

# EDITOR'S NOTE


### Happy August, Everyone!





International horse breeder Kelly Stewart said, "There comes a point in every rider's life when he wonders if it's all worth it. Then one look at the horse, and he realizes — it is."

For Lewis and Sherry Paulk, nothing could hold more truth. Since January 30, when their new horse arrived 62 days early, they certainly faced a deluge of difficult decisions. Was it worth the money and the enormous amount of time they spent on Sandi? Sherry, with a passion for horses, and Lewis, with a passion for life, uttered a resounding, "Yes, she is worth it all."

The Paulks celebrated their 36th wedding anniversary on May 28. That, itself, is a miracle, considering in 2011 doctors told them Lewis had a 24-25 percent chance of living 24 months. Though rare in men, they found stage 4 breast cancer, which also invaded 10 of 23 lymph nodes. After a rough year of treatment, Lewis found a new belief in miracles and a different perspective on life.



Through a series of events, they ended up with horses the owners didn't want to sell initially but then did. "It reignited Sherry's passion," Lewis admitted. Needing more space, they found the perfect place in Weatherford with almost 20 acres and an open-concept house where they could join with family and friends as they often do. They moved from Fort Worth in January 2018, bringing several horses along with them.

Because of Sherry's deep love for horses, Lewis admitted, "I knew if I wanted to spend any time with her, I'd have to get a horse, too." That was when he bought Jazzy, a Quarter Horse with great ancestral lines. She had her first baby, Roosters Kit Cat, without any problems, so they bred her through Buffalo Ranch a second time. Everything proceeded well for months. With a due date of April 2, her milk came in around mid-January. "I don't think she'll make it to her due date," the vet announced. January 30, Jazzy pinned her ears back at Kit Cat, something she rarely did.

In below freezing temperatures, Sherry had a load of hay delivered the next morning, some of which she promised to a woman from Tyler. The woman had a great deal of experience with birthing horses. As they worked on getting the hay out of the big truck, Sherry saw Jazzy lay down. By the time she got to the horse's side, she was already pushing out her baby. Baby Sandi hit the ground and tried to stand but collapsed. Arriving so early, she had no bones in her knees or ankles. The two women got the horses inside, dry and warm, where they waited for the vet. They milked the mama and got a couple of ounces down the 53-pound baby.

Upon arrival, the vet said, "Horses born 62 days early don't survive." Still, Sandi surprised them all. Alert, head held high,

she breathed on her own. Unbelievable. Although they didn't expect her to live, Sherry wanted to give Lewis a chance to meet the little one. Working in Alabama, he couldn't get a flight out until the next morning. So they moved Sandi to Weatherford Equine Hospital.

Unable to sleep, Lewis made the two-hour drive to Atlanta. "I literally prayed the whole way," he said. Because of his passion for life and the fighting spirit, Lewis didn't want to put Sandi down. He prayed if God wanted the little one to live that He would change the doctor's mind.

The couple walked into the hospital with heavy hearts and found Dr. Heath Qualls inserting a feeding tube, doing bloodwork, looking at sonograms and talking of partially functioning kidneys and lungs that didn't look too bad. Surprised, Sherry stopped the vet.

"We were going in to decide whether to put her down," Sherry said. "But she was such a little fighter from the moment she hit the ground."

Questioning Dr. Qualls, he responded by asking whether they wanted to put down the horse. "We didn't say that," Lewis replied. "What do you think?"

"Dr. Qualls sat back and looked up as if thinking," Lewis shared. "Then he said, 'I really don't understand why, but I think I changed my mind. I think she can make it.' And that's all the answer I needed."

Facing a tough road, Sherry became the baby horse's caregiver, visiting the hospital every day, while maintaining their home and caring for the other





horses. With Lewis' job taking him out of town, she took on the responsibility willingly. At one point, Sandi almost bled out. Sherry thought, *This is it. God's taking her.* She sat and placed her hand gently on the baby, anticipating death. "All of a sudden, she sat up, breathing normally and started eating again," she said. "And the next day, her blood counts were almost normal."

Lewis grinned. "I wasn't surprised. I believed she'd live."

Keeping the horse off her legs proved difficult. But spending much time researching options, Lewis came across a Hoyer lift. He bought one. Although the harnesses used didn't work well, the concept did. They modified one for a dog and lined it with fleece from New Zealand. By doing that, they got Sandi up, so she could exercise her developing legs without putting weight on them.

Using cutting-edge methods, Dr. Meghan Qualls used electromagnetic fields to help with Sandi's bone density. From no bone in the knees and ankles to filled-in space, she helped bring the little horse a long way. The most beautiful sight for Sherry and Lewis came when they took Sandi out to a field, and she ran for the first time without so much as a limp.

On May 24, Sandi and Jazzy left the hospital, going home healthy and happy. While the horse may face struggles in the future, and Lewis and Sherry have a large vet bill, they have no regrets.



Crazy for coffee and cameras, photography teacher Shannon Oden starts her days with both. The family pets hear her grind the beans, and the dog knows she will get a good morning snuggle when she joins Shannon in her extraordinary home office. Shannon's espresso maker sits atop a western cedar countertop made by her husband, Mark Thomas, a woodworker who teaches AP Psychology at Trimble Tech in downtown Fort Worth.

