A bright smile, a helping hand, a listening ear, a willing spirit — Mr. Johnny "Bubba" Calhoun has been described in all these ways. He's remembered fondly by many Corsicana ISD students, parents and staff members who knew him during his 20-year career at Bowie Elementary as head custodian, and, at 81 years young, he still works part time at a flea market and volunteers to help anyone who needs grass mowed or a little something done. "I start my day's journey by giving it to the Lord," he said. "I like to stop by and see how people are. They always say I made their day."

A Corsicana native, Mr. Calhoun and his brothers grew up picking and pulling cotton and doing "whatever we could" to help their family. He was attending G.W. Jackson High School when his father died while moving a house. "I dropped out of school to help Momma more. She worked hard, too. For fun, I rested," he remembered. "I've worked from having to use horses to today's tractors."

For many years, Mr. Calhoun worked for Chattanooga Glass Company putting labels on bottles. "That machine turned and never stopped. It was like a thrasher, and that job was OK, but I had always wanted to work in the school system," he recalled. That opportunity finally came. "Mr. [Jerry] Ashcraft hired me to be a custodian at Bowie, and then in the summers, when schools shut down, I headed up crews on other campuses. We cleaned everything, and got the job done," Mr. Calhoun said. "I couldn't have asked for a better place to work. The teachers and kids were great."

Recently a gathering, organized by Rosie Driver Travenia, was held in honor of Mr. Calhoun. The event was hosted by Nancy Neal. At the event, Sandra Hughes, a former Bowie teacher said, "He has an amazing, giving heart, and the Bowie staff always admired and loved him. I remember how he paid for children's lunches, so they wouldn't be embarrassed. He bought shoes for children, and he kept belts in his janitorial closet for kids without them. Mr. Calhoun would sometimes bring me a cup of hot coffee ... just because! He always came by my classroom to check on me."

Another staff member, Debbie Meador, remembered Mr. Calhoun taking care of students and acknowledging each of them every day. "We were colleagues, but I'm lucky to call him a friend," she said.





Terri Orn, another retired Bowie teacher, recalled, "I always had hundreds of staples everywhere. Mr. Calhoun made me a long stick with a magnet, so I wouldn't have to sit on the floor and pick them up! Such a thoughtful guy!"

"Mr. Calhoun always brightened our day with his friendly smile," a former student's parent stated.

Another parent said, "Mr. Calhoun is an absolute true hero in my eyes. I would love for my kids to meet him. They all received several Calhoun Awards at Bowie. They know how special an award it is, but they don't know him." Her children received that chance at the recent gathering.

Other teachers remembered Mr. Calhoun would jump-start their cars' dead batteries at the end of long days and be available if the school alarms went off in the night or on weekends. He fixed whatever he could, including a student's wheelchair that would often break down, causing the father to make a trip to school. "I brought wrenches and took care of that wheelchair," Mr. Calhoun explained. "I gave little tasks to kids. They wanted to take care of things. If kids wanted to talk, I was there and would try to solve some problems for them. Once a boy asked me how long we were going to be friends. I replied, 'As long as you want.' I tried to always make new persons feel at home. I left gossip alone. I've tried to treat people the way I want to be treated. Linda Brown was a faithful person to work with. We custodians acted crazy sometimes to cheer teachers up."





Mr. Calhoun's advice is sound, and he practices what he preaches. "Keep talking to the Lord and keep right with Him. Give respect, and you'll get respect." To young people he suggests, "Be careful who you travel with and talk to. If you have a friend, be a friend. Think of and find something you really care about and go for it — and keep one foot in front of the next while always smiling. Remember, everybody's just trying to make it in this world, and everybody's got their own way of doing things."

In addition to helping friends and neighbors, Mr. Calhoun is an active, lifelong member of Mt. Olive Missionary Baptist Church. "I've seen a bunch of preachers go through there. I like living in Corsicana," he said. He and his wife, Christine Jackson Calhoun, have four grown children and four grandchildren, and his brother, Jack Calhoun, lives nearby. Mr. Calhoun counts as his mentors, his cousin, Wilbert Calhoun, and mortician, Bob Scott,

The seeds of kindness sown at Bowie Elementary for so long by Mr. Calhoun are being reaped these days from many of those students, now grown, and their parents. "When my wife went to the hospital with a broken leg, one of the kids I'd known was a nurse taking care of her, and when I had pneumonia, Dr. [John] Updegrove told me, 'We're going to get you well.' He brought his kids to visit me. Some of the teachers played the lottery hoping to get rich. One finally won, and she still comes over for a visit on my birthdays."

