



EDITOR'S NOTE


Hello, Corsicana!

A high school art class triggered Camile O'Briant's interest in photography and all things artistic. "I was curious about the medium and fell in love with it," Camile recalled. "I ruined many a shirt in the dark room." Her mom realized Camile's newfound passion and gave her daughter a Canon camera with two lenses. "That was my first camera, a Sear's special," Camile added. "I was really surprised since my mom, a single mother, was very frugal."

As a kid who always colored within the lines, Camile said, "My family didn't promote creativity, but later I found sketches I'd done that my grandmother had kept, and my great-grandmother quilted. My mother was musical but never thought of herself as an artist until she started beading in her 70s." A native of Abilene, Texas, Camile was a student at Westlake High School in Austin when she realized art was her thing. "I was making macaroni sculptures in a beginner's art class and then started drawing faces. That was a quantum leap," she remembered. "The next semester, I was enrolled in the honors art class, doing advanced drawing and taking photographs for the yearbook. Westlake was amazing! Had I not gone there, I might not be where I am. That experience pointed to my future."

Preparation for that future continued at Lon Morris College for two years before Camile transferred to the University of North Texas. Her major was in fine arts photography with a minor in radio, TV and film. She's worked in the film industry in both Los Angeles and New York City. It was while she was at UNT that Camile started building her portfolio. "I took still photos for short films," she stated. "I love taking photos of old cars, people's head shots, NYC street scenes, architecture and flowers. I've never stopped building my portfolio and have decades of work. My core style has stayed the same."

While Camile was working in New York, she pulled together all her creative talents into developing, designing and photographing her own line of clothing and home goods. "I was bored on a subway ride into work one day and started to








create floral designs from my photos with my iPhone," she explained. Her signature is mixing bright floral prints with any color of one of her original plaid designs, and the results are her creations viewed online at La Nuit Bleue Atelier. After having had some art shows in Austin and LA, she said, "The art world has changed. With an internet link, I can share my art. Every new thing I try is an opportunity to learn." I try not to ride every trend. I still want to be me."

Corsicana became Camile's home two years ago due partially to encouragement from her cousin, Amy Parnell. "My mom had passed away, and I was ready for a change from NYC after the pandemic," Camile shared. "I was ready for a slower pace. Amy's also creative and loves to decorate. She introduced me to Corsicana's







art community, and I kept coming back until I moved." Camile enjoys building her portfolio even when traveling, a favorite thing to do — often photographing models internationally. "I love flowers, and the variety changes depending on where I live and travel," she explained. Internationally, she's toured Europe and South Korea.

Sony and her iPhone are her camera choices now. "They capture everything I need, are cinematic and lightweight,"

she explained. She works mostly digitally with apps and her iPad, but Camile plans and sketches out ideas. "I used to edit while on the subway and take photos on my lunch breaks in NYC," she recalled.

Ideas are always coming into her creative mind, and she writes them down. "I'm like a little kid, excited when I see something finished," she admitted. "I'm continuously inspired and can become paralyzed by so many ideas. I've created systems to overcome that overwhelmed feeling. I have seasons for different kinds of creativity, can leave it, but taking a break can be scary. I had to realize that not all ideas are going to get done and accept that's OK. It's using creative energy management."


Camile considers herself to be an artist first. "I learned composition and drawing first, both of which work well in photography," she explained. Working digitally while designing and shooting the models and videos helps her artistic endeavors. "It's like having a tool kit that helps me manage everything," she added. "Every job I've ever had, I can pull out something from it I learned and

use it today, even if I hated the job." Mediums in which she has worked include pencil and watercolor sketches, pen and ink painting on top of photos and paper cutouts on top of images. She finds painting in oil or watercolors doesn't come naturally for her. "I'm more linear thinking today," she added.

Knowing when a piece is finished can be challenging for some artists. "There's a point at which one can over tinker," Camile shared. "I can get bored also and less inspired, so I think there's a natural ending. However, in photography, I continue to tinker and edit many versions of images."

