A garden beside the front walkway showcases a red bistro set, red birdhouse and giant red star on a vintage screen door outlined in twinkle lights. At night, the home's roofline is outlined in green, white and, of course, red lights.

A rustic red front porch bench gets decked for the season beside a 5-foot Santa figure at the home's crimson front door. Upon entering the foyer, guests are welcomed by red-and-white gingham covered chairs surrounding the family's dining room table. "This was my mother's table. It was old and brown, so I decided to paint it myself," Dee explained.

Cornbread Dressing

1 cup cornmeal

1/2 cup flour

1 egg

2 Tbsp. sugar

I tsp. salt

2 tsp. baking powder Milk, for consistency 1 Tbsp. margarine or butter

I medium white onion, chopped

1/2 red or green bell pepper

4 stalks celery, chopped

2 Tbsp. chicken soup base mix

1 14.5-oz. can cream of chicken soup

1 14.5-oz. can of water

Garlic powder, to taste

Onion powder, to taste

Pepper, to taste Salt. to taste

1 small bunch green onions finely chopped

- **1.** Mix the cornmeal, flour, egg, sugar, salt, baking powder and milk. Bake at 400 F for 35-45 minutes.
- **2.** When the combread is ready; warm butter or margarine in a pan. Sauté the onions, bell peppers and celery.
- **3.** Combine the cornbread with the sauteed vegetables and all remaining ingredients. Add the green onions last. Bake in the oven for I hour at 350 F.

Buttermilk Pie

2 cups white sugar

2 Tbsp. flour

2/3 cup buttermilk

5 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 cup butter, melted

1 9-inch unbaked deep-dish piecrust

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 F. Mix the sugar and flour in a bowl. Beat the buttermilk and eggs in a blender; add to the sugar/flour mixture.
- 2. Stir in the vanilla and the melted butter: pour into the crust. Bake for 50 minutes. Let cool before serving.

Pecan Pie

2 eggs

1/2 cup butter, melted

I cup light brown sugar

1/4 cup white sugar

1 Tbsp. flour

1 Tbsp. milk

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup pecans, chopped

1. Beat the eggs until foamy. Stir in melted butter. Stir in brown sugar, white sugar and flour. Add the milk, vanilla and nuts.

2. Bake for 10 minutes at 400 F. Reduce heat to 350 F: bake for 30-40 minutes more.

Cabbage

1/2 stick butter or 1/3 cup oil (grapeseed, avocado or olive oil)

I head of cabbage, chopped or shredded

I sweet onion, chopped

I red bell pepper, chopped

I tsp. salt

1 tsp. pepper

1-2 Tbsp. garlic powder

1-2 Tbsp. onion powder

1 Tbsp. chicken soup base mix

1. Heat a medium-size pot or deep skillet; add oil or butter, cabbage, onions and bell peppers. Stir the mixture around in the pot continuously, making sure that the butter or oil is getting on all of the cabbage. Let sit for about 4 minutes before stirring again.

2. Continue to stir the cabbage until it begins to soften and make its own water. Add in all of the seasonings; continue to stir for about 7 to 8 minutes.

3. Lower the temperature: place a lid on the pot. After about 15 minutes, check the cabbage for taste and consistency. Add more salt and pepper, to taste.

4. Variation: Use your favorite seasoning salt in lieu of salt and pepper. My personal favorite is Johnny's Seasoning Salt.

Chicken Soup

4 chicken hindquarters or whole chicken

1 14-oz. can stewed tomatoes

I onion, chopped

4 stalks celery, chopped

1/2 cup barley (optional)

1 16-oz. bag frozen mixed veggies





- 1 14-oz. can tomato sauce
- I tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 2 tsp. garlic powder
- 2 tsp. onion powder
- 1/2 cup chicken soup base mix
- 1 14.5-oz. can cream of chicken soup (optional)
- 1 8-oz. bag frozen sweet corn
- **1.** Place the chicken in a pot; cover with water. Boil until the chicken begins to fall off the bone; cool.
- **2.** After cooling, debone the chicken; place it back in the pot with the chicken broth. Add the tomatoes, onions; celery; barley, if using; mixed veggies; and tomato sauce. Add all the seasonings, chicken soup base mix and cream of chicken soup, if using.
- **3.** Boil until the vegetables are tender. Add the frozen corn; cook for another 15-20 minutes. Add more seasoning, to taste, if desired.

Sauteed Green Beans

Eat as is or with a side of steamed white rice.

1/2 cup oil

- 1 lb. fresh green beans, with ends removed
- 3 Tbsp. minced garlic
- 1/4 tsp. salt

Pinch red pepper flakes




- **1.** Heat the oil in a skillet or wok; add the green beans. Cook for about 3-4 minutes until the skin begins to wrinkle. Remove; place on a napkin.
- **2.** Add the garlic in the same oil; sauté for about I minute until fragrant. Add the green beans back to the pan; stir to combine. Cook for about another minute. Sprinkle with the salt and red pepper flakes.




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
