The Lions Club is known for service to the community, and Bill Dover takes pride in being part of the pack. He's been a member of the Duncanville chapter since 1973 and is still actively involved in seeing to it that good is done in his town.

Bill moved to Duncanville after serving in the military hospital at Ft. Leonard Wood in Missouri during the Vietnam era. A friend invited him to join the Lions Club. "At the time, this chapter was only two years old. It was an interesting group that joined that year. We called ourselves the Class of '73. A lot of future civic leaders were in that group. Our ringleader was Paul Mack Burnett. Wes Jesperson; Don Cutler; and Jay Davis, a retired Air Force colonel who had flown LBJ, were all part of that group. Bob Lee is the only other one who is still alive. He's in a nursing home now, but he worked for the city for years and was responsible for most of Duncanville's water works."

Known as "Uncle Fuzzy" — because of his full head of hair and bushy beard — until he shaved them off, to the great consternation of his daughter, Bill was a well-known local eye doctor, who still has fans willing to sing his praises for the care they or their loved ones received in his clinic. "In 1949, Helen Keller asked the Lions Club to become the 'knights of the blind,' and Lions Club took up the challenge. As an eye doctor, that project was right up my alley. They've branched out into many other areas of service over the years, but vision is still a major focus. I served on the board for sight and vision for years."

Because of that vision, Duncanville Lions Club maintained a mobile eye clinic, for years, that traveled around the area, doing free eye exams for local children and adults. "This local club has been responsible for more than 2,000 kids having eye exams. We took our mobile screening

unit to various places in and around Duncanville, coordinating with other Lions Clubs, churches and other groups, until our trailer was demolished by a windshear."

Bill didn't limit his generosity to his work with Lions Club. "In my practice, I never turned anyone away because of money. My practice was mostly 'cash and carry,' but if a family was in need, I'd give them credit, then never put it on the books. I did a lot of things I never took credit for. I'm not bragging. It's just the way I tried to live my life. I grew up poor and worked my way through college. I don't like the term 'pay it forward,' but I think it's important to be responsible and to encourage others to be responsible. Like dropping a pebble in a lake, it makes waves of service, spreading outward. So much good can come about."

Looking back, Bill has witnessed a lot of Lions Club history. "We were a wild and woolly bunch, back in those days. Ladies first joined the Lions Club in 1987. We were the first service club to go co-ed. It was the best move we ever made. If not for our lady Lions, we couldn't accomplish half of what we do. Women guickly moved into leadership positions. Lions really are a cross-section of America. We lost a lot of members in the pandemic, so it's important for us to rebuild our membership. We're an organization whose premise is doing for others. Our motto is We Serve. We're trying to get more young men and women to join, but it's difficult when so many people work so far away from where they live. Our meetings are at noon on Fridays."

Bill is a champion for all things Lions Club. "There is very little that the Lions are involved in that isn't important to





me. Any time there is a disaster, there are three organizations that are there, on the ground, before anyone else — the Baptist Men, the Knights of Columbus and us. We're there, helping people in need, before the Red Cross, before FEMA, before anyone else. We all know each other and rag on each other, but we're there to get stuff done. We run a camp that started as a summer camp for kids with vision problems, but has expanded beyond the summer months and welcomes kids with many other problems. It's all volunteer run, and no child is ever charged a penny."

The Lions have been involved in notable projects right here in Duncanville. "We built the first city swimming pool. We got involved with the annual Fourth of July parade back in 1987 and ran it for several years, when the Chamber of Commerce just didn't have the manpower to keep it going. I was working with the Sandra Meadows tournament even before the Lions Club took it over. It's an invitational women's basketball tournament that really puts Duncanville on the map, Little schools like Notre Dame, UConn and Stanford are there recruiting. Women's sports are important to me. I coached girls' soccer for 22 years. I got teased a lot by other guys when I started. They thought I should be coaching boys' football."

Bill's long life of service has left him with a few rights to brag, and a lot of opinions. "I can't prove it, but I'm willing to bet that the Lions Club is the No. I civic organization actually doing things in the community, not just giving money, but being hands on. If we can do it, we do it. No one can be smart enough to agree with everything I do!" NOW



The child whimpers, calming down finally in her mom's arms as they lie in the hospital bed. The worried mom relaxes, says a prayer and smiles gently as she feels the colorful, soft blanket's warmth envelop and soothe her child into needed sleep. Needles, medical tests and scans normally fill their days, but moments ago, love and care came through the child's hospital room door in the form of a blanket created by Binky Patrol - North Texas Chapter volunteers. "We call our art 'handmade hugs,'" Theresa Costin, chapter coordinator, said. "It's our joy to bring comfort to children who are dealing with a difficult time in their lives."

