


At Home With Rob and Norma Hall

When a guest enters the living room area, he or she will find a digital picture of this wonderful family including Rob,





St. Jude Catholic Church celebrated 124 years in 2022. This church traces back to 1898. There have been several additions to the original building since the 1800s. Julie Cosby stated, "We are the only Catholic church in Mansfield, and we have

approximately 2,700 members. But we initially began as a small congregation."

Six families got together in a home to start this church. Once a month, the father and priest would take the train to Mansfield to celebrate Mass with the local Catholics. St. Joseph Catholic Church was established in 1898 as a modest frame structure. The redbrick church on Dallas Street was constructed in November 1928 when the group expanded to 28 households. In 1971, the third structure was given the current name, St. Jude Catholic Church.

When asked what she would say her church is known for, Julie responded, "We give back. We have 50 ministries with volunteers who assist the disabled in Special Olympics and go to the prisons monthly to pray with inmates. We partner with the Common Ground Network to distribute meals to families while school is out and participate in the backpack and Christmas Gift Program. Our St. Vincent de Paul Society (SVDP) gives away food on Wednesdays, Saturdays year-round and holidays. SVDP also aids people with paying utility bills. We recently had our

45th Annual Fall Festival, and it's always so much fun connecting with the community!"

This church has strong roots in Mansfield. Many events start and stop at St. Jude. Most parades start there. For example, the Veterans Day, Pickle and Christmas parades all start in the parking lot that oversees the beautiful architecture of this church.


Pastor Father Daniel Kelley said, "I have been pastor of St. Jude for a year-and-ahalf. I feel very blessed by the Lord for being here. I really enjoy living in Mansfield. I am amazed at the rapid growth of Mansfield, but also of this parish. This is a fun parish to pastor."

During the pandemic, many people stopped coming, but now people are starting to return. They recently added 700 families this year, so St. Jude is experiencing a lot of growth.

Now St. Jude Parish serves many nationalities of believers, which include Americans, Vietnamese, Hispanic, Nigerians, Filipino and more. They have five Mass celebrations in English and Spanish. Their mission statement reads, "We, the parishioners of St. lude Roman Catholic Parish, are a diverse community through Baptism in One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Faith. As disciples, we follow the teachings of Jesus Christ, celebrating the Sacraments, and serving the Mystical Body of Christ. Through God's grace, the community's mission is to lead to participate in communion of the Father and the Son in the Spirit of Love."

The St. Jude youth benefit from a robust catechesis program. Four hundred and fifty elementary school students are learning about Christ together. The Chosen Curriculum, Faith and Life and the Holy Bible are used for 425 students from junior high and high school as they prepare to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. Teenage youth join in the Life Teens and Edge movement, which teaches them to take part in liturgies, upbeat music and stimulating conversations.

Julie concluded, "I've been a member since 2006. I volunteered so much that I was offered a job as the DRE (director of religious education) and now the business manager. I love what I do. I'm excited about the Parish Hall expansion because we are seeing so much growth." NOW



#### **Pretzel M&M Hugs**

Angel Morris – a fun way to involve kids in the kitchen.

Servings: One bag of Hugs contains about 75 pieces (one batch). The bags of M&Ms and pretzels yield 4-5 batches total.

1 16-oz. bag Snyder's Snaps Pretzels, square shaped (not butter flavored)

- I 11-oz. bag HERSHEY's Hugs chocolates (or your favorite flavor)I 11.4-oz. bag red and green M&Ms
- **I.** Preheat the oven to 200 F. Line a cookie sheet with a baking mat or parchment paper. Place the pretzels on the cookie sheet in a single layer; top each pretzel with I HERSHEY'S chocolate.

- 2. Bake 4-6 minutes, or until the chocolate is shiny and soft, not totally melted! Remove from the oven; carefully place I M&M in the center of each soft Hug. Press down on the M&M to spread the chocolate.

  3. Place in the freezer or refrigerator for
- 10-15 minutes, allowing the chocolate to set. Store in an airtight container. Note: If using multiple flavors of HERSHEY'S Kisses, make each flavor in its own batch as melting times will differ from flavor to flavor.

#### **Ambrosia**

Virginia Riddle – 4 servings (can double or triple)

- 2 cups fresh oranges, cut into bite-size pieces
- 1/4 cup coconut, shredded
- 1 20-oz. can pineapple tidbits
- 19 maraschino stemless cherries, halved (Reserve 4 whole cherries with stems for topping.)
- 2 tsp. sugar
- 1 8-oz. tub Cool Whip (optional)
- 3/4 cup pecans, chopped (optional)
- **1.** Combine all the ingredients; stir well.
- **2.** Serve as an appetizer or dessert in compote dishes; use whole cherries with stems to top each dish.

#### One Dish Chicken, Potatoes and Green Beans

Bill Smith

Spray cooking oil 2 14.5-oz. cans green beans 2-3 chicken breasts; cubed 3-5 small to medium potatoes 1 pkg. dry Italian dressing mix Black pepper, to taste I stick butter, melted

- 1. Lightly spray a 9x12-inch baking pan with the cooking oil. Drain the green beans; place them in 1/3 of the pan area.
- 2. Add the chicken next to the green beans; then add the potatoes. The chicken, green beans and potatoes should each cover about 1/3 of the pan.
- **3.** Sprinkle the dressing mix over everything. Add black pepper to taste.
- **4.** Drizzle the butter over the top. Cover with foil: bake at 350 F for 1 hour and 10 minutes.

