



Ahoy, Mateys!





Richard Calhoun has a sort of X-ray vision. No, he can't see through doors and walls, at least not those made of wood and plaster, but he can — and does — see through other, less tangible barriers. What he sees makes all the difference in the lives of those he mentors and teaches.

Put succinctly, Richard has a gift for seeing the value in others, even those — or perhaps particularly those — who don't see it in themselves. He's used this talent first as an operations supervisor in corporate America, and for the past 18 years as a behavioral teacher, 10 of those years at Red Oak High School.

"My whole life has been marked by motivating others and pushing others on to make a better life for themselves and to make the world a better place," Richard shared, adding quickly that his ability is "not a bragging point. I'm not unique. All good leaders or coaches have an ability to bring out the best in people."

Fresh out of college, Richard entered fast-track management training and soon found his calling, "I came in with some ideas and motivational strategies, and we just soared," he said of one of his first managerial assignments. "I loved it, and I realized that talking to

people, encouraging people and giving recognition to people and really honing in on self-esteem levels, that was my niche. That's what I could do."


He's never stopped doing it. After several successful years in corporate America and a short stint as a small business owner, Richard decided to take his love of motivating others to a new platform, a high school classroom. It's as a teacher to students with emotional, psychological or even neurological challenges that Richard believes he's been able to make the most difference — so far.

"What's funny is I've never really had a desire to teach another class. There's something about that particular class. I think it's looking at the kids that might be seen as underdogs and challenging myself to say, 'Hey, you're better than you think you are. I see something you don't see. My challenge is to convince you to see a little bit of what I see, and if you see, then you're going to be OK."

Almost two decades in the behavioral classroom have produced a wealth of experiences. True to his passion for inspiring others, a few years ago, Richard compiled his experience into two books aimed at motivating educational professionals, The Dynamic Principal and Fearfully and Wonderfully Made — The Behavioral Teacher.

He didn't stop there. Richard's desire to help others succeed seems almost insatiable. Once his books were published and available for purchase, he asked himself a challenging question. "If I'm blessed to make any profits off this, what am I going to do with that?" His answer was as visionary as the rest of his life — give it away.





In 2019, the first "Fearfully and Wonderfully Made Scholarship" was awarded to a ROHS graduating senior, funded entirely by proceeds from the sale of Richard's books. While trying to express how he felt at the school's awards ceremony when he heard the explosion of applause and the roar of excitement as the recipient of his scholarship was announced, Richard became overcome with gratitude, not for what he received but for what he'd been able to give.


"I always wanted to be in a position in life to give back to the community in some way, and scholarships have always been in the back of my mind," Richard said. Remembering the financial challenges he faced as a college freshman, he decided he wanted to "help put a student in a position so when they step on a college campus, they have some money in their pocket."

And he's not done yet. In the winter of 2020, at the invitation of a school district in South Texas, Richard will present a conference based on *Fearfully and Wonderfully Made* to a group of educators. This past summer, he wrote his third book.

For Richard, true success is achieved one person at a time. Just before graduation in May 2019, he received an email from a parent of a graduating senior, a student he'd taught since the student's freshman year at ROHS. The parent "thanked me for all I'd done and said, 'Without you, I don't think there was any way possible that [my child] was going to graduate." For this author, educator and motivator who innately sees more in the people around him, there's much more on the horizon.

The Oak Leaf home of Bob and Pat Cochran has an almost palpable peace about it. The lush lawn, the songs of birds in towering pecan trees and Bob's thriving vegetable garden make it hard to believe that one year ago a historic flood ravaged the grounds and house. Today, the exterior of the house looks much the same. The interior is another story — not a story of despair as one could imagine, but a story of generosity, sacrifice, faith, and most of all, gratitude.

The story began Sept. 22, 2018, around 3:00 a.m., as a sheriff's deputy knocked on the door of the house the couple had called home for 39 years. Red Oak Creek, which runs directly behind their property, was flooding — quickly.

"He said, 'Y'all have to get out. Now.' We said, 'What?' 'It's flooding,' he said, 'Y'all have to leave. Go in, get your medication, and that's it. That's all we have time for," Pat remembered. "I grabbed my purse, we got a garbage sack, threw our medicine in it, and we left."