The North Texas Chapter is part of the all-volunteer national nonprofit Binky Patrol, which was founded in 1996 by a business owner, Susan Finch. She had noticed a neighborhood homeless man who walked around with a blanket on his head. Another business owner remarked, "We call him Binky because of the blanket on his head." Susan got to know the man by name, and they became friends. He was touched when she named the organization for him, and one day, he donated a dollar saying it was for the babies. "This is the true spirit of Binky Patrol," Theresa remarked. "We make and distribute homemade blankets to children born HIV-positive, drug addicted or with other chronic and terminal illnesses, or children who have been abused, are in foster care or have experienced trauma."

Judy Morton is the assistant coordinator for local volunteer quilters, crocheters and knitters. They gather monthly at a "meet up" on the fourth Friday and fifth Saturday at Ben Franklin Apothecary. A retired educator, Judy still wanted to do something for children when she joined the group. "I started out crocheting around fleece blankets. Eventually, with Theresa's encouragement, I began designing quilt kits

and cutting the pieces," Judy said. "Our COVID sidewalk meet ups have been memorable. Wonderful volunteers bring about 60-70 finished quilts or tops every month to exchange for more quilt kits." For Judy, another memorable time was the group's donation of 100 Christmas quilts to CASA of Ellis County in December 2017 after the chapter's founding in April of that year. Since then, the chapter has delivered 16,000-plus guilts and blankets to area hospitals and other facilities, such as LifePath.org-Early Childhood Intervention, that serve children in need of comfort, "I love that we are women from many areas with varied talents and ideas who get together and share our talents. We've learned so much from each other, and these ladies have taught me about quilting," Judy added.

More volunteers are always welcome, even if they don't sew, crochet or knit since the ladies are willing to teach skills or show non-sewing volunteers how to create a fleece blanket. Distance isn't a deterrent either. "We have an 'Angel Donor' who moved from the Metroplex to San Antonio," Theresa explained. "She ships blanket making supplies and blankets she knits and crochets." A Californian ships her "stash of kid fabrics." There are also non-crafting jobs such as delivering, sorting, cutting and counting.

A native of Amarillo, Texas, who raised her children while living in Dumas, Texas, Judy and her husband, Darwin, moved to the Metroplex to be nearer their children and grandchildren. "I love the people here and all the wonderful places to shop. I have taught some of my granddaughters to crochet and sew guilts. They have made a few items for Binky Patrol," she said.

Having been a longtime crafter, Judy enjoys crocheting, knitting, cross-stitching, hand embroidery, machine embroidery and quilting. She explained, "I love starting with an idea and watching it come to fruition. It's so gratifying to see the beautiful quilt tops made by these ladies that began as an idea in my mind." And area children who need and love the "handmade hugs" will continue to be comforted by Binky Patrol blankets. Now



If you remember the American variety TV show, Hee Haw, you may also recall one of its stars, Dallas native LuLu Roman. While some of the show's original cast members have moved on to that Kornfield Kounty in the sky, LuLu is still performing and sharing her unique life story — which began in an orphanage in Texas.

Born May 6, 1946, "LuLu" rose to fame during Hee Haw's run from 1968-1995 after being brought to the attention of the show's producer by the soon-to-be show's co-host, Buck Owens. Lulu recalled the audition trip to Los Angeles — and that comedy legend Carol Burnett was her first star encounter at CBS Studios. "The producers had told Buck they were looking for a cast that included one gorgeous blonde and brunette, one boy- and girl-next-door type and a fat dumb man and woman. Buck yelled, 'I've got your fat girl! She's a dancer in Dallas!' And unbelievably, at the time, I was — all 300 lbs. of me!"

LuLu's time on the show, and her life before it, were filled with highs and lows that began in Buckner Baptist Children's Home in Dallas. Born with a thyroid dysfunction, LuLu

expressed that her weight problem resulted in her being teased by her peers and prevented her from being adopted.

"In retrospect, there was nothing funny about being born in a home for unwed mothers, or at the age of 4 being deposited at the orphanage. And so, began the story of little Bertha Louise Hable, who would become famous for making people laugh," LuLu explained.

Dallas resident Sue Hemric grew up in the children's home with LuLu. "She lived in the same dormitory as my sister, and they pulled some funny pranks there," Sue recalled. "I would see her sitting on the outdoor benches where she'd just be singing away. LuLu also brought a lot of laughter to campus."