#### Nebber's Rolls With **Modern Twist**

- I cup shortening
- 2 1/4 cups water (divided use)
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3 pkgs. instant dry yeast
- 3 eggs
- 8 cups flour
- 2 sticks butter, melted
- 1. Place the shortening, 1 1/4 cups water, sugar and salt in a bowl; heat the ingredients in the microwave for about 30 seconds. Stir until the shortening is melted; cool to lukewarm.
- 2. In a large bowl, dissolve the instant dry yeast in 1 cup lukewarm water.
- **3.** Add the shortening mixture and eggs; gradually add the flour, beating well with a spoon.
- 4. Once combined, knead until soft, circular and elastic. Place the dough in a greased bowl, turning once to grease the top of the dough.
- 5. Cover with a cloth; let rise in a warm place for 10-15 minutes.
- **6.** Roll out flat; cut using a small, circular cup on a flat surface. Dip the cut out dough into the melted butter. Fold in half; place the dough close together in greased baking pans. **7.** Bake at 350 F for 15-20 minutes. Brush
- with butter and serve.

#### Chocolate Ribbon Pie

Adam Walker

4 oz. cream cheese 2 Tbsp. sugar





- 2 Tbsp. condensed milk (divided use) 1 8-oz. tub Cool Whip, thawed
- (divided use)
- 1 9-inch Oreo Crumb Crust
- 2 cups cold milk
- 2 4-oz. pkgs. chocolate fudge instant pudding

Cocoa powder or chocolate shavings

- **1.** In a bowl, beat together the cream cheese, sugar and 1 Tbsp. of the condensed milk until smooth. Gently fold in half of the Cool Whip. Spread on the bottom of the crust.
- **2.** In another bowl, combine the milk and remaining condensed milk. Add pudding; whisk for 2 minutes. Pour over the cream cheese layer.
- **3.** Refrigerate for 4 hours, until well set and chilled. Top with the remaining Cool Whip; spread evenly. Garnish with cocoa powder or chocolate shavings.

I medium onion I-2 Tbsp. olive oil 2 lbs. lean hamburger meat Garlic powder, to taste Salt, to taste
Pepper, to taste
1/2 to 1 tsp. cumin
2 Tbsp. cornstarch
1 2- to 3-lb. bag frozen mixed vegetables
1 46-oz. bottle V-8 Juice
Sour cream, for garnish (optional)
Cheese, for garnish (optional)

- **I.** In a large skillet, sauté the onions in the olive oil until softened. Add the hamburger; brown, stirring in the seasonings. (I usually add other favorite spices.) When the meat finishes cooking, stir in the cornstarch.
- **2.** Transfer the meat to a 6- or 8-qt. Crock-Pot. Add the frozen vegetables and V-8 Juice. Stir everything well; cook on low for at least 4 hours. Add water or broth if extra liquid is needed.
- **3.** Serve in individual bowls with sour cream and cheese, if desired.

- **I.** Remove the cherries from the jar. Reserve the juice. Slice each cherry in half; set aside.
- **2.** In a large bowl, sift together the flour, baking soda, cinnamon, salt and sugar.
- **3.** Add the oil, vanilla, eggs, cherries and pecans; mix together. Add the cherry juice; mix well.
- **4.** Evenly divide the batter between 2 well-greased loaf pans. Bake at 350 F for 50-55 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.



# PERSO CHRISTIM

Christmas is almost here, but it is not too late to decorate your yard for the season with some easy and inexpensive do-it-yourself decorations. You may even have some of the basic parts for these decorative additions from other seasonal decorations that you can repurpose. Another source will be discount stores and hardware stores.

Everyone likes to see Christmas lights as part of decorations, and they can be added rather inexpensively to most of these projects. Long strings of large bulbs that need a 110-volt receptacle can be used, but with the availability of LED string lights powered by either replaceable or rechargeable batteries, extension cords and outdoor receptacles may not be necessary for these ideas.

Old wooden pallets can be a crafter's delight. A wooden-pallet Christmas tree is easy to make, and the only tools required are a claw hammer, nails and a saw. Carefully take the pallet apart using a claw hammer and/or a pry-bar, cut the one-by-four boards into a large triangle (Christmas-tree shape) and reattach them to one of the two-by-four boards, then either paint your decorations on, add string lights or both. To provide additional support for the tree, you can sharpen one of the two-by-fours into a stake and drive it into the ground with a mallet, or use the two-by-fours as supports behind the tree for it to lean on.

Do you already have trees in your yard to decorate? Make these simple stars and snowflakes using craft sticks (Popsicle sticks-tongue depressors). Just stack several of the sticks, glue them in the middle, and arrange them to look like stars and snowflakes. Decorate them with paint and glitter. Maybe add some binder's twine in the middle to hang them from your tree branches.

