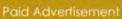
newest techniques and technology. I'm also a native Spanish speaker. I grew up speaking both languages. Our YouTube videos explaining procedures are available in both English and Spanish."

You don't have to spend piles of money or go to enormous lengths to show love for your valentine. Keep allergies and asthma in mind and see an allergist with any questions.

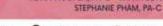

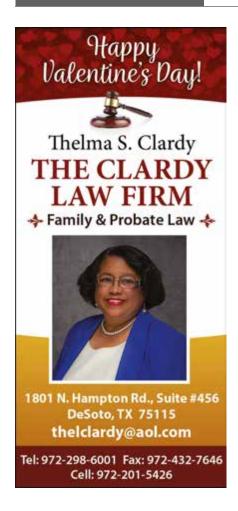
February is Heart Month ...

Be good to your heart!









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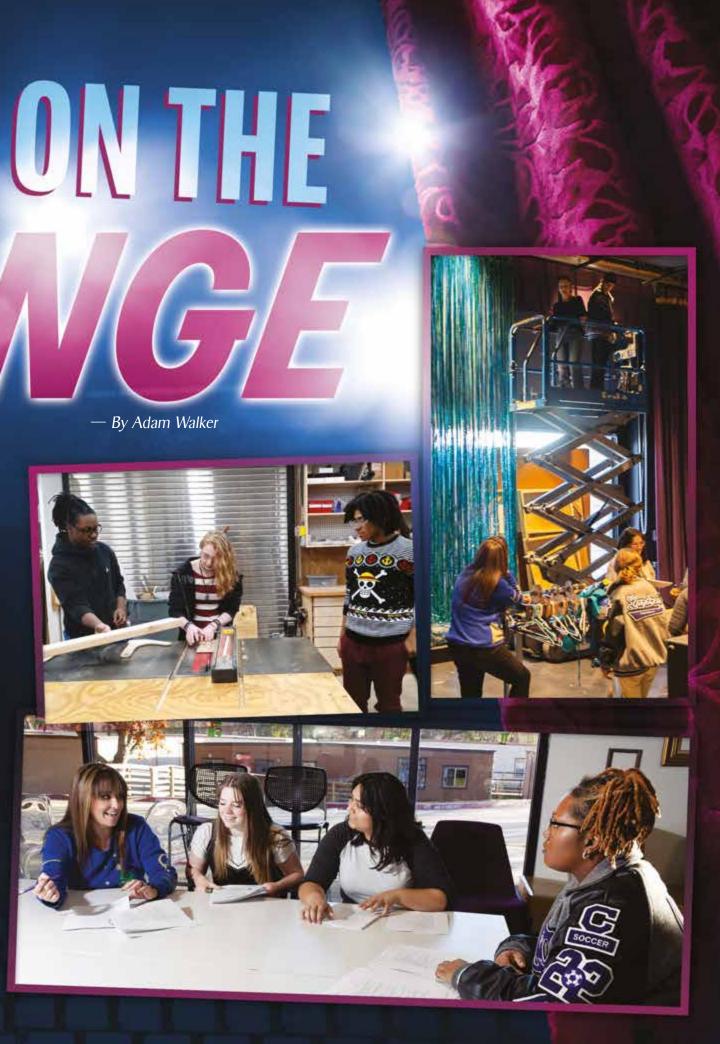
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only have six weeks from first read through to opening night! We're really busy. I'm directing, and I'm also in charge of costumes. But I don't have to make much. The actors will get most of the stuff from thrift stores, so they're comfortable with their costumes. I show them ideas of what they should wear, and they find something that works. The two narrators have multiple costume changes, but the sexy lumberjack and the prince pretending not to be famous and the girl who runs a store that's shutting down don't have to change costumes. We really want to focus on the characters, because Hallmark characters are very specific types. The narrators are my favorites."

Assistant director, Jurnee, the junior on the team, agreed. "The narrators say things like, 'Hurry up and introduce yourselves. We already know what's going on. We don't have time for this!' They're really funny. The narrators are really excited about their roles. When they got the parts, they were like, 'Yeah, this is for us!' They have chemistry, because they've known each other since middle school."

"This play has something for everyone," Savannah explained. "I don't do well with cringe love stories, but this is so funny. Some of these jokes won't go over anyone's head."