Graduating in 1964 from W.W. Samuell High School, LuLu quickly parlayed her humor into a career. Drug addiction in her early 20s, however, caused her to be fired from Hee Haw. But a chance encounter with a friend from Buckner's helped LuLu find her faith. "She took me to Beverly Hills Baptist Church in Dallas. This was a spirit-filled church where everyone seemed to love and accept me. It was there in 1973 where I gave my heart to Jesus," LuLu recalled.

As a result, LuLu began performing country gospel music and has been recording and touring for more than 40 years. "Years later, seeing her on TV, I was happy that a Buckner kid had made something of themselves," Sue praised. "She deserved all that success!"

LuLu's biography on IMDb — the online source for

celebrity data — reports that LuLu agreed to return to Hee Haw only if one Christian song would be performed every episode. To fulfill her request, a Christian Barber Shop routine was created, featuring Archie Campbell, Grandpa Jones, Roy Clark and a rotating cast member. After Hee Haw's run ended, Roy reportedly called LuLu his favorite female cast member.

LuLu remains grateful for the program that transformed her from orphan to stardom. "The show was a wonderful time in my life because I had no family to speak of, and we became kind of like a family. We went through marriages, divorces and deaths together - all the things life takes you through in a real family," LuLu admitted. "Everyone involved was a great support to me when I most needed it."

Today, Lulu performs gospel concerts, at women's events and even does some stand-up comedy. Post Hee Haw life has found her receiving Christian music's highest honor, the Dove Award, on her way to becoming a member of the Christian Music Gospel Hall of Fame.

In 2019, she joined tour mates Buck Trent, Jana Jae and Misty Rowe on a series of Kornfield Friends reunion concerts — celebrating Hee Haw's 50th anniversary. Lulu also co-authored her biography, This Is My Story; This Is My Song.

Readers will find painstaking honesty on an early life marked with abandonment, broken relationships and even police encounters, until LuLu found direction. "Despite all I've experienced and all the bad personal choices I've made, I'm a living example of God's grace," she expressed.

At 75, LuLu resides in Tennessee with her three fur babies, where she enjoys ziplining, crafting jewelry and making homemade candy for friends. "Singing is still my favorite thing to do in life," she noted. "What I get to do in continuing to sing and make people laugh is a privilege and a blessing." NOW





Red Velvet Cake With Light **Cream Cheese Frosting**

Cake:

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 3 Tbsp. unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3 cups granulated sugar
- 1 1/2 cups vegetable oil or canola oil
- 3 eggs

- 1 1/2 cups buttermilk
- 3 tsp. vanilla extract
- $1 \, 1/2$ oz. red food coloring
- 1/2 cup plain hot coffee prepared (Don't skip this ingredient. You won't taste coffee when it's cooked.)
- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ tsp. white vinegar

Frosting:

4 8-oz. pkgs. cream cheese, softened I cup unsalted butter, softened 1/2 cup heavy whipping cream

4 tsp. vanilla extract 6 1/2 cups powdered sugar

- **1.** For cake: Preheat the oven to 350 F. Generously grease and flour 3 8-inch round cake pans; set aside.
- 2. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, baking powder, cocoa powder and salt.
- 3. In a stand mixer (or using a handheld mixer and a large mixing bowl) combine the sugar and vegetable oil. Then mix in the eggs, buttermilk, vanilla and red food coloring until combined. Stir in the coffee and white vinegar.
- 4. Add the dry ingredients a little at a time, mixing after each addition. (The batter will be thin.)
- **5.** Pour the batter evenly into each pan. Bake in the middle rack for approximately 30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out with moist crumbs clinging to it. Do not overbake; it will continue to cook as it cools.
- **6.** For frosting: Beat cream cheese, butter, and heavy whipping cream in a stand mixer until fluffy and combined; add vanilla.

- **7.** Mix in the powdered sugar a little at a time; mix on high speed until creamy and light.
- **8.** Add frosting between each cake layer, then frost the top and outside of the cake. Chill; add another layer of frosting to the outside.