Although she's enjoying life in Corsicana, Camile treasures the time spent in LA and New York City. "I've always been influenced and inspired by the film industry and cinema," she stated. "It's a big part of my life." Photography is her favorite medium. She concluded, "It's technical, and I can see the result quickly. There's something magical about capturing a moment that won't happen again."







CookingNOW

IN THE KITCHEN WITH VIRGINIA RIDDLE

CorsicanaNOW Community Editor Virginia Riddle grew up in Waco—partly in the city, partly on the family farm. The oldest of four kids, she was helping in the kitchen by age 5. "I am mostly self-taught, but my paternal grandmother taught me how to make dinner rolls from scratch and to can my granddad's garden produce. I enjoyed cooking down-home healthy in large batches when I was raising my four children, and I still do when the family gathers with the addition of six grandchildren," said the retired teacher, administrator and college professor.

Here she shares recipes from the book, *Recipes to Remember*, which was compiled by her neighbors when she lived in Austin during the 1980s. "We were all moms who formed a neighborhood babysitting co-op and organized monthly street dinners," she said. "I still use those recipes and remember my neighbors."

Lana's Fruit Dip

8-oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
 8-oz. can crushed pineapple with juice
 cup pecans, finely chopped
 cup dates, finely chopped
 Cinnamon, to taste
 Nutmeg, to taste

1. In a dip bowl, combine the first 4 ingredients. Sprinkle the top with cinnamon and nutmeg.

Apple, pear and strawberry slices and or orange segments, to taste

2. Serve with apple, pear, strawberry slices and/or orange segments or any other favorite fruit.

Carol's Karo Calico Salad

3/4 cup Karo Light Corn Syrup 2/3 cup red wine vinegar

1/3 Mazola Corn Oil

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. dried dill weed

1/4 cup pimiento, chopped

I small onion, chopped

1 16-oz. can wax beans, drained

1 16-oz. can whole green beans, drained

1 16-oz. can kidney beans, drained

1. In a bowl or blender, mix the corn syrup, vinegar, corn oil, salt and dill weed; set aside.

2. In another bowl, add the remaining ingredients; mix well. Pour the corn syrup mixture over the pimiento mixture; toss.

3. Refrigerate overnight; drain before serving.

Gertrude's Apple Crumble Top Pie

Gertrude had raised her family but was a wonderful sub-in grandmother to all our kids.

6 apples
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 cup flour
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup butter

1. Core and peel the apples; grate each apple into a buttered 6x 10-inch casserole dish.

2. In a bowl, mix the water, granulated sugar, flour, cinnamon and brown sugar; cut in the butter. Blend well; pour over the apples.

3. Bake for 45 minutes at 325 F.

Bobbi's Hamburger Barley Soup

Makes $10 \ 1 \ 1/2$ -cup servings.

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef or turkey 6 cups water

3 beef bouillon cubes

1/3 cup barley

1 tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper

2 bay leaves

1/4 cup ketchup

1 28-oz. can tomatoes with juice

1 8-oz. can tomato paste

2 cups carrots, sliced

1 1/2 cups onion, chopped

1 1/2 cups celery, chopped

1/2 cup green pepper, chopped

- **1.** In a 5-qt. stock pot or Dutch oven, brown the ground beef or turkey; stir in the remaining ingredients. Slice open the whole tomatoes.
- **2.** Bring the soup to a boil; reduce the heat. Simmer 1 hour or until the vegetables and barley are tender.
- 3. Remove the bay leaves before serving.

Marlene's Broccoli Casserole

- 3 10-oz. pkgs. frozen broccoli florets 1 8-oz. pkg. Kraft Jalapeño Cheese 1/2 stick butter
- 1 10.5-oz. can mushroom soup Breadcrumbs, to taste
- **1.** Lightly cook the broccoli according to package directions; drain. In a casserole baking dish, cut the broccoli florets into bite-size pieces.
- **2.** In a saucepan, melt the cheese and butter. Add the soup; stir well. Pour the cheese mixture over the broccoli, lightly stirring for full coverage.
- **3.** Top with breadcrumbs; bake at 350 F for about 20 minutes or until the breadcrumbs are lightly browned and the dish is bubbly.