Giant round ornaments are a popular addition to outdoor decorations, and an easy and inexpensive do-it-yourself project can be made with large, inflated plastic balls that you

can find in bins at big-box stores. Just spray paint the balls in holiday colors, add a wooden dowel with a spot of glue in the hole where the ball is aired up, and they should be relatively easy to stick into the ground. Add ribbon to the dowels for an additional touch.

Repurpose your plastic Halloween pumpkins into a snowman! If the plastic jack-o-lanterns have a handle on them, remove them, then just use a glue gun to hold three of them stacked together. (If there is a jack-o-lantern face on them, just turn it to the back.) Spray paint them white, glue on some large black buttons and paint a face on or use other craft items for the nose, mouth and eyes. A couple of sticks from your yard form the arms, and of course you can add a scarf and a hat. Look at Frosty go!

Paper-plate lollipops may be the least expensive decoration that you can imagine, but they may also be the most decorative and unique. Simply glue or tape a half-inch wooden dowel, (you might want to use differing lengths for variety, one foot to three feet long) to the inside of a paper plate. Glue another paper plate, upside down, to the edges of the first plate, covering the dowel. Paint both sides of the lollipop solid, with stripes or other shapes. Cover the lollipops with cellophane joined to the dowel with a ribbon, then place the lollipops in groups around your yard with the dowel driven into the ground.

Finally, make large candy-cane decorations with three- or four-inch PVC pipe. Use a long, straight piece to make the candy cane as tall as you desire, probably three or four feet, then glue elbows and small sections to the top to make the hook shape. Paint the candy cane with white spray paint. Allow it to dry, then use painter's tape to circle the candy cane at an angle from top to bottom. Spray the area between the tape with red paint to complete the decoration. Slide the bottom of the candy cane over a two-by-four stake driven into the ground to make the candy cane stand up.





Advent calendars are a way to help children count down to Christmas Day, with daily treats and reminders of the season's origin. But how did the Advent calendar itself originate?

Advent begins on the Sunday nearest the Feast Day of Christ's first disciple, St. Andrew the Apostle, which is marked November 30. That Sunday, and the next three, make up the four-week period of Advent celebrations. It is estimated these celebrations have taken place since the fourth century, initially considered the period of time during which those converting to Christianity would prepare for baptism.

Today, Advent is commonly associated with the weeks leading up to Christ's birth, celebrated December 25. Derived from the Latin word for "coming," Advent is often marked by calendars through which daily reminders tell us Christmas is drawing near. As a result, Advent calendars are typically dated December 1–24, rather than beginning November 30.

In the early 1900s, Gerhard Lang printed what is widely

considered the first Advent calendar, inspired by one his mother made featuring 24 colored pictures attached to cardboard. Gerhard added doors in front of each image, and this design is still popular today.

Around the time Gerhard produced his calendar commercially, a German newspaper also shared an Advent calendar insert as a gift for readers. The idea caught on, and a trend was born. U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower, shown in national newspaper photographs opening an Advent calendar with his grandchildren, helped spark the tradition in the states.

Now, pre-made Advent calendars can be found from gift shops to dollar stores. Their doors typically open to reveal small pieces of chocolate or candy, sometimes having printed quotes or Bible verses within. These time markers are also a simple and meaningful craft for families to DIY.

One easy version involves very basic supplies: brown paper bags (smaller is better), clothes pins, crayons or markers and twine — plus the treats you want each bag to hold. Consider your family's favorite snacks and/or small ageappropriate trinkets. These can be faith-based or follow the theme of your choosing.



For those who plan to take turns opening days on the calendar, consider gifts that relate to who will be opening each day: For Mom, lip balm, an ornament, earrings or jewelry; for Dad, knock-knock jokes written by the kids, a keychain or a small-framed family photo; for the children, small books or mini versions of their favorite games or characters. Any age enjoys a coupon for special time together or notes about what they mean to the family. Of course, the traditional candy or snack is inexpensive and fun.

To prepare the calendar, family members divide up the bags and add their own artwork to the containers for which they are responsible, including the number of the day on which the bag should be opened and the person who should open that bag. Decorating need not be limited to drawing. Stickers or other craft supplies can be utilized to customize bags, as well.

Once bags are decorated, a shopping trip for filler is in order, when everyone can choose what goes in the bags they designed, keeping in mind the aforementioned gifts or whatever they feel suits the designated opener. Back home, bags are filled and attached to twine with the clothespins for prominent display somewhere in the home. Securing

your Advent calendar to a fireplace mantel is a great way to decorate for the season, too! Just don't light the fireplace while it's hanging there!

Mini stockings, mittens, small boxes — the container of your choosing — can be substituted for paper bags, and the filler can follow any theme you wish. Perhaps handwritten notes are more meaningful than trinkets as the children get older, and especially so for parents when written by their kids.

Items need not be hung from twine and can simply sit across a hearth or table or inside a basket or box. Families may prefer the same style each year, or like the idea of something new every Christmas. Perhaps Mom and Dad fill each day for the kids, or maybe the whole family takes part. When it comes to Advent calendars, the way you count down to the biggest holiday of the year is up to you!