"The three of us have really different personalities," admitted co-director, Skyler, the other senior on the team. "But we meet in the middle. We originally thought about doing this play in December, but that would have meant back-to-back musicals, so we moved this one to February, between the musicals. And it works for Valentine's. It basically rolls all the Hallmark movies into one. It's really cringy, so the actors are pushed into roles they aren't used to. We're friends with most of the cast outside of theater, so it's fun to watch how different they are in rehearsal. As co-director. I have to make sure the actors have their lines going and know how to play their characters. I set up the background for them."

"As assistant director, I assist with whatever is needed," Jurnee reported. "I handle details. The other directors deal with the big picture. I assist with the props and with communication. This is my second year in drama. I started because I like meeting new people

and getting to know stuff we have in common. I like singing, but I wanted to learn to act. It's interesting to see the actors learn their characters. We have a lot of new leads in this production. We're planning for all three of us to dress alike, in Christmas sweaters, for opening night. I can't wait to see how it comes out!"



"The script starts slow, introducing the characters and their storylines," Skyler explained. "The middle speeds up. Like the narrators say, 'We don't need to know all this!' I'm a big Hallmark fan. I love Christmas in July. But the acting in the movies is really uncomfortable. Why did they do that? It's the same in the play. The actors have to get familiar with their characters, but they're not their characters. They say, 'Eww ... that sounds so weird to say!' It's fun to watch. It's so cringy!"

"One of the things you learn, when you're trying to do so many things at once," Savannah admitted, "is that some people need everything laid out, and others can just do it on their own. You have to take everything day by day. We rehearse every Tuesday, Thursday and Friday until opening day." The production will run February 15-17, and details are on the school website.

"We started this as something fun for the kids to participate in," Elizabeth remembered. "It was a hit with the students. In 2018, two students proposed that theater become a high school elective and a permanent part of the school, in their senior project. We named our black box theater the Price Family Theater, because of the support they've shown the program."

If you are looking for a different way to celebrate Valentine's Day this year, you might want to see what these kids are doing at Village Tech. They welcome you to come cringe along with them! Now





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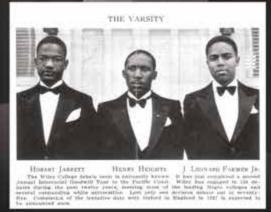
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POWERFUL PERSUADERS

In honor of Black History Month, we recount the story of the 1935 Wiley College Debate Team from Marshall, Texas. A group of African-American students, led by Melvin B. Tolson, set out on a historic journey and challenged the practice of racial segregation but also served as an inspiration to the entire country.

During this oppressive time, Wiley College emerged as a beacon of hope and resilience, offering African-American students a chance to excel academically. At the heart of the debate team's success was their dedicated debate coach, Mr. Tolson. He was a charismatic educator, columnist, poet and politician who believed in the power of words and saw debate as a means to effect change. Mr. Tolson's vision went beyond the competitive aspect of debate. He aimed to empower his students, encouraging them to be critical thinkers and advocates for justice.

However, after the Emancipation Proclamation, the United States denied African-Americans access to educational opportunities and equal rights. Marshall, Texas, was no exception to this harsh reality, with Jim Crow laws governing

every aspect of life. Pi Kappa Delta, the national forensic organization that oversaw collegiate debate competitions in America, only allowed white students to compete, so Mr. Tolson established Alpha Phi Omega to support historically black universities. Wiley students participated in unofficial, no-decision competitions with white colleges.

The Wiley College Debate Team took on a monumental challenge by engaging in interracial debates against white colleges in the segregated South. These debates were groundbreaking in a time when racial segregation was deeply rooted, and the idea of African-American students competing against white students was virtually unheard of. Wiley College's willingness to challenge the racial norms of the era was a testament to the courage and determination of its students and their coach.

One of the most iconic moments in the history of the team was their debate with the reigning national debate champion, the University of Southern California. The Wiley College debaters challenged and ultimately defeated this prestigious institution, marking a huge accomplishment.

The legacy of the team extends far beyond their victory over USC. Their courage and perseverance paved the way for future generations of African-American students and debaters. The team's success inspired other historically Black colleges and universities to engage in debate, challenging the racial status quo in the academic arena.

Wiley College's commitment to academic excellence and social justice continued long after this team. Today, the college stands as a symbol of resilience and determination, continuing to empower students from diverse backgrounds to excel academically and make a positive impact on society.

The story of the Wiley College Debate Team serves as a powerful reminder of the role that debate can play in effecting social change. Through the art of argument and persuasion, these students not only won debates, but also challenged the prevailing notions of racial inequality. They demonstrated that intellectual prowess and eloquence had no racial boundaries.