They sat in the sheriff's car across the street and watched as their house was overtaken. In a matter of a few hours, a lifetime washed away.

There's a 19-foot drop from the Cochrans' backyard to the creek below. An amount of water that could exceed that height, cross several

hundred feet of lawn and swallow the house is something "you can't believe unless you see it," Pat said.

When the waters receded, they knew life was never going to be the same. "Life's going to be different," Bob said, then added, "but that's OK. We'll never be able to replace all that was lost, but I don't think we want to. It's just *things*."

As word of the flood spread, people they'd never met showed up to remove debris, tear out walls and salvage what they could. Local churches, nonprofits and, of course, many friends pitched in to clean up and rebuild. "Our bowling team took up money for supplies. People at our church gave money. So many people did so many things," Pat said. "We're so grateful to all of them."

Bob and Pat are people of deep faith. Such great loss challenged that faith, then made it stronger. In place of "things" they lost, Bob and Pat now have a completely renovated home filled with tangible reminders of the goodness and generosity of others and the faithfulness of God.

The formal living room that housed a Duncan Phyfe sofa, piano, leather-topped table, numerous antiques and irreplaceable family heirlooms is now a spacious, welcoming dining room. In the den, dark paneling has been exchanged for softly textured, light-painted walls. A freshly painted fireplace brightens the room even more.

Light-colored wood planks have replaced ceramic tile on almost every floor and, of course, the carpet is new. Every door



and all the trim are also new. "We got an all-new house, except for the attic," Bob joked.

Every room holds donated furniture, appliances or furnishings of some kind, from the dining table and chairs given by Ellis County Master Gardeners to the master bedroom suite donated by The Avenue Church in Waxahachie. The guest bedroom set came from Labor of Love of Ellis County and the kitchen appliances and washer and dryer from different sets of friends. The unplanned remodel has given the house an updated appearance, but the true beauty is the people who made it happen.

"You see a lot of bad in the media, but there are a lot of good people," Bob shared.

Pat echoed his sentiment. "There are more good people than you know out there until you need them, and then, there they are."

Everywhere, evidence of that often overlooked goodness surrounds them. Every day as they walk through their home, Bob and Pat are overwhelmed with gratitude, remembering how volunteers from their community and across the country came to their aid, asking for nothing but the privilege of helping. Both were humbled. Bob said he often thought, Why would they do that for me?

The daughter-in-law of one neighbor "knocked on the door one day and said, 'I understand y'all need some help. I'm here to help.' She ended up putting in every floor in this house," Pat said. A

local contractor stepped in as a volunteer foreman and worked side-by-side with scores of people installing new walls, cabinets, trim, doors and painting the entire house. The friend of a friend from a local lumber company helped provide building materials. And employees of one local fast-food chain "would just walk through and hand out food during the day."

Watching so many people sacrifice their time and resources to help gave Bob and Pat a renewed commitment to do the same. Giving back always has been part of their lives, but Bob pointed out it "now has taken center stage. It's our turn to give back," he said, "and we will."



"Yes, we will," Pat chimed in. "God will make a way for us to do that."

Bob and Pat have been married for 56 years. In that time, their faith and commitment to each other have seen them through more storms than the one that decimated their home. As for this particular storm, "The hardest part was throwing away Bibles," Bob said.

"You picked them [Bibles] up, and they just fell apart. I guess that hurt more than anything," Pat agreed.

The couple had many Bibles, some heirlooms, and others, cherished gifts. Only one survived. "The only one that's left is my little white Bible, the one I got married with, walked down the aisle with," Pat said. "It's yellowed, but it's still here."

And so are they, thanks to what Pat called "the army of God's people who shared their food, time, talents and money. We'll never be able to thank them all, but we know who they are, and so does He." NOW

Theresa's Frozen **Chocolate Pie**

Makes 8 servings.

