

ROCK BOTTOM TO RECOVERY

These days, Nikki Thomas wakes to prayer while drinking her coffee. Every day, she fights against her drug addiction by practicing the 12 steps of recovery, helping others find their lighted way through that dark veil and, at day's end, she finds an inner peace and mission. "It's my faith in God's promise to Job ... trust the walk and everything that was lost will be restored and multiplied," Nikki said.

Hitting rock bottom happened one night when, as she watched her daughters sleep, Nikki was contemplating how to commit suicide. "The next day, I sent the girls to their dad and took all the opioids I could get," Nikki recalled. "I was using meth and opioids and had fallen down [their] rabbit hole. I had nothing left to lose, so I didn't care about anything."

An Arkansas native, Nikki was born to parents who worked hard and played hard. "My mom was an addict, and my dad left us when I was 5," she remembered. "I was a party girl in school who could still make great grades. I graduated high school, and my mom and I got to Corsicana where I needed a way to support us. I took a job in a club where I met my husband."

By her mid-20s, Nikki was married, and the couple were using recreational drugs and alcohol with his friends when the kids weren't around. "I was living the 'soccer mom' life and was on the honor roll at Navarro College studying to be a paralegal/prelaw major," she shared. "I wondered then why I was OK after using, and everyone else wasn't." Her opioid use started after being prescribed pain killers following a miscarriage. "I had almost died in surgery, but I felt normal with the pills," she explained. "When the drugs kicked in, I had sunshine in me, but I was becoming more reclusive because I couldn't quit." Her husband, after a motorcycle accident, also received pain medication prescriptions, giving Nikki easy access.

Then the arrests and divorce came. In all, Nikki's record shows two felonies and several misdemeanor arrests for possession of a controlled substance and family disturbance. Her ex-husband gained custody of their daughters. "I had lost my identity as a mom," she said. She was spiraling further downward. "I was released on probation after serving 48 days in county jail but was arrested again. I served eight months before a hearing where I pleaded with then DA Lowell Thompson, who I knew from my paralegal studies, and Judge Putnam to let me go to a residential treatment center. I knew I needed to do this to fight for my life," Nikki stated. "I went first to a center in Granger, Texas, and then one in Austin. I had a lot of work to do and had to trust God."

It wasn't easy to return to Corsicana after treatment. "I had to come home and face life's skeletons. I had nothing no kids, car, home, job, school," Nikki said. "I had lots of work to do, so I tapped into support groups. Opioids had made me feel everything was OK emotionally and physically. After I stopped using, I felt I couldn't control anything. Friends gave me a place to stay. I had known Susan Hale who had been my professor and who then owned the diner. I asked Susan for a job, and she gave me one. She was 100 percent supportive. Judge Davenport ate lunch often at the diner. He and his wife, Carole, and I had lots of discussions on the legal, moral and ethical aspects as well as the stigma and punishments for drug abuse and addiction.

Then Nikki was offered a job in the recovery community. "I now understand the science of addiction and the physical and emotional symptoms," she explained. "It took me four years after I returned to regain custody of my daughters who have been supportive of me, including making my story transparent to help others. They are my biggest critics and cheerleaders and deserve to walk through this new life's light with me. I had to prove to the court and my family I felt like I was in control again. My story is relatable to so many today, and telling it keeps me going forward.

"Getting my girls home and being able to re-establish my place in our community are two of my best




experiences. My absence while in treatment wasn't in vain. I've made amends to my family and friends, and I love being able to be there for the people I love and those who need me. I like making new friends and seeing my family heal. I've learned so much from being knocked on my butt. I'm learning who I am."


Nikki's biggest challenge in staying sober is that she knows because of her metabolism, she can be addicted and remain functional. She's considering a return to college and hopes to work with the DA Will Thompson's office to establish a Diversion Court, which will allow addicts to get residential treatment. Nikki works toward community education and the "embracement" of treatment before punishment.

She offers the following advice to those who have taken the path of addiction. "Call your addiction out for what it is. Being honest with yourself is the first step. Addicts lie to themselves and others because secrets keep us safe. The second step is to get help. Most of the time, there's a placement in a treatment facility even for a patient without insurance. Calling and reaching out doesn't usually result in immediate resources, but it's a start. You must get to the root cause of your mental health crisis or addiction. Life can get better. Just reach out and get help." NOW







Mama Mamie Stubbs' Orange Cookies

Cookies:

1/2 cup shortening

3/4 cup sugar

1 egg

1 1/4 cups flour

1/4 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. baking soda

2 Tbsp. orange juice

 $1 \frac{1}{2}$ tsp. orange rind

Topping:

1/4 cup sugar

2 tsp. orange juice

- **1.** For cookies: Preheat the oven to 350 F; grease a baking sheet. In a bowl, cream the shortening and sugar together until the mixture is fluffy. Add the egg; blend well.
- **2.** Sift the dry ingredients together into another bowl; add to the creamed mixture. Add the orange juice and rind; mix well.
- **3.** For topping: In a bowl, mix the sugar and orange juice until the sugar is dissolved.
- **4.** Drop the dough by spoonfuls onto the baking sheet 2 inches apart; with a measuring spoon, indent the center of each cookie.
- **5.** Drop 1/4 tsp. of the topping into each indention; Bake for 8-10 minutes until the cookies are light brown. Remove from the oven immediately; let cool.

Quick, Easy and Delicious Goulash

2 lbs. ground meat

I white onion, peeled and chopped

I red onion, peeled and chopped

1 24-oz. can Hunt's Meat Flavored Pasta Sauce

4 pasta sauce cans water

1 10-oz. can Ro-Tel Diced Tomatoes and Green Chilies

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

1 16-oz. bag medium-size shell pasta

- **I.** In a skillet, brown the ground meat and onions; set aside.
- **2.** In a stew pot, add the pasta sauce, water, Ro-Tel, salt and pepper; bring the mixture to a boil.
- **3.** Add the meat mixture; return the goulash to a boil. Add the pasta; boil the mixture until the pasta is tender.