In 2007 the movie The Great Debaters, produced by Oprah Winfrey and directed by Denzel Washington, depicted this powerful story. Denzel Washington portraved Melvin B. Tolson. capturing his passion and dedication to the art of debate and social justice. The film also showcased the challenges the team faced, both inside and outside the debate halls, as they battled prejudice and racism. The victory over USC (depicted as Harvard in the movie), while a triumph on its own, was just one part of the larger narrative of the team's struggle for recognition and equality.

The debate team from Wiley College showed the tenacity of the human spirit and the power of education.

These students and their coach dared to dream, to challenge the laws and to use their voices to effect change. Their victory over the University of Southern California was not just a win — it was a triumph of the human spirit over prejudice and injustice. The legacy of the Wiley College Debate Team continues to inspire us today, reminding us of the enduring power of words and the potential for positive change through education and dialogue. NOW

Chocolate Chunk Cookies

8 oz. unsalted butter, room temperature

5.5 oz. granulated sugar

5.5 oz. brown sugar

2 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla

1 oz. molasses

13 oz. flour

4 oz. oats (optional)

I tsp. baking soda

1/4 tsp. salt14 oz. chocolate chips1 1/2 cups walnuts (optional)

- **I.** In a bowl, cream together the butter and sugars until smooth. Scrape the bowl down to the bottom. Add the eggs, vanilla and molasses until blended, scraping the bowl down to the bottom.
- **2.** In a separate bowl, combine the dry ingredients. Add to the butter mixture and

combine, scraping the bottom of the bowl. Fold in the chocolate and walnuts being careful not to overmix.

3. Drop by spoonfuls onto cookie sheets; bake at 350 F for 9 minutes.

Chocolate Chip Banana Bread

2 1/4 cups flour

1 1/2 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. salt

6 oz. butter

1 1/2 cups sugar

3 eggs

2 ripe bananas, mashed

1 1/2 tsp. vanilla

3/4 cup sour cream

I cup chocolate chips

- **1.** Preheat the oven to 350 F. Grease a loaf pan with nonstick spray.
- **2.** In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, baking soda and salt; set aside.
- **3.** Using a handheld mixer, or a stand mixer with a paddle attachment, beat the butter and sugar together on high speed until smooth

and creamy, about 2 minutes. With the mixer on medium speed, add the eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add the mashed bananas and vanilla extract until combined.

- **4.** With the mixer on low speed, slowly beat the dry ingredients into the wet ingredients until no flour pockets remain. Do not overmix. Fold in the sour cream and chocolate chips.
- **5.** Pour and spread the batter into the prepared baking pan. Bake for 45-50 minutes. The bread is done when a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean with only a few small moist crumbs.

Beef Birria

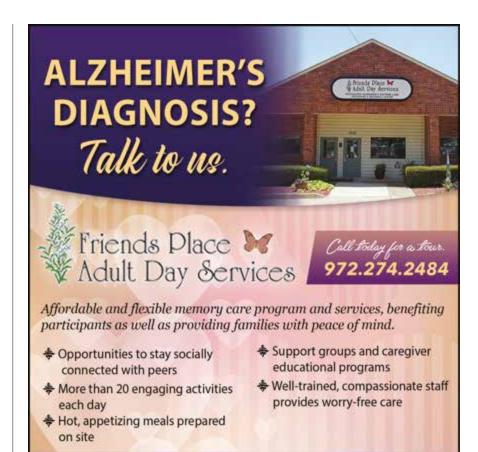
- 6 lbs. short ribs (bone in) or back ribs (bone in)
- I large white onion, cut in half crosswise
- I garlic bulb (Cut the narrow top off.)
- I carrot, quartered
- 5 bay leaves, dried
- 8 guajillo chilis, stems and seeds removed