Chocolate Fudge Soft-Batch M&M Cookies

1 cup, plus 2 Tbsp. all-purpose flour

1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder

I tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

- I cup semisweet chocolate chips
- 2 Tbsp. unsalted butter, chopped into tiny pieces
- 2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/3 cup light brown sugar, packed
- 2 large eggs, room temperature
- 2 Tbsp. whole milk
- 1 1/2 cups milk chocolate M&M's
- 1/2 cup milk chocolate chips
- **I.** Preheat the oven to 300 F Line 2 large baking sheets with parchment paper. Spray with nonstick spray; set aside.
- **2.** In a medium-size bowl, whisk together the flour, cocoa powder, baking powder and salt; set aside.
- **3.** In a large, microwave safe bowl, combine the chocolate chips and butter. Heat them on low power for 15 second increments, mixing in between each until butter and chocolate are completely melted and can be whisked smooth. Whisk in vanilla and both sugars. Beat in eggs one at a time; beat in milk.
- **4.** Add dry ingredients to wet ingredients; stir to combine. Fold in the M&M's and milk chocolate chips.
- **5.** If the chocolate still seems too hard, add more melted butter until it can be rolled into a ball. Use 1/4 cup to measure the batter.
- **6.** Bake for 16-18 minutes, until the top is shiny. Remove from the oven; add extra M&M's to the top.

Rexy's Favorite Old-fashioned Banana Pudding With Meringue

1 12-oz. can evaporated milk

I cup granulated sugar

1/2 cup all-purpose flour

1/8 tsp. salt

6 large egg yolks, reserve egg whites

2 1/2 cups half-and-half

2 Tbsp. butter

1 Tbsp. vanilla extract

1 11-oz. box Nilla Wafers

4 medium bananas, sliced not too thin







Meringue:

6 reserved egg whites I tsp. vanilla extract 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar 8 Tbsp. granulated sugar

- **1.** In a medium-size mixing bowl, whisk together evaporated milk, granulated sugar, flour and salt until dissolved. Warm the evaporated milk mixture in a heavybottomed saucepan over medium-high heat.
- 2. Whisk the egg yolks and the half-andhalf into the evaporated milk mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, for 10-15 minutes over medium heat until the flour has cooked and the custard has thickened. Remove from heat; whisk in butter and vanilla. Set aside.
- **3.** Layer the bottom and sides of a 7x11-inch oven-safe dish with Nilla wafers. Top with banana slices; cover with 1/2 of the custard. Repeat, ending with custard.
- **4.** For meringue: Whip the egg whites with the vanilla and cream of tartar. Sweeten with the sugar.
- **5.** Whip for 3-5 minutes, or until stiff peaks form. Spread the meringue on top of the banana pudding. Set the oven to broil; toast the top until golden.

TravelNOW DA DE BOAD BALLER BOAD TO SHOW THE SHOW THE

Floorboards creak, but a visit to the Van Alstyne Historical Museum could only be more enhanced if its walls could really talk. Instead, the museum's all-volunteer staff members enjoy greeting visitors and residents and sharing tales of this railroad town and the surrounding area. Many of the exhibited items are "hands on," enjoyed especially by young visitors.

The museum is just one of many office buildings, churches and private homes that make up the town's historical district and date back more than 100 years to 1873, when the railroad came to this spot and Van Alstyne was founded. The new town was named after Maria Van Alstyne, widow of William Ashley Van Alstyne, a Houston and Texas Central Railway major stockholder. Since the railway bypassed the nearby town of Mantua, many of its residents moved to Van Alstyne, adding to the town's prosperity.

The original train depot was located on North Main. Nine Texas State Historical Markers help tell the town's story in the historical district, and other markers indicate the city's growth outward. A walk through the historical district is enhanced by well-



events. North Park and McKinney Wilson Park offer sports fields and playgrounds, as does Forrest Moore Park, which also features a walking trail, complete with the Texas Historic Bridge, constructed in 1890 as a pin-connected Pratt Pony truss bridge.

With the surrounding gently rolling hills, ranches, proximity to the Metroplex and historical sites, Van Alstyne is a location used by film crews. Some local history was portrayed in the movie, *The Highwayman*, when former Grayson County sheriff, Lee Simmons, was given credit for helping Frank Hamer set up the Bonnie and Clyde ambush.

Outdoor activities abound for all ages, and there are plenty of hospitality options. Horseback riding at area ranches; hiking area trails; and water sports, camping and fishing can be enjoyed at nearby Lake Texoma. There are several bed-and-breakfasts in Van Alstyne, along with plenty of motels. Come experience Van Alstyne's history and hospitality for a day or a relaxing weekend. NOW

preserved architectural features and bright murals that decorate the old brick walls.

A historical marker stands near Collin McKinney's grave. An area pioneer and signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence, Collin County and the town of McKinney were named after him.