That's where the couple met, and though she transferred to teach in Mansfield ISD, the two teachers never parted. They married in 2017 and moved to a home in Weatherford near Interstate 20.

As the duo overhauled Shannon's studio, she frequently told Mark, "Just trust me." With a degree in interior design, she saw in her mind the exact outcome. She envisioned the coffee maker in place and her cameras just so.

A collector since she was 16, Shannon keeps other cameras at school. Her most recent acquisition, a giant large-format camera from an Abilene portrait studio,



rounded out the list of antique Brownies, medium format, pinholes, 620 and vintage 35mm cameras.

Shannon is a gifted photographer. But as an award-winning high school teacher, she spends much of her time on lesson plans for her students.

She's also worked consulting on the creation of educational apps with a group out of Berkeley, California, and is writing a guide for teaching Adobe certification for educators.

Before starting her 10th year of teaching this month, Shannon and Mark are taking a road trip, so she can photograph national parks. She credits her interest in this type of photography to Ansel Adams, a landscape photographer and a pioneer in conservation. She had the opportunity to interview Mr. Adams while she was a sophomore in high school, taking her first photography class.



Since then, Shannon has read his journals. "The way he feels about the environment is similar to how I feel," said Shannon, who once lived with her children in the Sierra Nevada Mountain Range and frequently took them with her to photograph snowy landscapes.

At first, the empty nest phenomenon was hard for her. "Now, I see it as a real golden opportunity," Shannon said. "I'm trying to experience more when I have time." She recognizes the value of getting her body of work together. "It's me time."

Not one to capture photos of every moment, Shannon is very purposeful. "I'll plan ahead and take my camera at the right time of day," she said. "Mark and I have to account for that in our travel time because we're going to stop for a sunrise or sunset or for every fence post."

During their road trips, Shannon will spy an old church, or a house that's falling down, and call for a halt. "Every



time I see an abandoned farmstead I get emotionally unsettled about it. I wonder what happened," she said. "I grieve for the house." And she documents everything about it, from the thigh-high weeds outside the frame to the shoes, clothes and books inside.

One time, Shannon was inspired to produce a photo story and went into a Waffle House at 4:00 a.m. "I'd never been in one," she said, "and there were all these rough guys having their breakfast. I asked the waitress to give me their tickets, and then I asked the men if I could take their photos." It's now a series of portraits telling a story through both nuances and larger shots.

Lately, she's been playing, taking a lot of still life photos of such things as mushrooms and garlic and more portraits. She once awakened Mark to take a trip to Central Market where they bought a tiny octopus for her to photograph. The resulting color photo titled, *Octopus in a Glass*, was published by *Photographer's Forum*.

Though she used color film for the octopus, Shannon's preference is for the timeless richness and tonality of black and white — even when photographing shrinking green spaces. When she took photos of Monument Valley, so beautiful, peaceful and vast, she used Photoshop tools to remove all the color.

But as she teaches her students, rather than spend much time touching them up, Shannon purposes to take good photos from the outset. On this month's trip, she'll take hundreds. The 7 percent she keeps will have a pleasing balance of exposure and composition. It's all about her aesthetics.







In fact, nothing stops. Everything goes on as usual, despite a high temperature of 32 F. This includes the annual Bigfoot Days celebration in the town's main park. Every vendor booth, every food and beverage stand - they're all open as if the sun was shining and the temperature was 80 F.




But whether it's snowing or the middle of summer, Estes Park, named after Missouri native Joel Estes who founded it in 1859, has a lot to offer folks who live there or are only staying for a short while. The small town of about 6,500 people (though that number is usually much higher when visitors are added) is nestled smack dab in the Rocky Mountains. From Denver, it's about an hour-and-a-half drive.


The large lobby is a great place to take a break. The restaurant offers some incredibly tasty — and large — dishes, so come hungry.

For those not old enough for the real thing, juice tastings and a playroom are included on-site.

So even if you're not looking for a Bigfoot, keep your eyes open while in Estes Park. There's always something going on.

# Function

Industrialists know when their sturdy wooden pallets can no longer carry the weight. Hobbyists discover quality used pallets that won't break their bank. Experienced crafters already have tools on hand, but if you're new to working with wood, your list for these projects will be simple and your investment under \$50.

#### AMERICAN OR TEXAS FLAG

Requires 4 days and good ventilation.

- \* I pallet
- \* Sandpaper
- \* Paintbrush
- \* Chalk paint in navy blue, apple red and pure white
- \* High gloss clear lacquer

Define the exact placement of the small rectangle, the order of the stripes and the positioning of the stars before you get started. You'll want the bottom, middle and top slats painted red and the intervening boards white. If you're painting the Texas flag, don't forget the white box is positioned above the red one.

Start painting the white color portions first. Make all the stars a little bigger, even messier, than the end result. While the white paint dries, wash your paintbrush thoroughly and prop it up to dry. When you're ready, paint the darker colors. Where they meet the white, allow a 1/4-inch overlap.

