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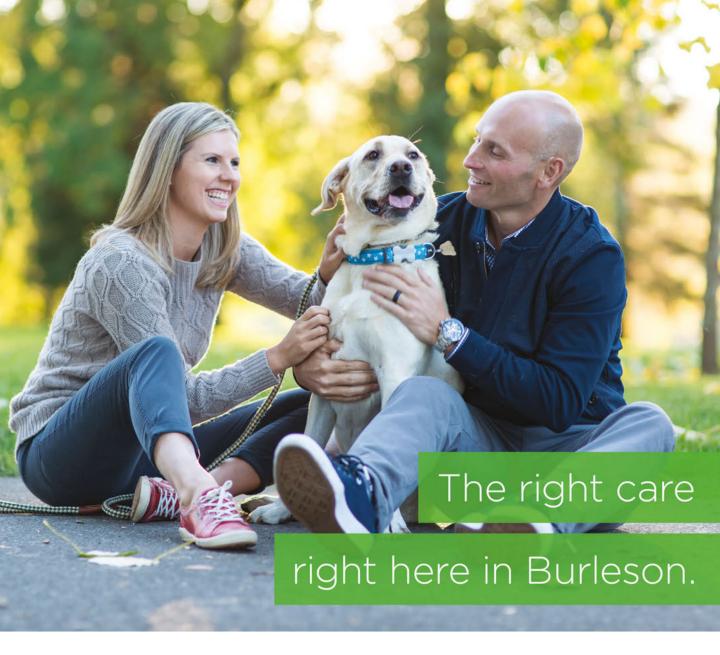
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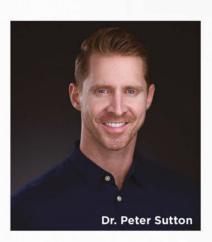

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# **EDITOR'S NOTE**

In recent years, one of my favorite summer activities has been lounging on an inner tube, book in hand, letting the chemically treated waves float me across the pool. Not only is it much more refreshing than sunbathing with a paperback on the deck, but other swimmers stare at you like you're some sort of nerdy deity. It's a total power move. I know that I'm not the only person who enjoys summer reading. There's a whole subgenre of books called "beach reads." Entire displays at bookstores are dedicated to these colorful, breezy books that pair perfectly with salty air and sunny skies. I don't know about you, but when I see these displays, I am filled with the sense of endless possibilities. The beginning of the summer season almost feels like the beginning of a new year, when everyone sets goals for what they wish to accomplish. In June, I'll create an impossible list of all the novels I wish to complete by the end of August. Of course, like most New Year's goals, I'll never finish my list. I get distracted by other books!

Wherever you read, I hope you find a good book this summer!



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The local library is a premier destination for many during the summer months — one where avid readers find the newest releases and families pass the time participating in free activities. The Summer Reading Program at the Burleson Public Library offers fun for all ages. From prizes for daily reading and chances to win themed baskets to live music and animal shows, the program provides a little something for everyone to enjoy each summer.

Becky Fowler, youth services librarian for ages 0-10, has helped grow the program over the past six years. "I love working with kids. I really love getting to connect them with books and making reading fun," she shared.

The original goal of the program was to provide an opportunity for children to continue reading throughout the summer, so they would not fall behind before school resumes in the fall. "The real focus has turned to just having fun, free programming for kids and families throughout the summer," Becky explained. "We're hoping that it will encourage them to keep reading, as well."

To keep youth interested in reading, Becky suggested finding a book they really love. "I find that it makes their world so much bigger and helps them connect with other people," she said. "It increases their empathy."

Anyone who participates in the Summer Reading Program, from infants to adults, will get prizes for reading throughout the months of June and July. The program previously required readers to track how many books or minutes they read, but now, younger participants and adults must only track the days they read. For every 10 days the participant reads, they get a prize. Those might include coupons from local businesses, candy and bookmarks.

Participants can also complete activities on a bingo card for a chance to win a prize basket. "The prize baskets are normally more significant," Becky said. Prize baskets might include art-related items or board games.

Because reading often begins to wane when readers enter their teenage years, the Burleson Public Library offers an alternative for the older youth to track reading. "We're going to have scratch-off tickets in the summer because a lot of teens don't want to track or complete activities," said Wendy Lastovica-Alvey, youth services librarian for ages 10-16. "Anytime they check out anything from the library, they can get a scratch-off ticket." The ticket might be an instant prize for candy, coupons or a raffle ticket for a chance to win one of the bigger prize baskets.



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Wendy is a former middle school art teacher and has been working at the library since December 2022. She plans to incorporate crafts, movies and cooking into program events for the teenagers to combine learning with a fun activity.

Wendy advises that teenagers borrow books about activities they find interesting, such as sports, hobbies or movies. "They all have some sort of interest, so if they like science fiction TV shows and movies, or superhero movies, then that can give you an idea of what to start with," she said. If the teenager does not like the book, the young reader should not give up. "We don't like everything, and that's OK. That doesn't mean there's not something out there you can find that you will like."

