



EDITOR'S NOTE

February folklore ...

Meaning, "to cleanse," February comes from the Latin word februa and was named for Februalia, a Roman purification festival. It may be the shortest month of the year, but it is not lacking in interesting facts. It was originally the last month of the year, added to the Roman calendar in 713 B.C. In 450 B.C., it was moved to the second month.

Since the Romans considered even numbers unlucky, all months originally had 29 days. When someone discovered the sum of all months was an even number, one day was removed from February to make the total odd (and, thus, not unlucky). While other months eventually included 30 or 31 days, 28 stuck for February (except on Leap Years, when it has 29).

In modern times, February became recognized as Black History Month, officialized by President Gerald Ford in 1976. February 1 is observed as National Freedom Day, as on this day in 1865, President Abraham Lincoln signed a joint resolution abolishing slavery.

Other celebratory days in February include Groundhog's Day February 2, Valentine's Day February 14 and President's Day February 17 (originally established to honor George Washington and Abraham Lincoln who were born this month, but now recognizes all who have held the office).

Other days of note in February include Ice Cream for Breakfast Day (first Saturday), Super Bowl Sunday (second Sunday) and National Wear Red Day (first Friday) raising awareness toward heart disease in women. Among many other celebratory opportunities, February 17 is Random Acts of Kindness Day.

February zodiac signs include Aquarius and Pisces, and the birthstone is amethyst. February is said to be one of the most frequently misspelled words in the English language. Even if we can't spell it, we can find some way to enjoy it.







Following in Kim's and Amanda's footsteps, Troop 338 is made up of 20 young ladies with a heart for their community. "Our troop has used the funds





Ranging in age from 8 to 11, each Scout has different goals. "Our Juniors are currently working toward earning their Bronze Awards, and each girl is always looking for more ways to help out in our community," Kim said.

Participating in these activities and making new friends is what draws most girls to Scouting. "They love the time they get to spend together, the hustle of cookie season and

celebrating our achievements in big ways," Amanda outlined.





For most couples with little ones, a pet is a necessity. Dogs provide hours of playtime for children, teach responsibility and offer unconditional love and companionship. But which dog breeds are best for children? The answer varies for each family depending on multiple factors including yard space, allergies and the child's age, among other things.

Soon-to-be dog owners with large, enclosed yards could choose more energetic breeds, since the dog has plenty of outdoor room for exercise. 



Handmade Valentine cards for a classroom giveaway not only save money, but they are a great way to tap into your child's creativity and occupy them for an afternoon. If getting started is a challenge, however, it can help to offer a few prompts for kids to copy or build upon.

Your first step, however, is to round up construction paper, markers, crayons and any other craft supplies that may come in handy. If your child wants to put their cards in an envelope, keep the size of the envelopes you have on hand in mind when cutting construction paper for cards. The less your child has to step away to find necessary supplies, the smoother the card crafting will go!

If kids have a hard time getting started on their own, it can help to create a few sample cards for them to follow. You might ask them to think of their favorite movie character, a game they enjoy playing or even popular slang among their classmates. These are great jumping off points for messages to include on valentines. If all else fails, here are a few simple themes to consider:

Tic-Tac-To My Heart. After cutting paper to the size that will fit your envelopes when folded in half, have children write the words "You Won ..." atop the front of the card. In the remaining space of the card, draw a tic-tac-toe board (also known by kids today as a hashtag symbol). Cut out three red hearts and glue those in boxes diagonally down the board. Fill in some of the remaining squares with X marks. On the bottom of the card front, the words "My Heart" complete the message. Children can write "Happy Valentine's Day!" inside, or just sign their name.

Puzzle Perfect. Have children draw two connected puzzle pieces. Draw one half



of a heart within one puzzle piece, completing the rest of the heart on the other piece, so that one full heart is seen across the two pieces. Draw the pieces large enough so that they will cover a good portion of the front of the card when cut in two. Color the heart, then thickly outline the puzzle pieces in black. Cut apart the two puzzle pieces, gluing one piece in the center of the card front, and the other on the inside of the card. Children can write a variety of messages related to puzzles on the card, such as (outside) "Our Friendship," (inside) "Is a Perfect Fit!" Or (outside) "Like a Puzzle Piece." (inside) "You Complete Our Class!"