Hot water, enough to cover meat

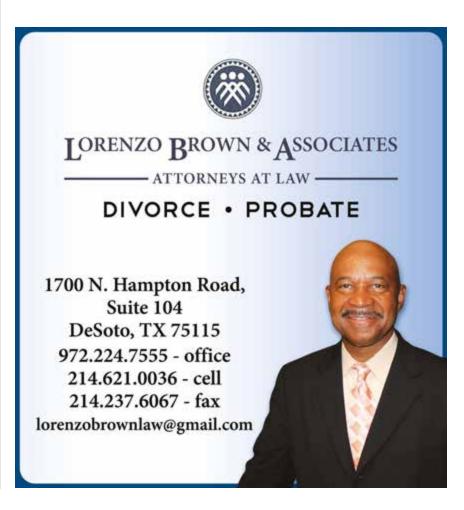
- 3 Tbsp. chicken bouillon
- 1 tsp. Mexican oregano
- 1 tsp. ground cumin
- I tsp. salt, or to taste
- 1-2 tsp. chili powder (optional)
- 14-16 white corn tortillas or 6-8 ramen noddle cups
- 2 cups quesadilla cheese or any good melting cheese
- **I.** In a large pot, add the meat, onion, garlic, carrots, bay leaves and dried peppers. Cover with water. Add the chicken bouillon, oregano, cumin, salt and chili powder, if using; stir to combine. Bring to a boil. Skim the top of the pot to remove the foam.
- **2.** After 30 minutes, remove the peppers; place them in a blender. Add up to 1 cup of the broth to get a smooth consistency. Add the blended peppers into the broth; stir to combine.
- **3.** Cover; simmer about 3 hours, until the meat is tender and shreds easily. Once the meat is cooked, taste the broth and adjust the seasonings. Remove the meat from the broth; finely chop.
- **4.** Skim the grease from the broth. Pour the grease into a small saucepan.
- **5.** Dip the tortillas into the grease; heat them in a skillet over medium heat. Top the tortilla with the beef and cheese. Fold the tortilla with a spatula, pressing down to close it. Cook both sides until the taco is crisp.
- **6.** *Variation:* Use the broth in a ramen cup. Cut up some cilantro, onions and radishes, for toppings.

Lasagna

1/2 lb. Italian sausage (or use all beef if you don't eat pork)



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- 1/2 lb. lean ground beef 1 medium onion, diced
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 6-oz. can tomato paste
- 1 28-oz. can crushed tomatoes
- 1 15-oz. can tomato sauce
- 1 tsp. sugar
- I Tbsp. dried Italian seasoning (Use fresh if you have it.)
- 2 tsp. salt (divided use)
- 1 Tbsp. basil
- I tsp. ground black pepper (divided use)
- 1 15-oz. container ricotta cheese
- I large egg, beaten
- 1 Tbsp. fresh parsley, chopped

12 lasagna noodles, fresh or oven ready 1/2 cup Parmesan or mozzarella cheese, grated

- **I.** Preheat the oven to 375 F.
- **2.** Heat a large saucepan; add the sausage and beef. Cook, stirring occasionally. Add the onions and garlic; cook, stirring often, until tender.
- **3.** Stir in the tomato paste; cook, stirring constantly. Stir in the crushed tomatoes; tomato sauce; sugar; Italian seasoning; I 1/2 tsp. salt (or to taste); basil; and 3/4 tsp. black pepper (or to taste). Bring to a simmer, until slightly thickened, about 15 to 20 minutes.

- **4.** In a medium bowl, stir together the ricotta; egg; parsley, 1/2 tsp. salt (or to taste); and 1/4 tsp. black pepper (or to taste). Set aside.
- **5.** Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil over high heat; cook the lasagna noodles according to the package directions.
- **6.** Lightly grease a 9x13-inch casserole dish with cooking spray. Spread 2 cups of the meat sauce in the bottom of the prepared dish. Layer 4 cooked noodles in an even layer. Spread half of the cheese filling in an even layer over the noodles. Repeat the layers; top with the remaining 4 noodles. Spread the remaining meat sauce in an even layer over the top of the noodles. Top with the grated cheese.
- **7.** Cover with aluminum foil. Bake for 30 minutes. Uncover; continue baking until the cheese is melted. Let rest for 15 minutes before serving.

It was not until 1939 that construction crews broke ground on the river project with Hugman, otherwise known as the Father of the River Walk, serving as architect to develop the area for flood management and to increase tourism.

The 15-mile stretch of river now includes three main sections. The

Downtown area boasts restaurants, hotels, retail space and boat tours. Museum Reach just north of Downtown includes hotels, residences and a number of museums. The section south of Downtown, Mission Reach, is a woodland habitat that connects several UNESCO World Heritage-designated missions.

#4 Comal River in New Braunfels

The Comal River is considered the shortest river in Texas, at 2.5 miles, and stays a constant 70-72 degrees. When entering the river at Prince Solms Park, the first splash of cold water is a shock, but your body acclimates as you float on a tube toward the tube chute. If you choose to forgo the chute, you can walk around and return to floating down river through several small rapids.