Although reading more throughout the summer is a goal of the program, fun activities are also a significant part. Events include musical performances; Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) presentations; a bubble foam party; an animal show; movie days; and craft days. "We're wrapping up this summer with a Harry Potter week, so we're going to have crafts and movie days, and all sorts of fun activities for all ages," Becky said.

Over the past couple of years, the Burleson Public Library has added activity kits to its collection. Kit examples include a book and an activity related to themes such as unicorns, dinosaurs, crocheting, puzzles and disc golf. One kit includes a telescope and book for stargazing, and the camping kit includes a tent. "You can try something out without going and buying all of the materials for it before you jump into a new hobby," Wendy explained.

"We call it a Library of Things," Becky said. "It's not just books anymore. There are a lot more physical items that people





may not want to buy if they're not sure they're going to use them. They can just borrow it from the library and bring it back."

A library card is not required to participate in the Summer Reading Program, but to borrow a library book or kit, one is necessary. All Burleson Independent School District students and staff, as well as residents living within city limits, get a free library card. If living outside of the city limits, the nonresident must pay an annual fee. "If it's not doable for you to pay the fee, we try to work with you," Becky said, adding the potential member can volunteer for five hours to get a free card.

The Burleson Public Library no longer charges late fees for overdue materials. "We don't want people to not come to the library because they're worried that they brought something back late, and they have fees," Becky explained. "We just want people to be reading."

Because of the library's collection development budget, new materials are added every month. The library offers books in hard copy and digital format, such as eBooks and eAudiobooks. Readers can also borrow a Playaway device with headphones to listen to books. The variety helps readers stay engaged and provides easier access.

"The community really supports us, and they are always game for the fun things we have planned. So, they make it really easy to do this job," Becky said. "We're hoping to have a good turnout for summer." NOW

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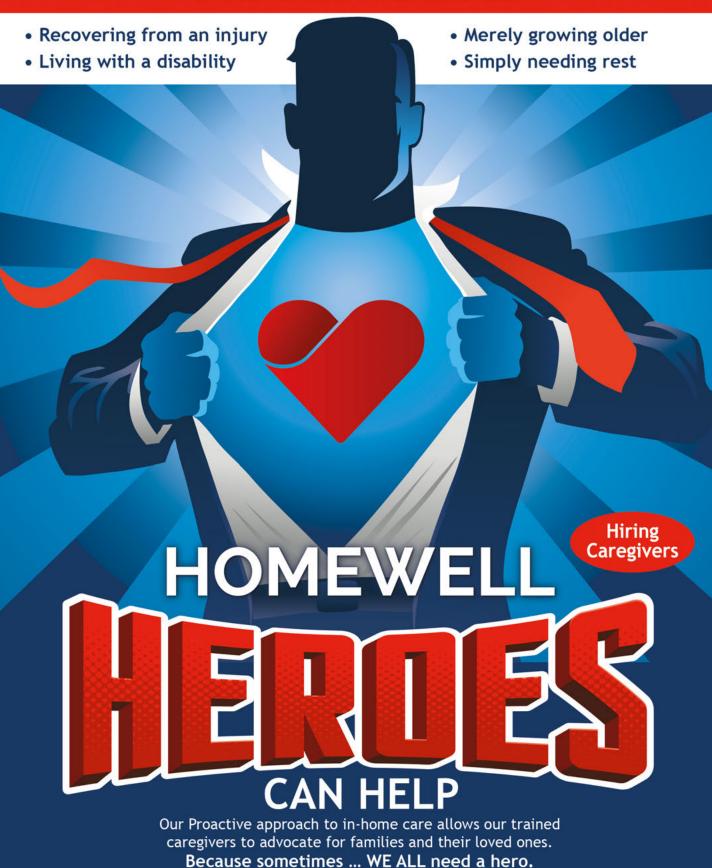
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# The Vine Medical Center

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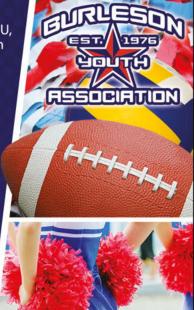

# **Chocolate Pie**

1 cup sugar

3 Tbsp. cornstarch

1/4 tsp. salt

6 Tbsp. Ghirardelli Chocolate Cocoa

2 Tbsp. cooking oil

2 cups milk or cream

3 egg yolks, slightly beaten

2 Tbsp. butter

1 tsp. vanilla

1 9-inch pie shell, baked and cooled

Meringue:

3 egg whites

1/2 tsp. vanilla

# 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar 6 Tbsp. sugar

- **I.** In a saucepan, combine the sugar, cornstarch and salt along with cocoa and oil. Gradually stir in the milk or cream. Cook and stir over medium-high heat until bubbly. Cook and stir 2 minutes; remove from heat.
- **2.** In a small bowl, add 3 spoons of the hot chocolate mixture into the beaten egg yolks; stir. Add the yolks mixture to the hot mixture; cook an additional 2 minutes, stirring constantly.
- **3.** Remove from heat; add the butter and vanilla. Pour into the cooled pie shell.
- **4.** For meringue: Beat the egg whites with the vanilla and cream of tartar until soft peaks form. Gradually add the sugar, beating until all the sugar is dissolved and stiff peaks form.
- **5.** Spread the meringue over the top of the pie. Bake at 350 F until the meringue is lightly browned.