Lucky in Love. Help children cut out four small hearts from green construction paper, then glue them atop the card front in the shape of a four-leaf clover, drawing a stem to the ground. Write something like, "I'm SO Lucky ..." atop the card. Inside, cut out a single red heart, also drawing a stem from it to the ground. The inside message can be any variation of why your child feels lucky: "You're My Friend," "You're My Classmate" or, even, "You're My Valentine."


Remember, you can always go with a smiley face heart on the front and "Happy Valentine's Day!" inside. Simple is heartfelt, too! NOW








CookingNOW IN THE KITCHEN WITH JANE MCCASLAND

Oak Leaf resident Jane McCasland doesn't remember a time when she wasn't in the kitchen with her parents. "Then, watching my chef father teach my own children how to make pot roast in an oldfashioned, cast-iron Dutch oven became a favorite cooking memory of mine as an adult," Jane noted.

Her favorite thing to bake is pound cake. "Because it is economical, simple to make and tastes so good," she said.

Knitting, reading and cooking classes are Jane's favorite ways to spend her time. "I also serve on the Midlothian Civic Center Board and Ellis County Children's Advocacy Board," she continued, "and I am Charter Organization Representative for the Midlothian units of Boy Scouts of America." NOW

Million Dollar Pound Cake

1 lb. butter

3 cups sugar

6 eggs

4 cups flour

3/4 cup milk

I tsp. vanilla

1/2 tsp. almond extract

- 1. Preheat the oven to 300 F. Grease and flour a tube pan. Cream the butter and sugar until light and fluffy.
- **2.** Add the eggs, one at a time. Add the flour, alternating with the milk, beginning and ending with the flour.
- 3. Add the vanilla and almond extract.
- 4. Bake for 1 hour and 40 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

Fried Mozzarella Egg Rolls

Oil, for frying 12 egg roll wrappers 60 pieces pepperoni 12 pieces mozzarella cheese (String cheese works best.) Pizza sauce, for dipping

- **I.** Heat the oil to 375 F.
- 2. On top of 1 egg roll wrapper, place 5 pieces of pepperoni in a row. Place one piece of cheese on top.
- **3.** Fold the corners in and over the cheese. Moisten with water to seal. Roll tightly.
- 4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 with the remaining wrappers. Fry each wrapper for 1 minute on each side. Drain on paper towels. Serve with pizza sauce.

Cane River Dessert

1 cup flour

1 stick butter, melted

1 cup pecans, finely chopped

4 cups whipped topping (divided use) (I prefer Cool Whip.)

1 cup powdered sugar

1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese

1 3.9-oz. pkg. chocolate pudding mix

1 3.9-oz. pkg. vanilla pudding mix

3 cups milk (divided use)

1 HERSHEY'S cocoa bar

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 F. Mix the flour. butter and pecans. Spread the mixture in a 13x9-inch pan. Bake for 20 minutes; let cool.
- 2. Mix 2 cups of the whipped topping, powdered sugar and the cream cheese. Spread over the cooled crust.
- 3. Mix the puddings separately with 1 1/2 cups of milk for each. Let it stand to thicken for a few minutes. Pour and spread the chocolate first, then the vanilla, over the cream cheese layer.

4. Refrigerate. Before serving, top with the remaining whipped topping and chocolate shavings from the HERSHEY'S cocoa bar.

Cookies & Cream Fluff

Best served very cold.

2 cups milk

- 1 3.4-oz. box instant vanilla pudding
- 1 8-oz. container whipped topping (divided use) (I prefer Cool Whip.)
- 15 Oreo cookies, or more to your taste, crushed
- **I.** Stir the milk into the pudding for 2 minutes. Gently fold in half of the container of whipped topping.
- **2.** Stir in the Oreo cookies. Chill until ready to serve.
- **3.** When ready to serve, top with the remaining whipped topping and more crushed Oreos, as desired.

Sesame Beef

- 4 Tbsp. soy sauce
- 4 Tbsp. white sugar
- 4 Tbsp. oil
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 green onions, chopped
- 1 lb. thin round steak, cut into strips
- 2 Tbsp. sesame seeds

Broccoli, to taste (optional)

- **1.** Mix the soy sauce, sugar, oil, garlic and onions in a large bag. Add the steak strips to the bag.
- **2.** Cover; refrigerate for a minimum of 30 minutes, preferably overnight.
- **3.** Cook in a wok or frying pan until brown, about 5 minutes. Add the sesame seeds; cook an additional 5 minutes.
- **4.** *Variation:* Make this beef with broccoli by stir frying some broccoli before cooking the beef. Add the broccoli and heat it through when close to done.