Pie Filling:

1 cup confectioner's sugar

1/2 cup softened butter

- 6 1-oz. semi-sweet chocolate squares, melted and cooled (6 oz. semi-sweet chocolate pieces can be substituted.)
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 4 eggs

I piecrust, baked according to package instructions Plastic wrap

Pie Topping:

I cup chilled whipping cream 2 Tbsp. confectioner's sugar **Chocolate curls (optional)**

- 1. For pie filling: With a blender or mixer, blend confectioner's sugar and butter on low speed until mixture is fluffy.
- 2. Add the melted chocolate squares or

pieces and vanilla; blend well. On high speed, beat in eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition.

- **3.** For pie: Pour filling into the baked pie shell; cover with plastic wrap. Freeze several hours until pie filling is firm.
- **4.** For easier slicing of pieces, remove the pie from freezer 15 minutes before serving.
- **5.** For topping: In a chilled bowl, beat the whipping cream and confectioner's sugar until stiffened. Remove the plastic wrap; top the pie filling with the whipping cream mixture.
- 6. Garnish with chocolate curls, if desired.

Spanish Rice

As South Texas natives, where Tex-Mex food is a staple, Henry and Connie treasure this old family recipe.

1 Tbsp. olive oil

I medium onion, chopped

1 bell pepper, deseeded and chopped

1 1/2 cups brown rice

1 14.5-oz. can chicken broth

1 cup water

1 14.5-oz. can diced tomatoes

1 tsp. garlic

1 tsp. cumin

Salt, a pinch or to taste

- **1.** In a pan with a cover, combine the olive oil, onion, bell pepper and rice; brown.
- 2. Add the chicken broth and water; bring the mixture to a boil.
- **3.** Turn the heat to simmer. Add the diced tomatoes, garlic, cumin and salt.
- **4.** Cover; simmer until rice is fluffy but not overcooked. If needed, water can be added.

Pam's Banana Pudding

This recipe makes quite a lot of pudding, yet when taken to outings, there's never any left.

- 3 1/2 cups whole milk
- 3 3.4-oz. boxes instant vanilla pudding
- 4 oz. sour cream
- 1 8-oz. tub Cool Whip
- 2 boxes vanilla wafers
- 8 bananas, sliced
- 1. Mix the milk and pudding until the pudding has just become dissolved.
- **2.** Add the sour cream and Cool Whip; stir until completely combined and smooth.
- 3. In a large serving bowl, layer a foundation of vanilla wafers, then add a layer of banana slices, followed by a layer of the pudding mixture.
- 4. Depending on the size of the serving bowl, repeat the layers until all ingredients are used.

Chicken Enchiladas

- I whole chicken, boiled, skinned. deboned and coarsely chopped (reserve 1 cup of broth)
- 1/2 large onion, chopped
- I cup stewed tomatoes
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- I tsp. garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp. cumin
- 1 pkg. corn tortillas

Grease, enough to cover bottom of pan Monterrey Jack cheese, to taste

- **1.** In a frying pan, combine cooked chicken, I cup of broth, onions, stewed tomatoes, chili powder, garlic powder and cumin. Bring the mixture to a boil; stir, then lower heat to simmer as you prepare tortillas.
- 2. While chicken mixture simmers, in a separate frying pan, dip each tortilla in hot grease until softened; remove and drain on a paper towel.
- 3. Place desired amount of chicken mixture onto each softened tortilla, roll each tortilla and place in a shallow baking pan, seam side down.
- 4. Pour remaining liquid from the chicken mixture over the tortillas; top with cheese.







5. Bake at 350 F until heated through and cheese is melted.

Salmon Loaf for Two

I cup canned salmon, drained

I cup breadcrumbs

I egg, slightly beaten

1/2 cup whole milk

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

I tsp. onion, chopped

I tsp. green pepper, chopped Butter, oil or cooking spray

I. In a bowl, combine all ingredients; mix well. Pack mixture into a greased loaf pan.

- **2.** Set the loaf pan into another pan of hot water before placing into the oven.
- **3.** Bake the loaf at 375 F for about 35 minutes, or until the loaf is firm.

Cornbread by Covie

Makes 10 servings.