Shopping and dining are draws to the downtown district, and residents in loft apartments bring a vibrancy to the area. City Drug, in continual operation since 1890, with signage dating to mid-century, has an old-fashioned soda fountain. The Sherman-Dallas Interurban's tracks can still be seen running north and south embedded in Preston Street. Van Alstyne is about an hour's drive from the DFW Metroplex, but the Interurban served as affordable transportation for area residents and visitors during the first half of the 20th century. Two interurban cars are being restored.

The downtown is host to the Railcar Farmers Market that is open on Tuesdays from April to October, the annual Fall der All Festival and Halloween trick-or-treating in October and the Christmas parade in December. In downtown, the soothing tones flowing from the fountain in Dorothy Fielder Park are a pleasant background to Music in the Park

If you remember the American variety TV show, Hee Haw, you may also recall one of its stars, Dallas native LuLu Roman. While some of the show's original cast members have moved on to that Kornfield Kounty in the sky, LuLu is still performing and sharing her unique life story — which began in an orphanage in Texas.

Born May 6, 1946, "LuLu" rose to fame during Hee Haw's run from 1968-1995 after being brought to the attention of the show's producer by the soon-to-be show's co-host, Buck Owens. Lulu recalled the audition trip to Los Angeles — and that comedy legend Carol Burnett was her first star encounter at CBS Studios. "The producers had told Buck they were looking for a cast that included one gorgeous blonde and brunette, one boy- and girl-next-door type and a fat dumb man and woman. Buck yelled, 'I've got your fat girl! She's a dancer in Dallas!' And unbelievably, at the time, I was — all 300 lbs. of me!"

LuLu's time on the show, and her life before it, were filled with highs and lows that began in Buckner Baptist Children's Home in Dallas. Born with a thyroid dysfunction, LuLu

expressed that her weight problem resulted in her being teased by her peers and prevented her from being adopted.

"In retrospect, there was nothing funny about being born in a home for unwed mothers, or at the age of 4 being deposited at the orphanage. And so, began the story of little Bertha Louise Hable, who would become famous for making people laugh," LuLu explained.

Dallas resident Sue Hemric grew up in the children's home with LuLu. "She lived in the same dormitory as my sister, and they pulled some funny pranks there," Sue recalled. "I would see her sitting on the outdoor benches where she'd just be singing away. LuLu also brought a lot of laughter to campus."

Graduating in 1964 from W.W. Samuell High School, LuLu quickly parlayed her humor into a career. Drug addiction in her early 20s, however, caused her to be fired from Hee Haw. But a chance encounter with a friend from Buckner's helped LuLu find her faith. "She took me to Beverly Hills Baptist Church in Dallas. This was a spirit-filled church where everyone seemed to love and accept me. It was there in 1973 where I gave my heart to Jesus," LuLu recalled.

As a result, LuLu began performing country gospel music and has been recording and touring for more than 40 years. "Years later, seeing her on TV, I was happy that a Buckner kid had made something of themselves," Sue praised. "She deserved all that success!"

LuLu's biography on IMDb — the online source for

celebrity data — reports that LuLu agreed to return to Hee Haw only if one Christian song would be performed every episode. To fulfill her request, a Christian Barber Shop routine was created, featuring Archie Campbell, Grandpa Jones, Roy Clark and a rotating cast member. After Hee Haw's run ended, Roy reportedly called LuLu his favorite female cast member.

LuLu remains grateful for the program that transformed her from orphan to stardom. "The show was a wonderful time in my life because I had no family to speak of, and we became kind of like a family. We went through marriages, divorces and deaths together — all the things life takes you through in a real family," LuLu admitted. "Everyone involved was a great support to me when I most needed it."

Today, Lulu performs gospel concerts, at women's events and even does some stand-up comedy. Post Hee Haw life has found her receiving Christian music's highest honor, the Dove Award, on her way to becoming a member of the Christian Music Gospel Hall of Fame.

In 2019, she joined tour mates Buck Trent, Jana Jae and Misty Rowe on a series of Kornfield Friends reunion concerts — celebrating Hee Haw's 50th anniversary. Lulu also co-authored her biography, This Is My Story; This Is My Song.

Readers will find painstaking honesty on an early life marked with abandonment, broken relationships and even police encounters, until LuLu found direction. "Despite all I've experienced and all the bad personal choices I've made, I'm a living example of God's grace," she expressed.

At 75, LuLu resides in Tennessee with her three fur babies, where she enjoys ziplining, crafting jewelry and making homemade candy for friends. "Singing is still my favorite thing to do in life," she noted. "What I get to do in continuing to sing and make people laugh is a privilege and a blessing." NOW