These days, kids coming to the flea market, receive Mr. Calhoun's special attention. "If I see a family's basket with no kids' toys in it, I make sure the kids leave with toys. They wave and say, 'Bye, bye, Bubba." NOW

-TALES OF TEXAS —

I ADOPTED THE WORLD

Names of civil rights leaders like Martin Luther King Jr, Malcolm X and John Lewis are known to everyone nationwide, young and old. But here in Texas, much of the progress toward equality was spearheaded by an unassuming woman in old South Dallas. Juanita Jewel Craft helped change the face of race relations in Dallas and beyond.

Juanita Craft isn't the household name that the men are, but she should be. Born in 1902, in Round Rock, by 1925 Craft, as her friends called her, was living in Dallas. She earned a teaching certificate from Samuel Huston College, but worked as a maid at the Adolphus Hotel. In 1935, she joined the NAACP and found her life's work. As the membership chair of the Dallas branch, she hid the membership rolls to protect her fellow members from those who would have used the rolls to harass those fighting for change. She assisted in organizing 182 branches of the NAACP and worked hard to ensure that African-Americans paid their poll tax and secured their rights to vote. She herself had been the first African-American woman to vote in Dallas County. She was surrogate mother

to the young members of the Dallas branch, advising them on life choices and choosing the right brides and husbands, as they struggled to integrate lunch counters, schools and the State Fair. She would later be elected to the Dallas City Council for two terms.

Mrs. Craft owned a small house, on Warren St., near Fair Park, but she lived in the guest house out back, running the main house as a boarding house for young men who are leaders in today's NAACP. She welcomed important figures like MLK and LBJ to her house, when they came to talk to her about her work. But she also welcomed the neighbor kids. The girl who lived next door, named her daughter Juanita, for her, and called her Neet. "Mrs. Craft met a lot of people and had a lot of photographs. On one wall of her sitting room, she had a picture of herself with JFK standing behind her. On the opposite wall was a picture of Neet," Patricia Perez recalled.

Patricia was one of those youth who spent countless hours at the Craft house. "That was my house of power. You just felt it being around her. She showed us in word and deed. She was militant, but quiet. She knew what wasn't right and knew it could be changed. She had all these community connections, and she used them to enhance our lives. I felt empowered and special when I was with her."

Bob Lydia was one of those young men who received advice from Mrs. Craft. "I rented a room from her. She'd give me and the other young guys advice on which girls to avoid. Craft was like a mother. She was also artistic. She'd buy wooden boxes and turn them into decoupage purses. She wouldn't accept any help making them, but she did take the leaves we'd bring her to use. She'd sit on her bed and put in all the screws and nails. She could sew anything. She kept a garden and canned and made jams and jellies. She was very frugal. She wanted to teach us young people how to behave and be respectful. If you wanted something done, all you had to do was sit down with her, and she'd figure out a way. She didn't have to scream and holler. I thought I was too young, but Craft decided I should be the first vice president for the Young Adult Council of the Dallas NAACP, and she made it happen."

In 1977, Mrs. Craft was interviewed for the Black Women's Oral History Project held at Harvard University. In the interview she discussed the hardships of growing up Black in the pre-Civil Rights era. Her mother died in 1935 from tuberculosis, because there was no state hospital for Black people. But she never let hardship stop her. And her reach extended far beyond South Dallas, or even Texas. She worked with Eleanor Roosevelt and other national leaders on important issues, and rallied support for Thurgood Marshall as he litigated cases eliminating whites-only primary elections and "separate but equal" education.

She was 73 when she was first elected to the Dallas City Council, where she served from 1975-1979. "When she won, she said, 'I showed 'em!' And a few other words," Bob Lydia remembered. She died in 1985, leaving behind a better Texas for all of us. Her house on Warren St. is now a Civil Rights museum. NOW



- **I.** Wash the peppers. Cut off the tops; remove the seeds and membrane from the peppers' centers. Set aside.
- 2. In a large bowl, mix all other ingredients, except the ketchup, with your hands until well blended.
- **3.** Set the peppers in a large casserole dish; fill the openings with the meat mixture.
- **4.** Bake, uncovered, at 350 F for 45 minutes. Remove from the oven; top each pepper with ketchup. Return the peppers to the oven for 15-20 minutes.
- **5.** Before serving, pierce each pepper on the bottom so the liquid can drain.
