1/2 tsp. salt

I large egg

1/3 cup molasses

2 1/3 cups flour

2 tsp. baking soda

2 tsp. ground ginger

1 tsp. ground cinnamon

1/2 tsp. nutmeg

1/2 tsp. ground black pepper

#### Royal Icing:

I egg white

2 cups powdered sugar

1/2 tsp. vanilla

- **1.** Preheat oven to 375 F; line a baking sheet with parchment paper.
- **2.** Cream the shortening, sugar and salt together; add the egg and molasses.
- **3.** In a separate bowl, combine the flour, baking soda and spices. Add dry mixture to shortening mixture, 1/2 cup at a time, to make a sturdy dough.
- **4.** Turn the dough out onto a floured surface; roll it out until it's about the thickness of a quarter, ensuring a "snap." Cut into desired shape with 2-inch round cookie cutters.
- **5.** Place snaps on the baking sheet; bake for 9 minutes. Cool.
- **6.** For icing: Beat the egg white until frothy; add sugar, gradually, whisking continuously for 5-7 minutes until glossy.
- **7.** Whisk in vanilla. *Note*: For a thicker consistency, add more powdered sugar. For thinner consistency, add 1 tsp. water.

### **Cherry Icebox Cake**

Note: Inspired by Collin Street Bakery's Cherry Icebox Cookies.

#### Cake:

3 cups all-purpose flour

3 cups sugar

1 1/2 tsp. baking powder

1 1/2 tsp. salt

3/8 tsp. baking soda

1 1/2 cups water

1 1/2 cups butter, cubed

3 large eggs

3/4 cup sour cream

3/4 tsp. almond extract

3/4 tsp. vanilla extract





1/2 tsp. cherry extract25 maraschino cherries, roughly chopped and lightly dusted in flourPink Wilton gel food coloring, as desired

#### Frosting:

1/2 cup butter, room temperature

1/2 cup Crisco shortening

4 cups powdered sugar (divided use)

1/2 tsp. vanilla extract

1/2 tsp. cherry extract

2-3 Tbsp. milk (divided use)

Dash of salt

Maraschino cherries, for garnish Nuts, chopped, for garnish

- **1.** For cake: Preheat oven to 350 F; butter and flour two 8x2-inch round cake pans.
- **2.** In a large bowl, combine flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and baking soda; set aside.
- **3.** In a saucepan over medium heat, combine water and butter until mixture comes to a boil; remove.
- **4.** In a small bowl, combine eggs, sour cream and extracts; beat with a fork until mixture is smooth.
- **5.** Slowly add the butter mixture to the dry, flour mixture. Wait a minute before adding egg mixture. Add cherries and food coloring to the batter.
- **6.** Drop 3 cups of batter into each prepared cake pan. Bake 25 minutes; cool completely.



- **7.** For frosting: Cream butter and Crisco; gradually add half the sugar.
- **8.** Add extracts and half of the milk; continue to beat. Add remaining sugar, milk and salt. *Note*: To alter the consistency, add more milk to thin or more sugar to thicken.
- **9.** Add a crumb coat to cooled cake. Let cake set in refrigerator for 30 minutes before adding the final frosting layer. Garnish with maraschino cherries and nuts to taste.

### **Madeleine Cookies**

Makes 2 dozen and can be made 1 day ahead.


2 large eggs 2/3 cup sugar tsp. vanilla
 1/2 tsp. lemon peel, grated
 Pinch of salt
 cup all-purpose flour
 Tbsp. unsalted butter, melted and cooled slightly
 Powdered sugar, to taste

- **1.** Preheat oven to 375 F. Generously butter and flour large madeleine pan.
- **2.** In a large bowl, beat the eggs and sugar; beat in vanilla, lemon peel and salt. Add the flour gradually, beating until blended. Slowly add butter in a steady stream until just blended.
- **3.** Spoon 1 Tbsp. batter into each pan indention. Bake 10-16 minutes, until puffed and browned. Cool 5 minutes; gently remove from pan.
- **4.** Repeat the process, buttering and flouring the pan before each batch. Dust cookies with powdered sugar.



In December, Santa makes the converted gazebo his second home. From the night after Thanksgiving until December 23, lines form with young and old waiting to visit the benevolent character and his adorable wife. Check out the hand-painted walls on the exterior and interior of the house. Several photo-op backdrops are also available for families to capture memories. Santa and Mrs. Claus love posing for pictures and encourage visitors to snap all they want. Be sure and check times, so you don't miss what is quickly becoming a free annual tradition for thousands.

During the first week or two of December, catch a free display containing a private collection of more than 1,000 nativities. A space with touchable nativities entertains children during visits.

In Shanley Park, the city creates a wonderland of lights for the season. Drive down Bridge St. and Dove Hollow Rd. for dazzling displays timed to music. Year-round, Granbury's parks give families plenty of opportunities to get outside. With about 10 parks, including City Beach Park, kids have ample room to play. A bike-and-hike trail connects some parks, and a skate park provides hours of entertainment for all ages. Another Granbury experience takes some back to childhood. Still in operation, the historic Brazos Drive-In stays open most of the year. Showing current movies, they charge by the carload. While the concession stand creates yummy treats, they allow families to bring in food and beverages. Be sure to pack your lawn chairs or sit in the old-fashioned metal variety under a covered area. In colder weather, you might want a blanket or two.

Every last Saturday night of the month, art galleries stay open late. The second Saturday, designated as Ladies Night Out, also keeps things hopping later in the evening. Every weekend, multiple places in town offer live music, including those on the square and all over town.

While you're in Granbury, be sure to visit the multiple wineries, breweries and distilleries. Most provide entertainment, and some offer tours. Whether you come for a week or a weekend, you'll find plenty to do. Chances are, you might want to return often.