1/2 cup cornbread mix 1 1/4 cups whole milk 1/3 cup oil



2 eggs, beaten

I large onion, chopped

I cup cream-style corn, drained

1/4 cup pickled jalapeño pepper, minced

3/4 cup cheddar cheese, grated

I. In a large bowl, mix all ingredients well.

2. Pour into a greased or sprayed 11 x 7 x 1 1/2-inch pan.

3. Bake at 375 F for 30 minutes, or until fork tine or toothpick inserted in the center comes out dry.

Ranch Dip Veronica Style

- 1 16-oz. container sour cream
- 1 1.5-oz. packet Ranch dip seasoning Black pepper, to taste Garlic salt, to taste
- **1.** Mix together the sour cream and Ranch dip seasoning.
- **2.** Stir in the black pepper and garlic salt; serve with veggies or meats



City of 100,000 Welcomes

— By Sally Fuller

"Céad míle fáilte!" This traditional Irish greeting, which translated means "One hundred thousand welcomes!" is a fitting phrase to describe Ireland's capital. With a settlement of some kind present here for nearly 2,000 years, Dublin is the perfect mix of ancient and contemporary, with castles, cathedrals and hundred-plus-year-old pubs rising from stone and brick streets next to Dunnes Stores (think Macy's) and Insomnia coffeehouses (think Starbucks).

Whether you're a history buff, a literature lover, a "barley pop" devotee or on an ancestral pilgrimage, Dubliners enthusiastically welcome you. Explore their centuries-old castles and churches, laugh at stories of their famous authors and the timeworn pubs they loved, relax with a pint of your favorite beverage and be awestruck by the country's most treasured relic.

Ashtown Castle in Dublin's Phoenix Park and Malahide Castle, located nine miles from the city center, are both selfieworthy, but to delve a wee bit deeper into Dublin's history, a tour of Dublin Castle is a must. Built atop the ruins of a Viking fortress dating to 930 A.D., the exterior of the castle is a hodgepodge of centuries of repairs and additions. Inside, a checkered history of rulers and rebellions lives on, amid beautifully appointed apartments and somber memorials.

The stunning architecture of St. Patrick's Cathedral alone makes this a necessary stop. Add to that its matchless claim as the spot upon which St. Patrick baptized the first Irish into Christianity around 450 A.D., and it can easily become the highlight of a Dublin tour. Standing in the church gardens and staring in wonder at the 141-foot spire (the tallest in all of Ireland), imagine yourself on the very spot where a group of

pagan converts professed new faith in what was then a new religion. This stop can evoke a sense of the Divine in even the most earthly minded.

A visit to Trinity College Dublin for a peek at the country's crown jewel is also a necessity. The Book of Kells, housed (and guarded — no photos allowed) on the ground floor of Trinity's Long Library, contains a copy of the four Gospels that date back to about 800 A.D. The Books, written entirely on calfskin, were compiled by monks who obviously were more than mere scribes. Each page of the Books contains spectacular illustrations and calligraphy in stillvibrant colors.

After a day of castles, cathedrals and Kells, spend an evening with two local actors, as they regale you with stories of some of Ireland's most famous authors on Dublin's Literary Pub Crawl. Starting at The Duke Dublin, you crawl to and through such places as Davy Byrnes, McDaid's and Neary's, where Irish literary greats such as James Joyce, Brendan Behan and Oscar Wilde whiled away many nights — and possibly some days — in the company of their compatriots and a pint of stout.

Speaking of stout, no trip to Dublin is complete without a tour of the Guinness Storehouse at St. James's Gate. While there, visitors learn about the beverage's unique brewing process, view the 9,000-year lease Arthur Guinness extracted from the city as an assurance the drink synonymous with the country will endure, and learn to "pour the perfect pint" at the Guinness Academy.


After the tour, make your way to The Brazen Head, Ireland's oldest pub. Established in 1198. The Brazen Head's nightly live entertainment with a menu boasting an extraordinarily creamy seafood stew as well as the staple fish and chips makes this a great place to eat, drink and be merry in the most Irish sort of way.

The Temple Bar district is synonymous with nightlife in Dublin. The narrow, cobbled streets down which you travel to reach not only the famous Temple Bar Pub but the plethora of other bustling after-dark spots remind you that amid the shining neon signs, you trod upon centuries-old streets here as in every other part of the city. 




