HOSIS

From dawn to dusk light floods into the cavernous studios at 100West. Soft sounds of a small city's streets waking to another day, accompanied by train whistles traveling the many tracks that crisscross Corsicana, have been welcoming artists and writers from all parts of the world to a working, residency haven for 10 years. "This year's anniversary is an opportunity to produce durable materials that will transcend time and look both forward and backward — be introspective — and re-establish our mission," Kyle Hobratschk, founder, stated.

An Open Studios anniversary celebration, overflowing into a street party on May 28, 2022, will feature a documentary film designed to show the mission at work from the beginning when local artists and writers, David Searcy and Nancy Rebel, joined Kyle in hosting other artists in a functional space designed for creative minds to flourish. "The documentary shows what this space has become to us, as we show the founders' works and also help the community understand our bigger narrative," Kyle shared. "100W and the other residency properties are interesting buildings to share with others, and we get to share Corsicana's attributes with our residents."

A current resident, Céline Leroy, a book translator from Paris, France, is an example of the residency stretching its scope into its next decade. "I've worked for 21 years translating American fiction, poetry and nonfiction to French," she said. "The residency gives me time to think with no pressure." Céline is currently translating a Peter Heller novel and Barbara Kingsolver's first book of poetry. She explained her role, "Even though I'm not the writer, I'm like a classical musician interpreting what someone wrote. Translation is an art form, a form of performance, but translators are invisible. Readers being able to read works from other places gives more layers of understanding. I'm grateful to be here, surrounded by artists. I like to observe people when traveling, and I'm seeing how the artists work."

Céline has traveled to other European countries and New York City as well as serving a residency in Canada. She was educated at Paris' Sorbonne University, where she studied American contemporary literature. Thus, she loves Corsicana's brick streets and being able to walk the downtown easily. She became aware of the residency through a mutual friendship with John Freeman, David's literary agent.

"We've been developing circles like that over these past 10 years," Kyle added.

Kyle's mentor, Jay Sullivan, served as the Meadows School of Arts chair at Southern Methodist University. He encouraged Kyle to found 100W and is its current board chairman. "After I looked at the possibilities in Corsicana, I told Kyle, 'You owe it to yourself the chance to fail," Jay stated. "Kyle is precise to

a fault, and his precision is his greatest asset. He's willing to investigate and learn." Jay finds his work with the residency an extension of his teaching and administrative career. "I've worked with a large network of people, and through the residency, we're creating a larger community."

A sculptor, Jay has found that Corsicana answered another of his interests. A piece of his collection, Architectures of the Body, was cast by Corsicana's Oil City. "I've worked with them for about eight years with cast-iron," Jay remarked. While artists' residencies are usually in large cities, he finds Corsicana's location perfect, since it's near the DFW Metroplex. "Residencies give one control over his/ her life to see, touch and feel within the local micro-environment," he added. 100W residents are given opportunities to interact with local school students and staff and show projects during Open Studio sessions hosted by the residency each term. "In Corsicana's residency an artist or writer must be self-sufficient. Residents can connect to people in different ways that allow them to think in other ways," Jay explained.

The residency's next 10 years are being planned as the celebration continues. "We're putting in place the structure to be financially stable," Jay stated. "We have a good, supportive, forward-thinking board. We've done well in growth, but the discussion now is centered on what's the right size for the residency after having spent years expanding its footprint. A key point is that this has been a volunteer organization focused on Kyle's work and





precision, but the institution needs to grow and be sustainable without that one person."

Kyle readily agreed. "The residency has fed me, and I really found me and my hometown in Corsicana," he said. "I think more like a big city kid, but as a small city kid, I get to live a little more." With expansion to other properties in the "campus," however, he's found it challenging to "manage the material world. In the past two years, I've started turning the daily management of systems over to a small team of parttime employees," Kyle said. With his SMU degree in painting, Kyle's work in furniture design and making, drafting, carpentry and architectural rendering can be seen throughout the residency's campus buildings. His mother, Celeste Allan, an architect, has also helped professionally. Looking into the future, Kyle expects to have more time for travel and to work in painting, furniture and printmaking.

"I've loved seeing 100W filled with people for our big dinner parties, and we cook the dinner ourselves. Those have been a blast!" Kyle remembered. "My other great memory will be the opening of Storefront. It's great to see people engaged and see the fruits of the residency enjoyed by so many. The magic is the intimacy of it all."