For a folk-art feeling, only use one coat. For a Warhol-ish effect, paint three coats. This wall- or yardart can be hung or propped against a vertical object, like a tree or a garage wall. A more functional method to enjoy your patriotic pop art is to place it flag-up atop a stack of 5 to 7 other pallets and use it as a table.

#### HERB GARDEN

Requires 2 hours and no sanding.

\* I pallet

- \* 25 seedling herbs
- \* I 48x40-inch plot of land
- \* I shovel
- \* I hoe
- \* I trowel
- \* I hose


Using shovel and hoe, prepare a 48x40-inch plot of ground by digging deep, turning the soil at least five times before hoeing the ground level. Place the pallet on the flat, prepared ground. Dig five holes between each slat with your trowel.

Wearing gloves to protect against splinters, place each seedling into the holes, and tamp loose dirt around its root base with your fingers. Use your hose for five minutes each morning, and another five each evening, to gently spray your garden. Moisture in the wood will prevent the baby herbs from drying out, while the slats will be a weed-barrier.

#### TEA PARTY PANTRY

Requires 48 hours.

- \* I pallet
- \* Sandpaper (optional)
- \* 25 large, attractive screw hooks
- \* I paintbrush
- \* High gloss clear lacquer
- \* I heavy-duty picture-hanging kit
- \* 1 screwdriver
- \* 2 tea towels
- \* 20 hot beverage mugs with handles
- \* 3 attractive drawstring bags
- \* 3 boxes of your 3 favorite teas



Sand rough edges off the pallet, if a polished look is desired. Using just your hands, patiently screw into your slats all the hooks, making sure all are facing the same direction and none are closer than 7 inches from each other.

Paint slats cross-grain with a thin layer of lacquer, covering each hook where it connects to the wood. After that dries, paint another layer of lacquer with the grain. Once fully dry, use the picture-hanging kit to position your Tea Party Pantry for immediate hospitality. Arrange mugs and tea towels attractively on the hooks. Fill each drawstring bag with a special type of tea and hang one each on the three remaining hooks.

#### FRONT YARD SWING

Requires 4 hours and access to electricity.

- \* 2 pallets
- \* I piece of plywood
- \* I handheld drill with a 2-inch drill bit
- \* 1 100-foot length of strong rope
- \* 2 strong boys or girls

Place the plywood on the ground. Position the two pallets side-by-side atop the plywood. Drill 2-inch holes through the plywood, 4 inches from the perimeter, between every slat in the pallet.

Sew the rope through the holes, looping it over and under each slat. You want to have rope handles extending up from each end of the swing. Knot the rope ends securely. Send each rope handle up the tree with 2 strong, tree-climbing children. Once they position the rope over



the appropriate branches, they can shimmy back down and take a nap on their swing.

Once your unique project is completed, the possibilities for sharing are endless. Posting photos to social media sites is the simplest way to inspire a large number of people. For maximum fun, invite a few friends over to christen your creation.

### Estate Plans Can Help You Answer Questions About the Future

The word *estate* conjures images of great wealth, which may be one of the reasons so many people don't develop estate plans — after all, they're not rich, so why make the effort? In reality, though, if you have a family, you can probably benefit from estate planning, whatever your asset level. And you may well find that a comprehensive estate plan can help you answer some questions you may find unsettling — or even worrisome.

Here are a few of these questions:

• What will happen to my children? With luck, you (and your co-parent, if you have one) will be alive and well at least until your children reach the age of majority (either 18 or 21, depending on where you live). Nonetheless, you don't want to take any chances, so, as part of your estate plans, you may want to name a guardian to take care of your children if you are not around. You also might want to name a conservator — sometimes called a "guardian of the estate" — to manage any assets your minor children might inherit.

• Will there be a fight over my assets? Without a solid estate plan in place, your assets could be subject to the time-consuming, expensive — and very public — probate process. During probate, your relatives and creditors can gain access to

your records, and possibly even challenge your will. But with proper planning, you can maintain your privacy. As one possible element of an estate plan, a living trust allows your property to avoid probate and pass quickly to the beneficiaries you've named.

• Who will oversee my finances and my living situation if I become incapacitated? You can build various forms of protection into your estate planning, such as a durable power of attorney, which allows you to designate someone to manage your financial affairs if you become physically or mentally incapacitated. You could also create a medical power of attorney, which allows someone to handle health care decisions on your behalf if you become unable to do so yourself.

• Will I shortchange my family if I leave significant assets to charities? Unless you have unlimited resources, you'll have to make some choices about charitable gifts and money for your family. But as part of your estate plans, you do have some appealing options. For example, you could establish a charitable lead trust, which provides financial support to your chosen charities for a period of time, with the remaining assets eventually going to your family members. A charitable remainder trust, by contrast, can provide a stream of income for your family members for the term of the trust, before the remaining assets are transferred to one or more charitable organizations.

As you can see, careful estate planning can help you answer many of the questions that may be worrying you. Be aware, though, that certain aspects of estate planning, especially those related to living trusts and charitable trusts, can be complex, so you should consult your estate-planning attorney or qualified tax advisor about your situation. But once you've got your plans in place, you should be able to face the future with greater clarity and confidence.