Disposable items, such as sandwich baggies, cans and water bottles are no longer allowed on the river, so be sure to pack reusable containers for food and beverages. Wear a hat, sunglasses, sunscreen and, if necessary, grab a waterproof bag to store important belongings. Paid parking is available at the park, or you can catch a shuttle from one of the local tubing outfitters.



#5 Fort Worth Stockyards

The historic Fort Worth Stockyards has been a staple in North Texas since it was established in 1849 as an outpost for cattle drives along the Chisholm Trail. In recent years, more hotels were added to the area, and horse and mule barns underwent restorations to create Mule Alley.

New restaurant concepts and trendy shops add to some Stockyard staples — Billy Bob's for all of your honkytonk needs and Cowtown Coliseum for an evening of rodeo. Visitors can ride a mechanical bull, take a ghost tour, taste some wines and catch one of the twice-daily cattle drives of the Fort Worth Herd. Paid parking is available if street spaces are occupied.

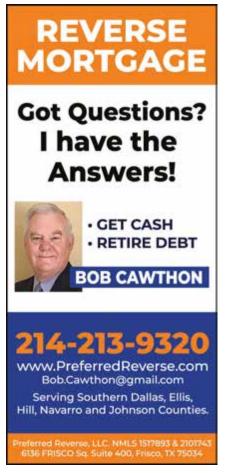

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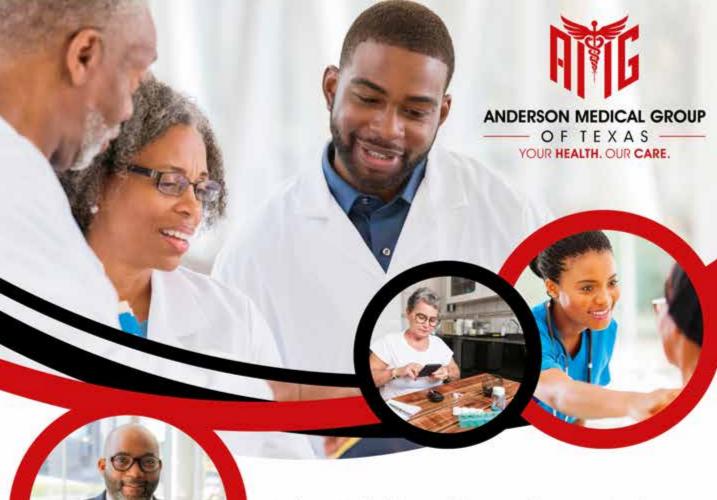












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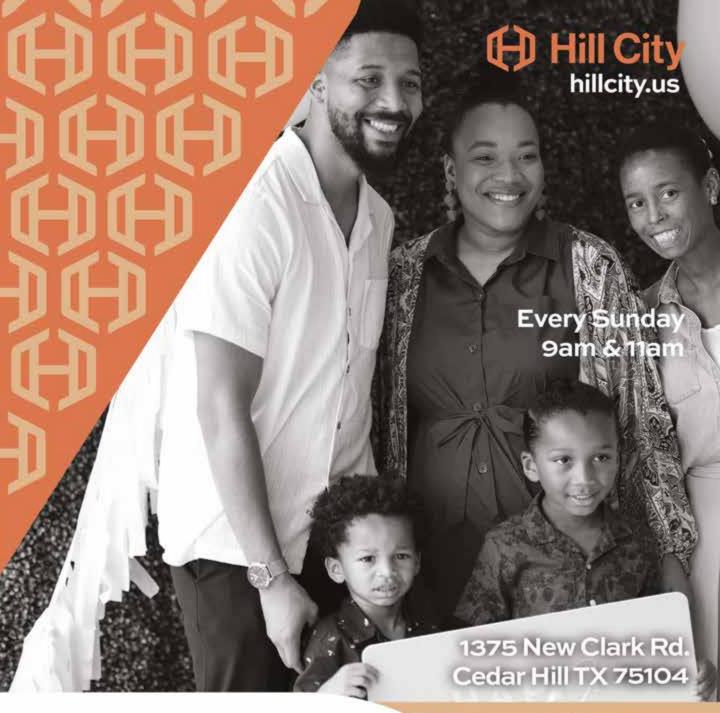
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