Depending on his time and residents' needs, Kyle will remain available. The founders' task of reviewing annually the more than 200 applications received and selecting the next year's 18 residents is one he enjoys. We look for excellence and have a complex matrix of diversity across disciplines and media, national and international balance and diversity in age and backgrounds," Kyle said. And when future residents take evening breaks, strolling the sidewalks that line the brick streets, Kyle and his dog, Pinto Bean, will likely be there, ever widening those circles and enjoying Corsicana's small city rhythms. **NOW**

While legends often sound far-fetched, all of them have a basis of truth. In the case of María de Jesús de Ágreda, many pieces of her story have no explanation outside a mysterious and miraculous event.

Born April 2, 1602, María Fernández Coronel grew up with a zeal for telling people the Gospel story, wanting nothing more than to see people come to a saving knowledge of her Lord. From early childhood, she longed to become a missionary in the New World. Unfortunately, young girls of her era didn't have that career option.

Some say even as an infant, she had divine knowledge. A child prone to visions, preoccupation with spirituality and obsessed with compassion for the poor, her family misunderstood her. Often feeling wounded and unloved, she retreated to the depths of her soul. With desires of mission work squashed, María made a decision. At only 8 years old, the girl announced a determination to take a chastity vow and enter the sisterhood.

Seven years later, her father and two brothers entered a monastery. Following what they all believed as guidance from the Lord, María's parents converted their castle into a convent — the Franciscan Convent of the Immaculate Conception at

Ágreda. Sister María de Jesús (as she was known after taking her vows) entered the sisterhood without ever leaving her home.

Instead of esteeming her, the other nuns ridiculed and humiliated her. At one point, the Mother Superior requested an ecclesiastical examination. After much questioning, the Provincial of Burgos, Fray Anthorn de Villacre, declared her neither foolish nor mad. He declared that Sister María de Jesús attained true sanctity, a transcendent state of spirituality. The nuns then held her in the highest esteem, thrusting her into unwanted limelight.

Not long after that, during fervent prayer following communion one day, the young nun entered a trance. She found herself walking among dark-skinned men where they gathered, hunted and lived a simple life. Returning many times in the same fashion, sometimes two and three times a day, she taught them the fundamentals of Christian faith and lifestyle. Sister María de Jesús claimed over 500 visits to the New World, although she physically never left Spain.

Later, under the guidance of her confessor, Francisco Andres de la Torre, she detailed accounts of her journeys in a book titled, *The Mystical City of God.* Questioned extensively, Sister María de Jesús provided glorious details that she could not possibly know without having been among the native Americans.

The Jumano tribe, inhabitants of Texas and parts of New Mexico, have long shared stories of the Blue Nun. They say she appeared hundreds of times to them, coming from the sky.

Because of the cobalt blue clothing she wore, they called her the Lady in Blue. Many settlers also claimed this same woman came to them, ministering to their souls.

The Jumano Braves, moved by the nun, traveled to a mission in New Mexico and shared with the priests what they learned from her. From 1620, increasing numbers of native Americans came, requesting missionaries so they could learn more and receive blessings. When friars finally visited the village, the natives welcomed them with two wooden crosses, covered with flowers they said the Lady in Blue helped them decorate. When shown a photo of an older Franciscan nun, they declared their Lady in Blue wore the same clothing but was much younger and very beautiful.

The Jumano legend states that the morning after the Blue Nun's last visit, they woke to a field of beautiful flowers that matched the color of her cloak. According to them, the Texas bluebonnet appeared in her absence.

A few years after her death in 1665, the church declared Sister María de Jesús de Ágreda venerable. In the 20th century, they opened her coffin and found the beloved nun's body uncorrupted by death.

Did she indeed visit America at the same time she remained in Spain? Some believe she did, although no one can explain the possibility of such visits outside a miracle of bi-location.