# Turkey Dog Food

Makes about 6 bags of food.

- 3 lbs. ground turkey
  2 cups white or brown rice, cooked
  1 pkg. frozen peas and carrots,
  microwaved 1-2 minutes
- **1.** Sauté the turkey; add the remaining ingredients. Pour into a large bowl; mix well. **2.** Portion about 1 to 1 1/2 cups of the mixture into a Ziploc bag. Remove excess air. Seal and freeze. Repeat with remaining mixture.

# **Mushroom Tortellini Soup**

- 2 Tbsp. olive oil
- 1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms, sliced
- 4 cups vegetable or chicken broth
- I 14.5-oz. can diced tomatoes with basil, oregano and garlic, undrained
- 1 19-oz. pkg. frozen cheese tortellini Pepper, to taste
- 2 cups fresh baby spinach, coarsely chopped

Parmesan cheese, to taste

- **I.** Add the first 6 ingredients to a stockpot. Bring to a boil; turn down to a simmer. Cook until the tortellini is tender.
- 2. Add the spinach; cook until wilted.
- **3.** Serve topped with Parmesan cheese, and with a slice of warm bread.

#### Marinara With Pasta

- 3 Tbsp. olive oil
- 2 Tbsp. garlic, chopped
- 3 Tbsp. dried Italian seasoning
- 2 Tbsp. oregano
- 1 24-oz. jar RAO's Marinara Sauce
- I cup diced tomatoes

Fresh basil, torn (to taste)

Salt, to taste

Pepper, to taste

1 1-lb. pkg. spaghetti, cooked

- **I.** In a saucepan, add the olive oil. When heated, add the garlic, Italian seasoning and oregano. Mix until the mixture becomes fragrant and pasty.
- **2.** Add the marinara sauce and tomatoes. Add the basil, salt and pepper. Simmer at least 1 hour. Serve over spaghetti.

#### **Barbecue Ribs**

Handful of brown sugar

- 2 Tbsp. dry mustard
- 1 Tbsp. ginger
- 2 Tbsp., garlic, plus more to taste (divided use)

Soy sauce, to taste Salt, to taste





# Pepper, to taste I rack of ribs Barbecue sauce of your choice, to taste

- **I.** Mix the first 3 ingredients plus 2 Tbsp. of garlic powder in a small bowl. Add soy sauce until the mixture makes a paste.
- **2.** Add salt, pepper and garlic powder to taste to the rack of ribs. Rub the rub mixture on the front and back.



- **3.** Put the ribs in a cooking bag to marinate; refrigerate for at least 3 hours up to overnight.
- **4.** Bake in the oven at 250 F for 2-3 hours until tender.
- **5.** Remove from the oven. Turn off the oven. Add barbecue sauce; return to the oven to let the barbecue sauce meld into the ribs.

# Grilled Pork Chops With Peach-Tomato BBQ Sauce

- 1 Tbsp. olive oil
- I medium onion, finely chopped
- I clove garlic, minced
- I 1-inch piece of fresh ginger, peeled and grated
- 1 1/2 cups tomato sauce
- 1/2 cup peach jam
- 2 ripe peaches, peeled and cut into chunks
- I-2 Tbsp. sherry vinegar Salt, to taste Pepper, to taste
- 4 6- to 8-oz. pork chops
- **I.** Heat the olive oil in a medium pan over medium heat. Add the

- onions; cook until translucent. Add the garlic and ginger; cook 2 minutes.
- **2.** Stir in the tomato sauce, jam and peaches. Reduce heat to low; simmer until the sauce thickens, about 30 minutes.
- **3.** Stir in the vinegar to taste; add salt and pepper to taste. Let cool.
- **4.** Pour half of the barbecue sauce into a baggie. Add the pork chops, coating both sides.
- **5.** Grill the pork chops on a medium-hot grill or grill pan. Baste the chops with the remaining barbecue sauce. Make sure the chops are cooked thoroughly. Remove from the grill. Let rest for 10 minutes before serving.

# **ENJOYING SNACKS**

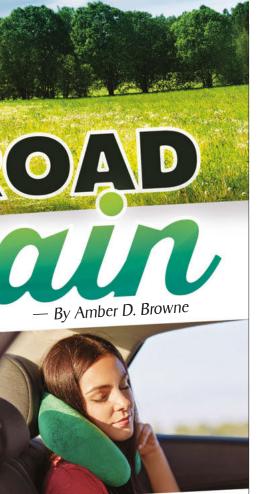