Chicken and Dumplings

This recipe may be quadrupled.

I chicken breast, stewed, deboned, pulled or chopped

2 cups flour

2 tsp. baking powder

I tsp. salt

1 tsp. pepper

1/3 cup Crisco Sweet milk, to desired consistency

- **1.** Prepare the chicken in a stockpot; set aside, reserving the stock. Sift the flour, baking powder, salt and pepper together into a bowl. Cut in the Crisco until the flour mixture is soft with a pebbly look. Add enough sweet milk to make a soft dough; if the dough becomes sticky, add more flour. 2. Let the dough stand for at least 10-15 minutes. On a floured cutting board, roll the dough to about 1/16-inch thickness. Slice the dough into 2-inch squares; drop the squares in layers into the chicken stock and chicken, bringing the stock to a rolling boil. Allow the stock to boil over each layer of squares before adding another or they will stick together.
- **3.** Cover the pan; cook for 12-15 minutes; let stand about 10 minutes before serving.

Cold Weather Stew

- 1 1-lb. bag carrots, peeled and cut into bite-size chunks
- 1 5-lb. bag potatoes, peeled and diced (divided use)
- 2 1/2 lbs. stew meat, Pike's Peak or rump roast preferred
- I white onion, chopped
- I yellow onion, chopped
- 1 24-oz. can Hunt's Pasta Sauce
- 1 16-oz. can Ro-Tel tomatoes
- 2 8-oz. cans tomato paste
- **1.** Fill a stew pot 2/3 of the way up with water; add the carrots. Bring to a boil.
- 2. Add two potatoes; cook at least 20 minutes, or until the potatoes have dissolved.
- 3. Cut the meat into bite-size chunks: in a skillet, brown the meat and onions.
- 4. Add the meat mixture, remaining ingredients and the rest of the potatoes to the stew pot. Simmer until the potatoes are softened.

Quick Peach Cobbler

This recipe can be used for fried pies by shaping the dough into pie tins.

Filling:

1 20-oz. can peaches 1 1/2 cups sugar 1 stick butter

1/2 tsp. cinnamon or nutmeg

Piecrust:

3 cups flour 1 1/2 cups Crisco 1/2 tsp. salt 1 tsp. vinegar 7 Tbsp. cold water

1. For filling: Preheat the oven to 350 F. Into a saucepan, pour the peaches, 1 peach







3 okra pods, sliced Handful of fresh green beans (or 1 14.5-oz. can) Mild cheddar or mozzarella cheese, sliced

- **1.** In a steamer, bring the water to a boil; steam the kale for at least 5 minutes.
- **2.** Add the remaining vegetables; steam about 3 minutes for soft food or remove sooner for al dente.
- **3.** Serve with mild cheddar or mozzarella cheese slices.

can of water, sugar, butter and cinnamon or nutmeg; heat until the butter is melted and the sugar has dissolved.

- **2.** For piecrust: In a bowl, mix the flour, Crisco and salt; cut together until the dough has a soft, small pebbly look.
- 3. Add the vinegar and water; mix well.
- **4.** On a floured cutting board, roll out the dough; cut into strips.
- **5.** In a treated baking pan, add half the peach mixture; top with half the dough

strips. Pour in the remaining peach mixture; top with the remaining dough strips. Bake until the strips are brown.


















A wonderful place to visit anytime of the year, the colder months in Texas might be the perfect time to escape to Oʻahu, Hawaii. One of the big four islands, Oʻahu, "The Heart of Hawaii," offers a variety of activities. Of course, lying on the beach sipping a mai tai ranks high on the list of many visitors. Whether relaxing or ready to explore, with so many options, consider taking more than a week to get plenty of beach time alongside experiencing all the island offers.

From the renowned Waikiki beach to the North Shore for surfers, Oʻahu's beaches in places like Ko Olina don't disappoint. Many include lagoons where gentler waves allow for splashing in the ocean and snorkeling without having waves crash too hard. Although the beaches are public, private entities and resorts rent cabanas and chairs, and these beaches tend toward fewer crowds. For truly secluded beaches, you might need a local to point you in the right direction.

With blue water and waves crashing against rocks, don't miss the sun rising or setting from the beach, while spectacular colors fill the sky. Or hop aboard one of the many chartered boats for a romantic sunset cruise. During early mornings, you might catch an exercise class or people walking or jogging beside the ocean. To satisfy your more adventurous side, try a hike

to the iconic volcano crater, Lē'ahi, or one of the tropical mountain trails.

While many people seek the Polynesian Gardens, you might also want to visit places such as the Honolulu Botanical Gardens, the Waimea Falls Park and Dole Plantation. Throughout the island, enjoy bright flora and a variety of birds, and chickens run as free as any fowl. Every Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday, the Hawaiian Railway Society Sugar Cane Train runs from Ewa to Kahe Point, with a stop at Ko Olina for those who want to purchase ice cream. The fun two-hour trip includes a bit of sugar cane history.

Be sure to plan a day at Pearl Harbor, taking several hours to tour the museums and visitor's center. As you walk through the recounted timeline, let your imagination take you to December 7, 1941. A surreal atmosphere of beauty mixed with sorrow covers Pearl Harbor, and few leave untouched by the experience.

For those who love city life, both Honolulu and Waikiki offer scores of shopping opportunities, restaurants and vibrant night life. But don't neglect the outskirts, where smaller communities provide a taste of Hawaiian cuisine and culture. 