Those who saw the Lady in Blue recorded and told their stories for generations. Whether a true visit by a miracle, or a vision that appeared to many people, the Jumano tribe, settlers and others learned about Christianity enough to want more knowledge and blessings from the church. Sister María's deepest desire to see people in the New World learn about Christianity came to fruition — a fact history can't dispute. **NOW**

Cheese Egg Float

- 3 Tbsp. butter
- 3 Tbsp. flour
- 1/2 tsp. onion powder
- 1/2 tsp. celery salt
- 1 1/2 cups whole milk
- 4-5 eggs
- I cup cheddar or Co-jack cheese, grated
- 3 English muffins
- Butter, to taste
- 4-6 slices Canadian bacon, cooked

- **1.** In a saucepan, melt the butter. Add the flour and seasonings; stir until smooth.
- **2.** Add the milk; stir until the mixture has thickened. Pour into an 8x11.5x2-inch (2-qt.) baking dish.
- **3.** Break the eggs on top of the mixture; top with the cheese. Bake at 350 F for 20 minutes.
- **4.** Toast the English muffin halves; spread with butter to taste. Top each muffin half with a Canadian bacon slice; top with the egg and sauce mixture.

Tommy's Tampa Caesar Salad

2 garlic cloves, minced

1/2 cup, plus 2 Tbsp. olive oil

1 cup French bread, cubed

Kosher salt, to taste

Black pepper, freshly ground, to taste (divided use)

- 1 2-oz. tin of anchovies packed in oil; finely chopped and mashed
- 1/4 tsp. dried mustard
- 4 drops Worcestershire sauce
- 3 Tbsp. red wine vinegar

Juice of 1 large fresh lemon

- 2 heads Romaine lettuce, torn into serving pieces
- 1/3 cup Parmesan cheese, grated or shaved
- **I.** Blend the garlic cloves with the olive oil to create garlic oil; set aside for 6-8 hours to flavor the oil.
- **2.** After blending the garlic clove/olive oil mixture, use 2 Tbsp. of the garlic oil to make croutons by browning the bread until lightly browned. Season with salt and pepper.
- **3.** For dressing: In a bowl, combine the anchovies with the remaining 1/2 cup garlic oil; add the mustard and a few grindings of

pepper. Add the Worcestershire sauce, red wine vinegar and lemon juice.

4. In a serving bowl, pour the dressing over the lettuce; top with the garlic croutons. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

Burgundy Mushrooms

- 4 lbs. button mushrooms, washed
- 1 liter Burgundy wine
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1/2 lb. butter
- 1 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp. dill seed
- I tsp. black pepper, freshly ground
- 4 beef bouillon cubes
- 4 chicken bouillon cubes
- 4 garlic cloves, peeled

Salt, to taste

Crusty bread

- **1.** In a large stock pot, add the first 10 ingredients; stir to combine. Bring the mixture to a boil over medium-high heat; reduce the heat to low. Simmer, covered, for 6 hours.
- **2.** Remove the lid; continue simmering, uncovered, for an additional 3 hours.
- **3.** Add salt at the end of the cooking process; serve with crusty bread.

PaPa's Eggnog

12 eggs 1 cup sugar Whiskey, to taste (optional) 1 qt. heavy cream 1 qt. milk Nutmeg, to taste

- **I.** Separate the eggs; beat the whites and yolks in separate bowls.
- **2.** Add the sugar to the yolks before whipping. If adding whiskey, add it slowly to the yolks while whipping.
- **3.** Add the cream and milk to the egg yolk and sugar mixture.
- **4.** Fold the stiffly whipped egg whites into the yolk eggnog mixture. Serve sprinkled with nutmeg.

Crescent Court Chocolate Chunk Cookies

1 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup sugar

2 sticks butter

3 Tbsp. Crisco shortening

1 tsp. salt

4 eggs

3 1/2 cups flour

1 1/2 tsp. baking soda

1/4 cup whole milk





2 cups pecans, chopped 8-oz. white chocolate chunks 8-oz. milk chocolate chunks 8-oz. semi-sweet chocolate chunks 1 cup mini-chocolate chips

1. In a bowl, cream the sugars, butter, shortening and salt. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition.

2. In a separate bowl, combine the flour and

baking soda. Alternating the flour mixture and milk, add both to the sugar mixture. Mix by hand until the dough starts to come together.

3. In another bowl, combine the pecans, chunks and chips; fold into the creamed dough.

4. Using a large spoon, drop cookie dough onto a creased cookie sheet; lightly press down on each cookie.

5. Bake at 350 F for 15 minutes or until golden brown.

Italian Cheese Bread


